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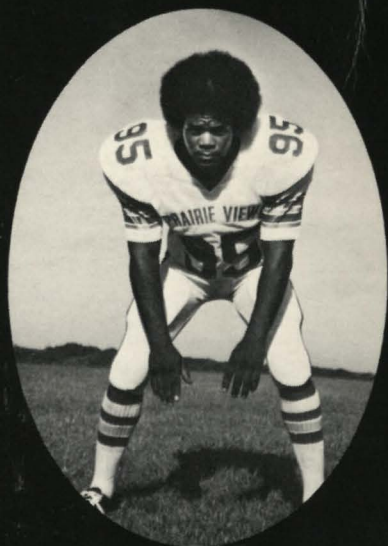

Media Credentials

All requests must be made in writing to the Sports Information Office. These requests should be made prior to the season if you plan to staff all home games. Weekly requests should be made one week in advance of the home game to be worked. Seats will be assigned along media row by request only.

RADIO NETWORKS: Visiting Radio Stations must make requests at least one week prior to playing Prairie View.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Photo passes must be requested by the Sports Editor or Sports Director of a media outlet.

COACHES AND NON-WORKING PRESS: Coaches who are to scout PV games are asked to request press box two weeks in advance of the game. Because of lack of space, priority in the press box will be given to the coach whose team plays PVU next. All other non-working people are asked to take seats elsewhere.

SERVICES: Halftime, and final statistics, lineups and play-by-play will be passed out. Telecopier is available before and after game. Coaches interviews are desired. Soft drinks are served, also.

There is a strong bond between the president and the athletic department. He has always treated it most generously, rewarding them according to merit, even during the less successful season.

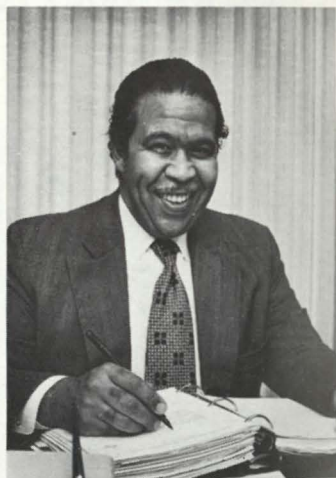
He has been President at Prairie View since November, 1966.

PRAIRIE VIEW: SERVING TEXAS AT THE POINT OF ITS GREATEST NEED

Ninety-nine years is a long span in the life of man or an institution. What do the years mean? For man or institution, if they are filled with the honest sweat of service to humanity — with the patient following of that higher law of unflinching fidelity to the dictates of a calling — the years are a benediction.

Prairie View is an institution — a public institution. But an institution is an empty thing without the beating hearts and yearning souls of mortal men. And down the ninety-nine years of Prairie View's existence, men have lived and dreamed here until every blade of grass and every rock, in that wise primordial way in which the primitive earth knows and cares, has joined the choir invisible to bless their memory. For every man whose foot has touched this hallowed soil has found a spirit, and has broadened and deepened it until what started out as an ambitionless meandering stream has become a purposeful river upon whose tide, now turbulent, now tranquil, floats the destiny of countless human hopes and dreams.

The spirit of an institution is the compound of many things — a strange and often quixotic amalgam of unrelated, sometimes contradictory, elements. Founded, symbolically, upon the ruins of a slave plantation, this college was authorized in the spirit of fair play of the constitutional convention of 1876 where wisdom would not allow vengeance to triumph over justice. The men of the parent school at College Station, growing ever wiser with the years, have translated that sense of justice into ever-broadening channels. The humble student, from every nook and cranny in the land, has left the echo of his laughter upon the wind, his hopes within the lurking shadows of our halls and by-ways. The giants, the world-shakers, have stood on our hill to mingle their search for truth with the fledgling's hopes for life. And men of dedication have worked here — worked to bring a new heaven and a new earth often with only faith and their hands — often without the spiritual or material compensation that sacrifices merited — but always with a sense of mission — with sense that somehow, someday, time would reward their efforts — would give to those to whom they had given their minds the victory of a new world — of an enlightened society.

Could we do better at the end of this ninety-nine years than pay homage to this amalgam, this spirit? Can we do less than dedicate our lives to task of fostering it, nurturing it, stimulating it — that those who will walk this ground, these halls, will know, and be better men because of it?

