Why the World is "Flat":

Bakari Sellers Talks Politics, Identity, and Scandal

On Nov.11, Prairie View A&M University's Men of Color Leadership Institute held a brunch to close out a weekend of events that aimed to empower and inspire young men. Lawyer, politician and political analyst, Bakari Sellers, was the event's keynote speaker. Sellers spoke on a variety of subjects such as his political background, what motivates his fight for civil rights, what young KB: No sir. people can do to enact positive change and more. Following the brunch, Sellers expanded on his thoughts with several Prairie View student leaders in a candid discussion.

Johari Wiley: As an African-American, what has been your biggest challenge while working on CNN and the platform that is American pol-

Bakari Sellers: Well I think that in media it's a little different than it is in just basic politics. In the media, my goals are quite simple: to be an example, to not fall into any stereotypes, not be made to be an angry black man. In politics though, you want to uplift your community, you want to be the example as well, but you want to provide a means in a way by which you can uplift your community, in all communities for that matter. And so challenge is very real. As I told people earlier, being from the south, sometimes make your plight in life that much heavier, but it's a burden which I'm willing to bear.

JW: A common question that I hear among young people is "How do we, as college students, make an impact, socially, through civil

Well, I mean we wouldn't have had any of the successes we've had without college students. I mean if you think about all of the movements throughout our time, young people were always the leaders of those movements. From the civil rights movement, the gay rights movement, the women's rights movement, they were all led by figures who were young. You know, King was very young, my father was very young, my father (Dr. Cleveland Sellers) was fourteen, fifteen, when he first got involved. The sit-in movement started Feb.1, 1960 with three students from North Carolina A&T. What I would challenge everybody at Prairie View to do is to make sure that they're willing to take their activism outside of the gates of their university and effectuate change throughout the entire

Daric Cottingham: I do know that sometimes [politics] is not for each person, but how do you know whether you are the Olivia Pope or the Fitzgerald Grant (from ABC's Scandal) in the efforts to make change?

Well one, you watch way too much T.V., cause ain't none of that [expletive] real. [laughs] I know Kerry [Washington] very well, don't tell her I said that. I mean, I'm a firm believer that opportunities will present themselves; you need to focus on preparing yourself for that opportunity. And the experiences that you have now on campus are amazing, but make sure you layer those with experiences that I call "co-curricular". Not extracurricular, but things that parallel your curriculum that give you other life experiences. And so, if you see yourself being the elected official, figure out how to do that, if you see yourself being the "fixer", then start beginning to find avenues where you can work in that realm. I know fixer's very well, and I know politicians very well. They both do exist.

Kirsten Budwine: There is so much going on in the world, like Donald Trump, local elections, racism, and all types of things. How do we stay on top of what's important in the political

Everyday I read the Wall Street Journal, the New York Times, the Washington Post. In the mornings I read my local newspapers, late mornings I read the L.A. Times. I read the Atlantic and the New Yorker when they come out. You have to have an insatiable desire to learn as much as possible and for me that just requires consuming so much. I don't read as many books as I should because books take time, and so I read a lot of news and a lot of news magazines. The Atlantic and the New Yorker are top flight. And Ta-Nehisi. Anything Ta-Nehisi writes, I read.

KB: Ta-Nehisi?

Ta-Nehisi Coates? You've never heard of Ta-Nehi-

Ta-Niehisi is the James Baldwin of our generation. He's worth the read. He wrote a piece [on Trump] in the Atlantic recently, called The First White President.

KB: Do you feel like social media helps to get the correct narratives out?

No, social media lacks context, but social media is the reason why the world is "flat". The reason why twitter is a great resource is because of its interconnectivity. You can communicate with people throughout the entire world; it fundamentally makes the world flat. But the reason that it sucks sometimes is because it is without nuance and without context. It's hard to have nuance and context in 140 characters.

Those are probably the only two offices that I would run for, having already served in the House [of Representatives], and ran for lieutenant governor.

