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

Chamber of Commerce Honors Lee M. Fowler




All in all, it was a fine time for everyone. It was a chance for those of us who are well acquainted with snow to remember its good and

After The Heart Attack...

By Mustafa S. Mandviwala,M.D. While today's public is better informed about heart attacks, the Individual who himself has suftered a myocardial infarction often has many questions concerning his own situation

With the use of various nuclear maging techniques, limited stress and the advice of a bigist these questions can and should be answered.

-The cordiac patient usually inguires about the extent of heart damage and the expected recovery period. Generally speaking, patients with simple heart attacks have a relatively small amount of damage and a better prognosis. Once the patient gets to the hospital the major crisis is probably over, and the longterm survival of the simple heart attack patient can be modified with changes in lifestyle, weight, smoking hypertension and cholesterol/ triglyceride levels, and use of some medicines.

-The question of when can the patient return to work often arises. Besides the extent of the heart attack, this depends on the educa-

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tional background, work status prior to the heart attack, job satisfaction and the social benefits of not returning to work.

--The degree of exercise is another often asked question. Most individuals with uncomplicated heart attacks can gradually increase their predischarge hospital stress test. It is extremely important to achieve ideal body weight, so one of the first exercises the cardiac patient may need to do is push himself oway from the table.

After the individual is able to walk an uninterrupted mile, it may be advisable to join a scheduled exercise program, which puts the patient in a monitored situation for the first few months. Isometric exercises are generally not advisable since they increase resistance of the blood flow to the vessels and may result in heart beat irregularities. Jogging may be initiated by walking slowly and then gradually building oneself up. Swimming and bicycling are other goad methods of exercise.

Generally, patients can participate in sports after gradually build-

ing themselves up. However, it is not advisable to participate in competitive sports.

--The cardiologist is invariably asked about dief. Generally speaking, all red meat and many kinds of shellfish are high in cholesterol, and the individual should exercise caution in eating these foods. Refined sugars should be curtailed since they increase triglyceride levels, and unsaturated fat should be used. Prudent, but not rigid, diet is advised.

--The question of sex usually arises. The risk of engaging in sex with one's own partner in a known environment is considered safe. However, there have been reported deaths during extramartial relationships.

--Another often-asked question concerns insurability. There are companies that will insure the patient at a higher premium based on fitness.

All in all, though, prevention is better than cure, good living habits after the heart attack apply just as much, or probably more imperatively than, before the heart attack.

It only looks difficult to make, the pastry and filling are practically foolproof. You can make this tasty dessert in advance and keep it in the refrigerator until you re ready to serve This way you'll have more time for vour quests

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. On large greased and floured baking sheet, draw circle, using the bottom of 9-inch pie plate as a guide

To make creampuffs, in medium saucepan, bring water, margarine and sugar to a boil. Blend in flour, stirring rapidly until mixture leaves sides of pan and forms a ball. Remove from heat Beat in eggs, one at a time, until well mixed. Stir in vanilla.

Drop ¼ cup mixture in circle on baking sheet; repeat with remaining batter, placing putts side-by-side to form ring. Bake 35 to 40 minutes or until puffed and golden. Turn off oven; let stand in oven 10 minutes. Remove ring from baking sheet; cool on wire rack in draft-free place.

For filling, in med. bowl, combine instant pudding & pie filling, milk and heavy cream. Beat at medium speed of electric mixer for 4 minutes; beat at high speed for an additional 1 minute. Chill 1 hour

Carefully cut cooked cream puff ring horizontally in half; set top aside. Mix bananas into prepared pudding, spoon into bottom of ring; top with strawberries. Replace top; sprinkle with confectioner's sugar. If desired, fill center of ring with fruit pieces. Chill until ready to serve.