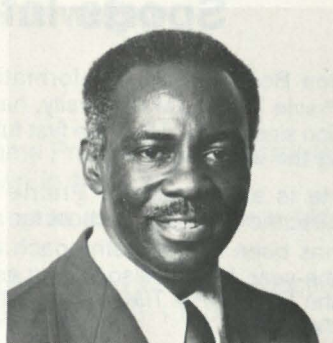


ATHLETIC COUNCIL

HEAD FOOTBALL COACH ATHLETIC DIRECTOR Hoover J. Wright

Hoover J. Wright, a native of Maryland, became Prairie View's fourth head football coach since Billy Nicks stepped down in 1965.

Wright, a 1948 graduate of Maryland State, came to Prairie View in 1961 as an assistant football coach to Billy Nicks.

When Billy Nicks stepped down in 1965, Nicks named Wright to succeed him, and in his first season (1966) Wright posted a 5-3-1 record.

In 1968, Wright stepped down from football to devote more time to track, of which he has been head coach since 1961. He was a member of the 1972 Olympics coaching staff and is currently President of the NAIA Track Coaches Association. In track, he has been named NAIA and SWAC coach of the year and has coached the Panther track teams to four national and two SWAC titles. He was inducted into the NAIA Track Coaches Hall of Fame in May of 1976.

In 1973, then Panther head football coach T. Danzy, was stricken with a heart attack and Wright was asked to serve the year out.

Wright will direct the 1976 Panther team and bring a 11-year head football coaching record (6 at PV) of 46-55-2 with him.

Wright was born in Hebron, Maryland and graduated from F.D. St. Clair High School in Cambridge, Maryland, where he was a member of the soccer team, captain of the basketball team and a star sprinter in track.

He attended college at Maryland State (now Marland Eastern Shore) where he was a star halfback on the 1947 undefeated team. He was basketball captain as a junior and senior, outfielder in baseball and sprinter in track.

He received the Master of Education degree from Penn State in 1951, with emphasis on Physical Education. He has done advanced study at the University of Iowa, North Texas State.

After several years of playing semi-pro basketball, working with Boy Scout troops and attending graduate school, Wright began coaching college athletics at Shorter College at North Little Rock, Arkansas in 1951. He was an instructor of physical education, football coach, men and women's basketball and track coach.

In 1952, he went to Paul Quinn in Waco, where he later became head coach and won championships in every major sport.

In 1961, he came to Prairie View as an assistant to Billy Nicks.

Wright was married in 1951, to Miss Eloise McCreary of Waco, Texas. They have three daughters and one son.



CLIFTON GILLIARD

Backfield

Cliff joined the Panther staff in July, 1974. He came to PV from Galena Park High School in Galena Park, Texas.

He is a former PV All-SWAC halfback on the Panther 1958 National Championship team. He lettered three years at PV.

Cliff was a standout high school athlete at Fidelity Manor where he lettered in football, basketball and track. He began coaching at Fidelity in 1960. In 1970 he went to Galena Park as an assistant.

JOHN TANKERSLEY

Line Coach

Tankersley joined the PV staff in January, 1974. He came to PV from Wiley College in Marshall, Texas. He previously coached at PV from 1970-72.

He is a former all around athlete from Booker T. Washington High School in Dallas, Texas. He was an All-American tackle at Wiley College.

He has coached at Worthing High in Houston, Yates (Houston) and Booker T. Washington (Houston).

He coached PV to the N.A.I.A. zone title in baseball in 1969, '70, '74, and '75. His team won the district in 1970. His 1975 team was second in SWAC in hitting.



CORNELIUS COOPER

Line Coach

Cooper joined the Panther staff in July, 1974. He came to PV from Jefferson County High School in Monticello, Florida.

He is a former PV All-SWAC performer and was drafted by the Miami Dolphins in 1969.

He coached at Jefferson County High four years where from 1971-73 his team won 33 games and lost 2. They won the Florida Crown title in 1971-73 and the class 2A state in 1972.





JESSE H. HURST

Assistant Coach & Scout

Hurst joined the Panther staff in September, 1974. He is a former Oklahoma State standout football and baseball star, where he graduated in 1963. He is a native of Houston, Texas, and attended Jack Yates High School, where he played football and baseball, making all-city in both sports. He played Army football and baseball, also.