Gunman targets people at random in California town, kills 4

RANCHO TEHAMA RESERVE, Calif. (AP) — A gunman driving stolen vehicles and choosing his targets at random opened fire "without provo-cation" in a tiny, rural Northern California town Tuesday, killing four people and wounding at least 10 others, including a student at an elementary school, before police shot him dead, authorities said.

The rampage began shortly be-fore 8 a.m. when the gunman fatally shot a neighbor he had been accused of stabbing in January, Tehama County Assistant Sheriff Phil Johnston said.

Shortly afterward, the gunman rammed through the gate of Rancho Tehama Elementary School about 2 miles away and spent about six min-utes shooting into the building, striking at least one student, Johnston said.

Surveillance video showed the gunman, who was not identified, try-ing unsuccessfully to enter the school, authorities said.

School officials' swift decision to lock the doors after hearing gunfire was "monumental" in saving the lives of countless children, Johnston said. No one was killed there.

The gunman left the school after he could not get inside and purposely crashed the stolen truck he was driving into another vehicle and shot at its occupants, Johnston said.

The shooter stole the car of a person who stopped to check on the crash and ran away when confronted with a gun. He continued the rampage until police shot him about 45 minutes after it started, Johnston said.

"This man was very, very bent on completing what he set out to do," the assistant sheriff said.

The shootings occurred in the rural community of Rancho Tehama Reserve, a homeowners association of modest houses and trailers in rolling oak woodlands dotted with grazing cattle about 130 miles north of SacraPolice offered no immediate word on the assailant's motive, but a sheriff's official said the shooter's neighbors had reported a domestic violence incident a day earlier. Officials did not specify who was involved or what happened.

Brian Flint told the Record

Searchlight newspaper in the city of Redding that his neighbor, whom he knows only as Kevin, was the gunman and that his roommate was among the victims. He said the shooter stole his

"The crazy thing is that the neighbor has been shooting a lot of bullets lately, hundreds of rounds, large magazines," Flint said. "We made it aware that this guy is crazy and he's been threatening us.

Johnston said officials received multiple 911 calls about gunfire at an intersection of two dirt roads in the upper reaches of the sparsely populated neighborhood. Minutes later, more calls reporting shots flooded in from different locations, including a small elementary school.

"It was very clear at the onset that we had an individual that was randomly picking targets," Johnston

Witnesses reported hearing gunshots and children screaming at the school, which has one class of students from kindergarten through fifth

Johnston said the student shot at the school was flown by helicopter to a hospital, and another student was wounded in a car on the way to school.

He said authorities believe they know the identity of the shooter but

declined to release his name pending further investigation. He appears to have fired a semiautomatic rifle and two handguns at seven locations, au-

Salvador Tello said the gunman fired at a truck in front of him as he went to drop off his three children at school. Tello said he was about three blocks from the school when bullets made "big holes" in the truck.

He said he forced his children to duck down, slammed his vehicle into reverse and headed to the children's grandmother's house.

"I put my kids down and put my truck in reverse and went out," he said. "I don't believe it, because I wake up, take my kids, feed them cereal and put

them in the truck and say, 'Let's go to school like a normal day."

On the way, he said he saw an apparent gunshot victim and police at

The rural subdivision is described on its website as a "quiet private country community" where "the people are friendly and the pace is relaxed." The homeowner association's website says there are 2,016 lots in the community and 1,346 voting mem-

"It's pretty quiet," said 14-year resident Vince Broff, who lives about a mile from the school but was kept away from his home for more than three hours.

Before a law enforcement crackdown, marijuana farming was prevalent in the isolated area several years ago down and appeared to attract some crime, but "nothing this serious," Broff said.

On Tuesday, his lawyers asked Brinkley to step down, say-ing she stepped out of her judicial bounds numerous times. Experts: Bush groping allegations would be hard to prosecute

HOUSTON (AP) - Allegations that former President George H.W. Bush inappropriately touched six women involve potential crimes punishable by fines or jail time, if they had been prosecuted.

