

Over the past two years, I have received several packets of information of the type enclosed from Mr. Rutledge. His family and the community of "Green Bay" near Palestine, Texas have a long connection with Prairie View A&M and deep roots in the cultural history of Blacks in East Texas. Because I share his interest in preserving that history and the racial pride it engenders, I have encouraged him to share these with me; but I believe there should be a more substantive relationship developed with such persons and communities in order to move some of their original artifacts of that history to our library archives.

Mr. Rutledge is an exceptional person, without a doubt. But there are many others around the state who could be encouraged to generate such materials as we would be interested in collecting. I hope that you will contact him, and encourage him to work directly with our library to place some of his materials in a "living and growing" exhibit. His example could then be used to encourage others to contribute from their communities.