ROBERT KINNEY

Assistant Coach • Defensive Line

Kinney came to Prairie View with Coach Hillyer's staff in 1971, and has a variety of experience. He is a graduate of Lanier High School in Jackson, Mississippi, where he was an all-round athlete. Kinney attended college at Wiley in Marshall, Texas. At Wiley he was a mainstay tackle for the late legendary "Pop" Long. His senior year he was named to the *Pittsburgh Courier* All-American team.

After graduating from Wiley in 1965, he signed with the Kansas City Chiefs. He returned to Wiley in 1965 and joined the staff as head defensive coach, golf coach and Dean of the Athletic Dormitory. In 1966, he served as assistant football coach and head golf coach. When Wiley dropped football, Kinney went to Arkansas A.M.&N. at Pine Bluff as assistant defensive coach and remained until coming to Prairie View.



J. C. WILLIAMS

Assistant Coach

Williams came to PV in 1972 as an assistant. He was a two-time All-SWAC linebacker at Alcorn, where he graduated in 1967.

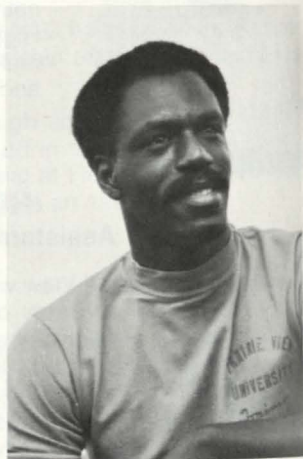
He attended high school in Ruleville, Mississippi, where he was All-Big 8 in football three years, and two years in basketball. He captained Alcorn's 1966-67 team and was voted the Best Defensive player in his senior year.

He served as assistant coach at Rosa Temple, in Vicksburg, Mississippi, from 1967 to 1971, where the team went 40-0-2. In 1971, he went to South Vicksburg High, where the team went 7-3.

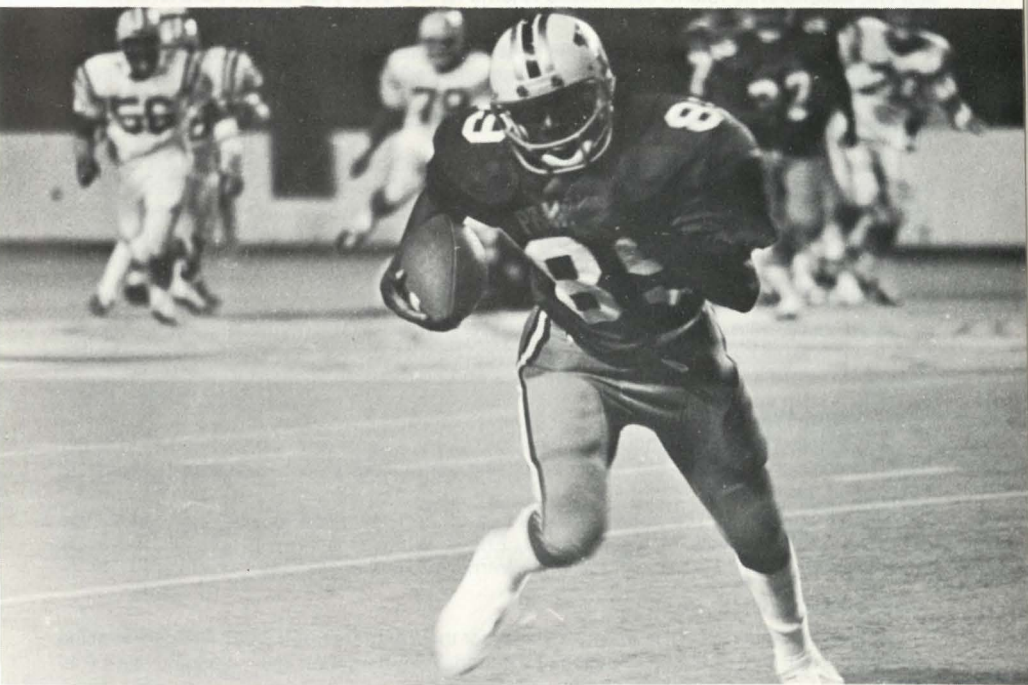

THE OFFENSIVE

THE OVERALL ANALYSIS —

The Panthers will feature a potent offensive attack in 1976. The entire starting offensive first and second units return. Sam Maxie returns for the third year as the Panthers starting quarterback.