All but one of the cases is ineligible under state laws that limit when a prosecution can begin after an alleged crime, and several lawyers interviewed said that it would be difficult to win a conviction against Bush, who has vascular parkinsonism, a rare syndrome that mimics Parkinson's disease.

"You're still going to be facing prosecuting a 93-year-old man in a wheelchair that's a former president,"



said Toby Shook, a lawyer who previously served as a prosecutor in Dallas.
"I doubt if you could ever find a jury that would ever want to convict him."

There's no indication prosecutors are planning to pursue a case against Bush. Jordana Grolnick, an actress who alleged that Bush groped her behind last year as his wife, Barbara, stood nearby, told The Associated Press that she has no plans to report the 41st president to authorities. That appears to be the only incident that hasn't reached the local statute of limitations on how long a crime can be prosecuted after it occurs.

The six incidents occurred in

three states over a decade. In all of the cases, the women say Bush touched their buttocks as they stood next to him to take photos. All three states have laws against touching someone without their consent.

The women's stories broadly follow the same outline: Bush patted them below the waist as they stood next to him to take photos, sometimes with a joke about his favorite magician or writer being named "David Cop-a-Feel."

Bush has issued repeated apologies through a spokesman "to any-one he has offended." The spokesman, Jim McGrath, said in a statement last month that Bush has used a wheelchair for roughly five years, and that "his arm falls on the lower waist of people with whom he takes pictures." In a statement Monday, McGrath said, "George Bush simply does not have it in his heart to knowingly cause anyone distress, and he again apologizes to any-one he offended during a photo op."

McGrath did not respond to a request for additional comment Tuesday.

Actress Heather Lind was the first to accuse Bush of groping her, saying in an Oct. 24 Instagram post that Bush "touched me from behind" and told "a dirty joke" while they posed for a photo at a Houston screening of the AMC television series "Turn."

Five more women have come

forward since then, including Roslyn Corrigan, who told Time magazine Monday that Bush groped her as they took a photo in 2003, when Corrigan was 16, during an event in The Woodlands, a Houston suburb.

The AP generally does not identify victims of sexual assault without their consent, but is using the names of women who have spoken publicly on social media or in news reports.

Three of the incidents are re-

ported to have occurred in Texas. Shook said that under Texas law, touching someone's buttocks over the person's clothing would most likely be grounds for a misdemeanor assault charge, with only a \$500 fine and no jail time.

In Maine, where Bush is accused of grabbing two women, those alle-gations could give rise to a charge of assault or unlawful sexual touching, punishable by up to a year in jail, said Walt McKee, a defense attorney in Augusta, Maine. And in Pennsylvania, where a

retired newspaper journalist has ac-cused Bush of touching her during an event in Erie, the state's law against indecent assault could apply, said Richard Settgast, an adjunct law pro-fessor at Penn State University.

A key question in any prosecution, the lawyers said, would be

whether the suspect touched the vic-tim for sexual gratification or by accident. While age and physical disability would factor into any determination, Settgast said, "I don't necessarily think that just because someone's infirm, they wouldn't be able to be held accountable." Bush, who served as presi-

dent from 1989 to 1993, is a beloved figure in both Texas and Maine, the two states where he lives. Two days after the first woman accused Bush of misconduct, Houston Mayor Sylvester Turner tweeted that Bush was 'a statesman and role model to me." Days later, Bush joined his son, former President George W. Bush, on the field before Game 5 of baseball's World Series to throw out the ceremonial first

Sessions denies lying on Russia, pleads hazy memory

WASHINGTON (AP) - Attorney General Jeff Sessions on Tuesday displayed a hazy memory of the Trump campaign's discussions about and dealings with Russians in the 2016 election, denying he ever lied to Congress about those contacts but blaming the chaos of the race for fogging his recollections.

