Dr. Richard Redfield Answers Your Questions...

Concerning The Eyes of Texas

Dear Dr. Redfield.

My glasses have a correction for astigmatism. What is that?

Dr. Mrs. P.,

The outside of our eyes has a clear covering. When that covering is more oval than round, it interferes with our eyes' ability to focus property. We call this astigmatism. About 75 to 80 percent of eyeglass or contact lens wearers have astigmatism. Very mild astigmatism, however, may not need correction.

Astigmatism can occur along with other vision problems, like nearsightedness. This complicates matters, but your vision specialist can make the right diagnosis after a thorough vision examination. Glasses, contact lenses and/or vision therapy may be needed.

Slight astigmatisms may cause headaches, fatigue, squinting, eye irritation and discomfort. Higher degrees can distort or blur your vision. Since astigmatism changes

gradually, regular vision examinations are necessary to keep seeing well.

Dear Dr. Redfield,

The last time that I had my eyes examined, the doctor looked in my eyes with a very bright light. What was he doing?

Dear Liz

When you go to an optometrist to a vision exam, you are not only having a complete visual analysis, the doctor will also examine the outside and inside of your eyes for detection of possible ocular diseases or disorders. By looking inside your eye with that "bright light" or opthalmoscope, the doctor is looking for signs of glaucoma, cataracts, disorders of the retina

and other changes peculiar to the

When your eye care professional examines the back part of your eye, he or she will also be able to detect changes associated with high blood pressure, diabetes and many other blood problems that may or may not have been made aware to you in the past. In some instances, detection of a long-standing, untreated diabetic condition can be life-saving.

Even though you feel that you see well, a health evaluation of your eyes on a routine basis is of necessity. To find out what is routine for you, as an individual, ask your eye care professional.

Dear Dr. Redfield,

What can you tell me about the new surgery to correct nearsightedness?

The new surgical procedure in practice to reduce myopia or near-

sightedness, is called radial teratotomy (RK). This technique is done by making eight to 16 radial incisions (like the hands of a clock) on the surface of the comea, the clear covering on the front of the eye. As a result of the incisions, the scarring somewhat flattens out the comea, thereby reducing some of th excessive power of the nearcipated cure.

The surgery can usually be done on an out-patient basis with 90% stability of vision within three months. Post-operative contact with the surgeon must be maintained regularly for three to six months.

For those patients who may be restricted by the their vision and cannot wear contact lenses, radial keratotomy can offer relief. But the procedure has not been without controversy. The American Academy of Ophthalmology considers RK surgery experimental and one of their concerns is the long-range effect of comeat health Surgeons who support radial keratotomy, including one former president of the academy, agree that until 20 years post surgery, all the data cannot be obtained pertaining to the long range effects and safety of the procedure. No history of radial keratotomy exists before ten years

Before a patient decides on RK surgery, he or she should be fully aware of any possible risk or complication. Most eye care professionals would be willing to discuss the procedure and offer their opinion.