The running attack will be one of the best in the nation. The offense is experienced and boasts depth. There isn't much depth at the receiver positions, but the Panthers are strong in starters.

THE RUNNERS —

The center of attention in the Panther backfield will be fullback David Bohannon (6-2-245). Douglas Bolden (6-2-195), Charles Weatherspoon (5-9-175), Charlie Smith (5-11-235) and George Whiteside compliments Bohannon. Last season the Panther backfield rushed for 1798 yards and 199.0 game average. Charlie Smith has the potential of being one of the top backs in the conference.

THE QUARTERBACKS —

Sam Maxie is the old vet among signals callers. The 6-2, 185 pound senior prefers to run then throw and his 289 yards rushing was second best on the team. Maxie has some capable competition in junior southpaw Darly Wingate and sophomore Richard Warefield.

THE RECEIVERS —

The Panther receivers should be their formidable offensive weapon. In addition to experience throughout, there are some promising youngsters who can demonstrate speed, moves and good hands.

Wayland Gay, a 6-0, 180 pound junior is one of the finest wide receivers in college. The swift Gay has the knack of getting open. Ernest Burke is a proven tightend. Develous Weatherspoon is Burke's understudy while Vernon Rollins spells Gay.

THE RECEIVERS —

Devous Weatherspoon, who was a starter for the Panthers three years ago prior to going to the army, will give Burke competition at tightend. Weatherspoon is 6-2-235 and has 4.6 40 speed.

THE LINE —

Experience is probably necessary more in this area than almost anywhere else on a football team. However, the Panthers are fortunate to be strong in this area. Greg Austin, (256), James Cole (240), Charles Baity (260) Ellery Stevenson (250), Marlon Seale (260) and Terry Knighton (220), make up the nucleus of the line.

THE KICKERS —

Richard Warfield will handle most of the Panther kicking chores.

THE DEFENSE

THE OVERALL ANALYSIS —

The Panthers defense is always a force to reckoned with. The entire first and second units return on defense.

THE FRONT FIVE —

As the old saying goes — It's up front what counts. The Panthers appear to have what it takes up front. Richard Bennet, who had a sensational freshman season is back to hound the enemy ballcarriers and quarterbacks. Bennett, the Panthers "Bounty Hunter," was All American last season. Ed Williams, John Hunt, Tommy Coleman, Darrell Sammons and Ken Austin, are returning vets.

THE LINEBACKERS —

This is the area in which the Panthers possibly could be as strong as any school in the nation.

All American Ron Thompson anchors the middle of the group of experienced, hard nosed players who thrive on contact and pursuit. Thompson led the team with 140 tackles. Clifford Shaw, the Iron man led the SWAC with 7 quarterback sacks. He was second on the team with 100 tackles. Jessie Horace, is another head hunter. Horace had 88 tackles. Some promising youngsters will add depth.

THE SECONDARY —

Adrain Thomas is one of the best since former Panther Tommy Williams, who played on the Panthers 1958 National Championship team. Thomas led the team with 5 interceptions, he also had 75 tackles.

Clarence Farmer, has the tools to be great. He had two interceptions last year. He made 78 tackles. Ken Hill is becoming a real fine one. Captain Haven Young controls things in the secondary. James Cowan will make the secondary stronger.

Healthy Folks Should Keep ETSU on Top

With four players from East Texas State going in the professional football draft you know the Lions have got to be searching for these replacements for the 1976 season.

ET head coach Ernest Hawkins knew what was ahead of him as the year and fourth (6-3) in the Lone Star Conference.

"We've got to have a very good recruiting year if we expect to compete in 1976. We've got a lot of people to replace," Hawkins said after the 1975 season.

Those heading for the professional wars from ET include Aundra "Boomer" Thompson, tailback, drafted fifth round by Green Bay; Tim Collier, defensive back, drafted ninth round by Kansas City; Larry Bell, offensive tackle, drafted 12th round by Houston; and Bill Carroll, wide receiver, drafted by Pittsburgh in the 12th round.