During more than five hours of testimony to Congress, Sessions sought to explain away apparent contradictions in his earlier accounts by citing the exhausting nature of Donald Trump's upstart but surging bid for the White House. He also denied under repeated questioning from Democrats that he had been influenced by Trump.

But after saying under oath months ago that he was unaware of any relationship between the campaign and Russia. Sessions acknowledged for the first time that the arrest of a low-level campaign adviser reminded him after all of a meeting at which the aide, George Papadopoulos, proposed setting up a get-together be-tween Trump and Russian President Vladimir Putin.

After reading his account and to the best of my recollection," Sessions

told the House Judiciary Committee, "I believe that I wanted to make clear to him that he was not authorized to represent the campaign with the Russian government or any other foreign government for that matter.

But I did not recall this event, which occurred 18 months before my testimony of a few weeks ago," he added, "and I would gladly have reported it had I remembered it because I pushed back against his suggestion that I thought may have been improper."

Papadopoulos was arrested by the FBI and pleaded guilty last month to lying to authorities about his own foreign contacts during the campaign. That guilty plea came in a wide-rang-ing criminal investigation led by former FBI Director Robert Mueller, who as the Justice Department's special counsel is looking into whether the Trump campaign coordinated with Russia to sway the outcome of the 2016 presidential election and into whether the firing of James Comey as FBI director was an effort to obstruct

During the Trump campaign, Sessions, then an Alabama senator, led a campaign foreign policy advisory council on which Papadopolous served. The attorney general has struggled since January to move past questions about his own foreign contacts and about his knowledge of Russian outreach efforts during the election effort.

congressional hearing, Each including Tuesday's, has focused on Sessions' own recollections, and he recused himself in March from the Justice Department's investigation into election meddling after acknowledging two previously undisclosed encounters during the campaign with the Russian ambassador to the United

Questions for Sessions have only deepened since the guilty plea last month of Papadopoulos and recent statements to congressional investigators by another foreign policy adviser, Carter Page, who has said he alert-ed Sessions last year about a trip he planned to take to Russia during the campaign. Sessions insisted Tuesday that he did not recall that conversation with Page at all and appeared incredulous at times that he could be expected to remember the details of conversations from more than a year ago.

"In all of my testimony, I can only do my best to answer all of your questions as I understand them and to the best of my memory," Sessions told the House Judiciary Committee. "But I will not accept, and reject, accusations that I have ever lied. That

Sessions insisted that his story had never changed and that he had never been dishonest. But he also suggested to the committee that it was unfair to expect him to recall "who said what when"

during the campaign. "It was a brilliant campaign, I think, in many ways, but it was a form of chaos every day from day one," Sessions said. "We traveled some times to several places in one day. Sleep was in short supply and I was still a full-time senator ... with a very full schedule."

The oversight hearing divided

along stark partisan lines. Republicans, buoyed by the announcement a day earlier that the Justice Department might be open to a new special counsel to investigate an Obama-era business transaction that Trump himself has railed against, repeatedly challenged the under-pinnings of Mueller's investigation. Democrats grilled him on the evolving explanations about how much he knew of communication during the campaign between Trump associates and Russian government intermedi-

A day earlier, the Justice Department said Sessions had directed federal prosecutors to look into whether a special counsel might be merited to investigate allegations that the Clinton Foundation benefited from a uranium transaction involving a Russia-backed company during the Obama administration.

On Tuesday, Sessions said that any such review would be done without regard to political considerations.

"A president cannot improperly influence an investigation," Sessions said in response to questions from the committee's top Democrat, Rep. John Conyers of Michigan.

"And I have not been improperly influenced and would not be improperly influenced," he added. "The president speaks his mind. He's bold and direct about what he says, but people elected him. But we do our duty every day based on the law and the facts."

3 UCLA players face punishment at home after China incident

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Three UCLA basketball players detained in China on suspicion of shoplifting returned home, where they may be disciplined by the school as a result of the international scandal.

