EPITOME

God has a record of her deeds from the first day He opened her life's book. Our records only show a few.

The life Book of Missionary and Mother Maggie Smith Carreathers was opened January 10, 1892 when God blessed to the Holy Union of Monroe Smith and Mollie Smith in Red River County, Texas a blessed baby girl, as the second of eight children. She grew up in this area and attended public school there.

Being born to Christian parents, Christian living was a way of life for her from birth. Thus pages of consistent Christian life were ever loyal ones in all aspects of her life. Her church affiliation came at an early age at New Hope Baptist Church, Detroit, Texas.

The following pages revealed she completed her formal educational training at F.I.S. College at Ladonio, Texas.

On December 20, 1914 the page of matrimony was scribed when she was joined in Holy Matrimony to Henry Carreathers, who preceded her in death October 11, 1953. To this union ten children were born. One son, Marion Carreathers preceded her in death.

Pages which follow reveal

Upon moving to Denison in 1939 she soon united with the Antioch Baptist Church under the leadership of Pastor C. F. Irvin. Her occupation was that of many diversities – housewife, maid, a sales agent for Lucky Heart Co.; an agent for Lotts Burial & Centennial Life Ins. Co. for more than 40 years. Her church services were unselfish, unlimited, but she rejoiced most of all in her mission work, where she served as president for several decades until her health began to fail. This doesn't mean her mission services diminished, but her ability to serve as an active president became somewhat limited since being away frequently with her children. She then became Honorary President. She continued to serve whenever and wherever she would be and became a part of the church families of all of her children, as well as considering Array Olive COGIC as her second home church.

As a result of her christian living and untiring services at Antioch, she was chosen "Mother" of the church and served in this capacity in every way until death.

She is not only known as Church Mother, but all over Denison and many friends of the family near and far all loved her and called her "Mama" because of the love she gave and was given to her in return.

God called her to rest on Tuesday, June 12, 1979 at 8:20 p.m. at the Texoma Medical Center, Denison, Texas.

Historical Highlights

The National Association of College Deans, Registrars, and Admissions Officers was founded in 1925 as the National Association of College Deans and Registrars. Dean T. H. McKinney of North Carolina Agricultural and Technical College in Greensboro, North Carolina convened a few college administrators for the purpose of discussing the idea of organizing a professional organization. The group agreed that an organization was not only feasible but highly desirable particularly, since minorities were not permitted to participate in most professional organizations at that time.

The major purposes for establishing an organization were to provide a forum for Deans and Registrars of black colleges to discuss mutual problems with a view toward improving the quality of education in member colleges and to set up standards for accreditation.

In 1967, the momentous decision on the continuation of this organization was made. It was decided that an organization specifically concerned with the problems and aspirations of the historically black colleges was needed and should be perpetuated.