All told, there are five starters gone from the offensive line and five missing from defense.

"I feel like we have recruited well enough to have a competitive team this upcoming season," Hawkins said. "Of course, there is really no way to tell until we get them into pads, and we won't see that until this fall.

"We've got some good ones here, now we have to wait and see if they'll produce."

Thompson, the LSC's single-season rushing record holder, is gone, but Hawkins believes his backfield will be in good shape to '76.

Calvin Washington, a runner that the coaches are expecting to do the job and maybe a little bit more, will be stepping into tailback position.

1976 OUTLOOK

Under head coach Robert Hill, it has become a tradition for Jackson State to have a corps of good running backs. The 1976 season will be no different with the ball-toting backs looking as fast as ever.

All-American Ricky Patton (he led the Southwestern Athletic Conference in rushing last year with 800 yards) will be entering his junior season. The 180-pounder had touchdown runs of 75 and 64 yards last season, the longest TD runs by an offensive back since Hill took over the reins of the Tigers in 1971. Supporting Patton will be six other backs with above average skills and abilities. They are: Melvin Moncrief, Charles Wilson, Jeffrey Moore, Arthur Phillips, Larry McGee, and incoming freshman Leopold Gentry.

But, if the Tigers are to duplicate or better their 7-3 record of a year ago, Hill and his staff will have to adequately mend their offensive line which was ripped by graduation. Gone are Jackie Slater (OG), and Mac Miley (OT), two All-Conference performers. Louis Bullard, a mammoth offensive tackle (6'7"-260), who started the last half of last season, is expected to anchor the line. Willie Collins (OG), James Redd (OT), Jerry Andrews, a center converted to tackle, and Dale Knight (C) are expected to pave the way for J-State's arsenal of runners.

For the past two seasons, receivers have been sub-par for the Tigers. Leon Sherrod, Larry Hardy, Larry Franklin, Robert Willis, Glen Wadley and super recruit Terrence Shirley just might spring some surprises on opponent secondaries.

It has been a long time since the glory days of Southern University football under the famed A. W. Mumford from the late 1930's through the early '60's.

Oh, Mumford had some great teams, three national championship squads, three consecutive years, 1948-49-50. The legendary coach also won six Southwestern Athletic Conference titles and three co-titles.

However, a young coach by the name of Charles Bates, the present Southern mentor going into his fifth season, is bringing that national prominence back to the Baton Rouge campus. Bates inherited a losing team in 1972 and has since then improved his record each year. The 1975 season was his best with a 9-3 mark and a 15-12 win over South Carolina State in the Pelican Bowl, putting the Jaguars in the national limelight.

In the past four years, Bates has gone from 2-7-1 in 1972, 6-4 in 1973, 8-3 in 1974 and of course that great 1975 season. 1976 OUTLOOK

Legendary Eddie Robinson will enter his 35th season at Grambling State University this fall, and a monumental task faces him and his staff as they prepare to restructure a dynasty that has compiled a 246-82-11 record, one of the most imposing in college football.

Robby's Tigers rolled to a 10-1 record last season and were voted national championships in black college football ranks. Twenty-one seniors were graduated off the 1975 squad and among that number are eight gridders who received All-American recognition. Seven starters are gone from the offensive unit and six are lost from the defensive side of the ledger.

Among the dearly departed are some of the most declared names in Grambling's storied history. They include James Hunter, Sammie White, Dwight Scales, Robert Pennywell, Mike St. Clair and punter Keith Smyre. Several of the returnees, however, inspire comfort to the Tiger brain trust.

Among the key returnees are quarterback Douglas Williams, running back Cliff Martin, hard-nose guard James Robertson, wide receiver Carlos Pennywell and defensive pillar Antoine Edwards.

Williams marshals the Grambling attack. The 6-foot, 214 pound signal caller is moving into his junior season at Tigertown. In two years he has conjured up fond memories of former Tiger quarterbacks James Harris and Matt Reed. Last year Williams passed for a state record 23 touchdowns on 107 completions for 1,959 yards. More comforting to Tiger loyalists is the fact that Grambling has won 17 of 18 games in which Williams started at quarterback.