Freshmen LiAngelo Ball, Jalen Hill and Cody Riley arrived at Los Angeles International Airport late Tuesday afternoon after a 12-hour flight from Shanghai.

Pac-12 Commissioner Larry Scott said the matter "has been resolved to the satisfaction of the Chinese authorities."

The players were detained in Hangzhou for questioning following allegations of shoplifting last week before the 23rd-ranked Bruins beat Georgia Tech in their season-opening game in Shanghai as part of the Pac-12 China game. The rest of the UCLA team returned home last Saturday.

A person with knowledge of the Pac-12's decision said any discipline involving the trio would be up to UCLA. The person spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity because the conference doesn't plan any sanctions. UCLA Chancellor Gene Block

said the school is weighing its options.

"I want to be clear that we take seriously any violations of the law," he said in a statement. "In this particular case, both Athletics and the Office of Student Conduct will review this incident and guide any action with respect to the involved students. Such proceedings are confidential, which limits the specific information that can be shared."

There was no immediate word on the trio's status for the team's home opener Wednesday night against Central Arkansas.

The school said the three playalong with coach Steve Alford and athletic director Dan Guerrero, will make their first public comments about the matter at a campus news conference Wednesday, but won't take

questions. Scott thanked President Don-

ald Trump, the White House and the State Department for their efforts in resolving what he called "the incident with authorities in Hangzhou, China." He indicated that UCLA made "significant efforts" on behalf of its athletes.

It wasn't clear under what terms the players were freed to return to the

"We are all very pleased that these young men have been allowed to return home to their families and university," Scott said.

Trump said Tuesday he had a long conversation about the three players' status with Chinese counter-

part Xi Jinping.
Ball, Hill and Riley were expected to have an immediate impact as part of UCLA's highly touted recruiting class. Instead, they are being talked about solely for their actions off the

Ball, a guard whose brother Lonzo is a rookie for the Los Angeles Lakers, averaged 33.8 points as a high school senior. The elder Ball played one season in Westwood and left early for the NBA draft.

The Balls' outspoken father, La-Var, was in China at the time of the incident. He spent some time promoting the family's Big Baller Brand of athletic shoes with his youngest son, LaMe-

lo, while his middle son was detained. Forwards Hill and Riley, both four-star recruits, figure to bolster 7-foot senior Thomas Welsh in the

The Bruins traveled to China as part of the Pac-12's global initiative that seeks to popularize the league's athletic programs and universities overseas. The China Game is in its third year, and while the scandal was developing the league announced that California and Yale will play in next

The game is sponsored by Alibaba Group, the Chinese commerce giant that both UCLA and Georgia Tech visited before the shoplifting incident occurred.

Texans Seek Stability While Replacing Watson

Following an ACL tear that required season ending surgery, Houston Texans' rookie quarterback Deshuan Watson has left the team with a noticeable void.

According to the Houston Chronicle report, Watson tore the ACL in his right knee during a non-contact play at a Nov. 2 team practice.


Without Deshaun Watson, the Texans took another heavy loss this Sunday, this time the Los Angeles Rams took control, winning by the score of 33-7. Watson's replacement, QB Tom Savage, completed just below 50 percent of his passes, which is lower than Watson's 62 percent pass completion before his injury. The week prior to this Sunday, Savage completed less than 45 percent of his passes which played a huge factor in the Texans' loss to AFC South rivals, Indianapolis Colts by the score of 20-14.

The Houston Texans traded up from No. 25 to select Deshaun Watson with the No. 12 overall pick in the 2017 NFL Draft. Although he did not start right away, Watson's arrival to Houston was right on schedule. Watson got his official NFL debut in week one by relieving QB Tom Savage of his duties in the middle of a 29-7 lost to the Jacksonville Jaguars.

When Deshaun Watson was on the field, he improved the team's overall offensive efficiency. In only six full game starts, he completed 61.8 percent of his passes for 1,699 yards and 19 touchdowns. At this rate, Watson was on the path to breaking the single-season touchdown record (26) by a rookie QB, which is still being held by Peyton Manning.

What does this mean for the Texans?

The absence of Watson has taken a major hit on the city of Houston. What does this ultimately mean for the Houston Texans organization moving forward? It's sad and depressing to take into consideration that the city of Houston couldn't even enjoy a championship celebration for 24 hours without receiving some horrific news. This honestly does not look





Houston Astros Win First World Series in Franchise History

Woods announces return to golf

Garcia Relieved of Duties as Lady Panthers' Coach

Prairie View, Texas- On Monday, Nov. 6, Roger Abe Garcia was relieved of his duties as head soccer coach at Prairie View A&M University.

Coach Garcia served 10 seasons with the Lady Panthers before being let go the week following their first-round lost to TSU in the Southwestern Athletic Conference by the score of 1-0.

During Garcia's tenure at PVAMU, he led the Panthers to one NCAA Tournament appearance, two trips to the SWAC Tournament Championship match, and six trips to the semifinals as the Lady Panthers earned consecutive appearances in the SWAC postseason tournament.

Additionally, he coached players that earned 27 All-SWAC honors and 13 all-tournament team accolades.

The Lady Panthers were 6-9 overall and 6-2-2 in conference play this season. Often times when coaches are fired, it's typically because over the course of several years, they are not producing enough wins or championships.

The Lady Panthers will be without four seniors for their next season as the rest of the team will try to look past what has recently transpired.

Redshirt junior and team captain, Reina Cruz, took Coach Garcia's news extremely heavy.

"It's frustrating to realize that in thirty minutes an entire decade of his career is done," said Cruz. "I left work and I went straight to his office and I saw him packing and I knew then and there that it was real. He's really leaving. Garcia recruited me, so to watch him leave knowing that I still have one more year here is definitely a hard pill to swallow for me."

Cruz started in all 19 of Prairie View A&M's matches in 2015. Cruz played from start to finish in 14 of the Lady Panthers' 19 matches, which included two streaks of seven consecutive matches without needing a substitute and helped to anchor a defense that contributed to five shutout wins during the season. Cruz also played



1,600 minutes during the season, which ranked third among field players.

Due to a knee injury, Cruz missed all of the 2016 season.

"I understand that they were looking at Garcia's entire report since he's been here," said Cruz. "But at the same time, we had a very young team. Only four seniors [were on the team] ...which means Garcia was dealing with freshmen and sophomores. That's not easy for a coach to deal with, to say that we had a winning conference record this year. I just wish they would've given him inother chance, but now we'll never know."

Having a strong relationship with your players, as a coach, goes beyond the field of play. It's a bond that not even the absence of work can get rid of.

"I'll admit, my freshman year, me and Garcia didn't see eye to eye," said Cruz. "It was difficult to work with him because he was expecting me to play a certain way and at that time I hadn't developed the necessary skills to do so. I was young and transitioning from high school to [college]. He told me to go home, train and come back stronger and faster. It wasn't until my

sophomore year that we were able to talk strategically about soccer, but I believed in his message and I believed in his system."

The question as to who will be the next head coach for the Lady Pan-y thers soccer team is still unknown, but the connection and chemistry between Garcia and the Lady Panthers will carry on forever.

PVAMU Football defeats Pine-Bluff on Senior Day

Prairie View, Texas - Passion and pride were on the line as the Prairie View A&M University football team defeated Arkansas Pine-Bluff 35-12 Saturday, Nov. 11, at Panther Stadium. With over 8,000 fans in atten-

dance, the Panthers rallied to an outstanding victory over the Lions on Senior Day. The afternoon took off with several United States Army members parachuting into Panther Stadium in honor of Veterans Day.

On his last home game as a Panther, wide receiver Khadarel Hodge set a school-record of 232 receiving yards and three touchdowns to aid the Panthers in their victory. Hodge's receiving yards total broke one of PVAMU football's oldest records, as the single-game receiving yards mark had stood since 1964. Prairie View A&M Sports Hall of Famer and AFL great, Otis Taylor, had completed 198 receiving yards in a single game more than 50 years ago. Hodge's eight receptions and three touchdowns also tied his own career high.

Quarterback and redshirt freshman, Neiko Hollins threw for 410 yards and four touchdowns in his second full start of the season.

The Panthers racked up a season-high of 610 yards, including the second straight 100-yard rushing game for running back Sta Fon McCray (14-115-1).

Offensive lineman Shawn Pierce scored the first touchdown of the game for the Panthers off a 4-yard pass from Neiko Hollins with 9:41 remaining in the first quarter. The Panthers





final scoring play of the first quarter was a result of a 70-yard bomb from Hollins to Hodge midway through the quarter.

"I thought our team played well for a majority of the game," said head coach Willie Simmons. "As a coaching staff, we pride our guys on playing all phases of a football game and we were able to execute that game plan. Guys stepped up with some great in-dividual efforts. Neiko threw for more than 400 yards today. Khadarel broke the single-game record for receiving yards. Sta'Fon had another 100-yard rushing game, and would have had more without some untimely penalties. I give major credit to the defense because they were able to keep Pine-Bluff from scoring for a majority of the game. I tip my hat to those guys. They gave great effort, and had great attention to detail this week. It was about time to put one of these type of games together."

After a pair of field-goals by the

Lions, Sta Fon McCray sealed a 64yard drive with a 9-yard touchdown to give the Panthers a 21-6 lead with 2:19 to go before halftime.

On their second drive of the third quarter, the Panthers went seven plays for 73 yards, capped off by a 17-yard touchdown reception from Hodge to extend the Panthers lead 28-6. The Panthers final 35-12 score came late in the fourth quarter when Hodge ran for 88 yards into Panther history from the Panthers' eight-yard line.




Arrow

Big K.R.I.T 4eva Is A Mighty Long Time

Forever is in fact a mighty long time and it seems like that's how long it has taken Justin Scott, better known as Big K.R.I.T, to get his just due in the rap game. K.R.I.T's previous album, Cadillactica, was an expansive trek through the art of trunk-rattling, a field of play in which he's long established himself as an expert. With that same energy, he has created 4eva Is A Mighty Long Time, his third studio album with a major label and his latest entry in an exhaustive lineup of projects.

On 4eva, K.R.I.T doesn't stray too far from his usual formula, production wise. Ever present is his ear for melody, his ability to flip to samples like a light switch, and most important, his unconditional love for low-end frequencies.

K.R.I.T provides the album's first banger in the form of the rowdy "Big Bank". Rhyming over a frenetic chop-up of Willie Hutch's "Tell Me Why Our Love Has Turned Cold", he enlists the manpower of fellow veteran, T.I., who piggybacks his energy and informs the listener on who the real "Kings of the South" are.

A running theme throughout K.R.I.T's music is his personification of the subwoofer, the axis on which his aesthetic revolves. "Trunk knocking when I drive, my sub came alive/ Transformer in my ride, my sub came alive/...They saying bass died, my sub came alive," he chants on the hook of the album's fourth track, "Subenstein (My Sub IV)". Produced by Mannie Fresh, in reference to the classic story

of Frankenstein, K.R.I.T assumes the role of the mad genius himself; creating a monstrous sound that sets the tone for the remainder of the project's sonic landscape.

On "Get Away", listeners may find them-selves checking off the boxes for what makes up the typical K.R.I.T song, but there's a certain facet he possesses that allows him to take a would be cookie-cutter southern banger into a whole other space. Much of the track's sentimentality is driven by a sample provided via Bettye Crutcher's "Sleepy People", which he then uses to facilitate the songs themes of inspiration and achievement. "Get Away" embodies much K.R.I.T's ethos; the juggling of right and wrong, secular and spiritual, and finally, the overcoming of whatever's holding you back. Providing a chorus in vein of Three 6 Mafia's early 2000's outputs, K.R.I.T. repeats "I got to get away from that bullsh-t that they on/ everybody, everybody, get your glow on." He then adds to the monologue in the songs first verse, rapping "Put my faith in God even when it's dark, I won't stop/ Flip them high beams on, hit the gas to the top.

Though songs like "Get Away" and "Subenstein (My Sub IV)" display the best of K.R.I.T's efforts, there's a gift and a curse he possesses that has presented itself throughout his career and most evidently on 4eva. While consistency is a trait sought after by young rappers who are trying find their way beyond early success, K.R.I.T. has been at this rap thing for a while now and knows the ropes. Through his provision of consistently well-received projects, he has gained an impressive following, yet it seems like his support is beginning to plateau. There's a pocket through which K.R.I.T moves most fluid, but when he steps out of that zone, the results are hit or miss. Fans have come to expect a certain sound from him and he seldom strays from producing that sound.

He steps out of his box on tracks like "Everlasting", which finds him laying down pick-up lines on a girl he likes. Rhyming over an instrumental that brings to mind Prince's "The Ballad of Dorothy Parker", he demonstrates to the listener his unique form of storytelling. On efforts like "Miss Georgia Fornia" and "1999" is where things go a little flat. On these tracks, K.R.I.T.'s verses are strong but are supported by weak choruses that in turn lead to them both having an awkward song structure. These are just a few hiccups in an otherwise solid album top-to-bottom. In my book, 4eva Is A Mighty Long Time gets a 7/10.






She has scored exceptionally high on the MCAT, and tutors the biological sciences at the student library.

Students fail to turn tide in Waller County Jail Bond election

The decision on whether or not to build a proposed jail in Waller County rested in the hands of Prairie View A&M students and the neighboring communities that will be affected by its construction.

Before Nov. 7, 2017, election day, various organizations on campus rallied with fliers, social media blasts and word of mouth to spread awareness for the Jail Bond voting.

It is very important to stay involved with what is happening in the county's activities and Prairie View A&M took the first steps to voicing their opinion. However, when it came down to the number of people who voted against the bond versus the people who voted for the bond, the outcome was disproportionate.

Only about 2,400 people participated in early and election day voting. 62 percent of votes were in favor of the \$39.5 million bond. In result, the jail will receive funding to be built.

This win comes mostly from early and absentee voters.

This election year, students were

divided by precinct. Several students were able to vote on campus based on their designated precinct. While others had to make arrangements to vote at City Hall. Additionally, the limited availability of transportation that was set to take students to and from Prairie View's city hall provided a challenge for some, but a lucky few were able to go cast their vote.


Also, the disproportionality of the voting possibly occurred because many people felt that their vote wouldn't mean anything. However, in the past, we've seen how close polls can be and that everyone's voice mat-

According to Denise Mattox. from the Waller County Democratic Club, Prairie View A&M University had the highest number of ballots cast on election day.

"To me, this indicates that hav-

ing the PVAMU campus early voting polling place stripped from the cam-pus really suppressed the student vote. To my present and historical understanding, this was and remains cheating," said Mattox.

That is why the polls' outcome was not what people expected, as they casted their votes for something that belittles the African American community. For instance, Democrat Waller County judge candidate Sylvia Cedillo has attempted to win the votes of Prairie View students. When asked about her thoughts on the Waller County Jail Bond, she thought it would create



great job opportunities.

Cedillo's thoughts on the bond shows how some candidates in Waller County do not understand the message they're putting out into the community. Building a jail in Hempstead near a university creates a literal schoolto-prison pipeline. African Americans

in this area are more likely to fill this jail than their white-counterparts. Again, making residents question how the bond could've gotten voted for in the first place.

Certain districts in the county voted more than others in the community. Precinct 309 had the highest amount of votes, which was 271 votes. Coincidentally, this happens to be the precinct from which students on campus casted their ballots. Having this kind of turnout by students alone has shown the community that they care about what happens here in Waller