SWT OUTLOOK

Sophomore quarterback Luie Reyes, a strong-armed sophomore who didn't even letter last season, probably holds the key to Southwest Texas State's 1976 football fortunes.

Reyes, a 6-1, 172-pounder from San Diego, Tex., apparently has the potential to put some air might in a Bobcat attack that relied almost entirely on the rush last season — and still finished 7-3-0 third in the rugged Long Star Conference. In fact SWT set a school rushing record with 2,906 yards.

The main ingredients in that potent offensive rushing attack are among the 23 lettermen in coach Bill Miller's arsenal. Keven Jurgajtis and Jessie Davis rushed for more than 1,400 yards last year as sophomores and they'll be lined in SWT's Straight T backfield by sophomore speedster Paul Darby. All three backs will be in the 200-pound range.

The crop of lettermen includes seven defensive and six offensive starters. Other than Jurgajtis and Davis on offense, the returnees are ends Mike Merritt (a 6-7, 230-pounder) and Randy Knox and guard Craig Dunlavy. Transfer tackle Charlie Collins and Dunlavy are potential all-conference performers.

Paul Phillips, a 6-4, 221-pound senior linebacker, is the leader of what has traditionally been a salty SWT defensive unit. Phillips was an Academic All-American as a sophomore and is ready to make a bid for a job in the pros. Phillips, along with Collins, will captain this year's team.

Other defensive starters back are end Glenn Gundy, tackle Henry Holloman, linebacker Alan Bruns and backs Darrell Johnson, Leroy Bailey and Leon Savage. Johnson was one of the LSC's outstanding freshmen last year and Savage gained the reputation of kick blocker deluxe after knocking down two punts and two field goals last fall. Sophomore Keith Frase will probably be the other defensive starter in the secondary. He intercepted three passes last year as a rookie. Transfer Charles Mooney (Baylor and Blinn JC) could grab the strong safety spot.

The University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff's football program has undergone a big change since last season. The success or failure of the Golden Lions 1976 campaign is now in the hands of James E. Shaw and his four assistant coaches.

Shaw, a former assistant coach at Southern University in Baton Rouge, LA, took over the head coaching job in January and since that time has assembled a staff with a thorough football background.

Offensive linemen returning with experience are James Blakely, Orlando Gurnell, Darrell Beasley, Van Beasley, Glenn Stewart and Vic Mosely.

With Ken Smith, William Smith and Capp Burnett handling the receiving chores, the Golden Lions appear to be in fair shape, according to Shaw. Smith, a 6-2, 187-pound senior from Little Rock, AR, has been UAPB's top receiver for the past two seasons.

"We feel extremely good in this area," said Shaw. "All three have fine speed along with Ronald McCall, a freshman."

Burnett, a 6-3, 200-pound sophomore, played flanker last season. He was moved to tight end during the spring and responded well, Shaw said.

Prairie View Says "No" to Grambling

Dr. Marion Henry, athletic director at Prairie View A&M University, says the school will not reschedule its football game with Grambling State University.

Grambling honored a contract with Oregon State University Oct. 4 instead of playing its regularly scheduled Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) game with Prairie View on the same date in Dallas. Grambling sought to have the contest rescheduled for Saturday.

"If we played Saturday, we would be playing again Wednesday night" (when the Panthers meet Texas Southern University in a SWAC game in the Astrodome), Henry said Thursday.

"We would have been playing three games within 11 days and we would never agree to that." Grambling listed Prairie View as its Nov. 22 foe, but never asked Prairie View if they would play on that date. "If they had asked us we would have told them no. We had an official game Oct. 4 and they failed to honor it," said Henry.

The original mixup came when coach Eddie Robinson of Grambling signed the Oregon State contract. Grambling President Ralph Waldo Emerson Jones, unaware of the prior contract, signed the contract with Prairie View, a Grambling spokesman said.

PV 3, Texas Lutheran 28

The Prairie View Panthers put forth a good effort on fullback David Bohannon's 84 yards, but fell to Texas Lutheran 28-3.

Texas Lutheran scored on its first possession with 14:08 in the first quarter on a 58 yard keeper by quarterback Mike Washington. It took TL only 3 plays on 72 yards on the drive. It was the only scoring in the first quarter.

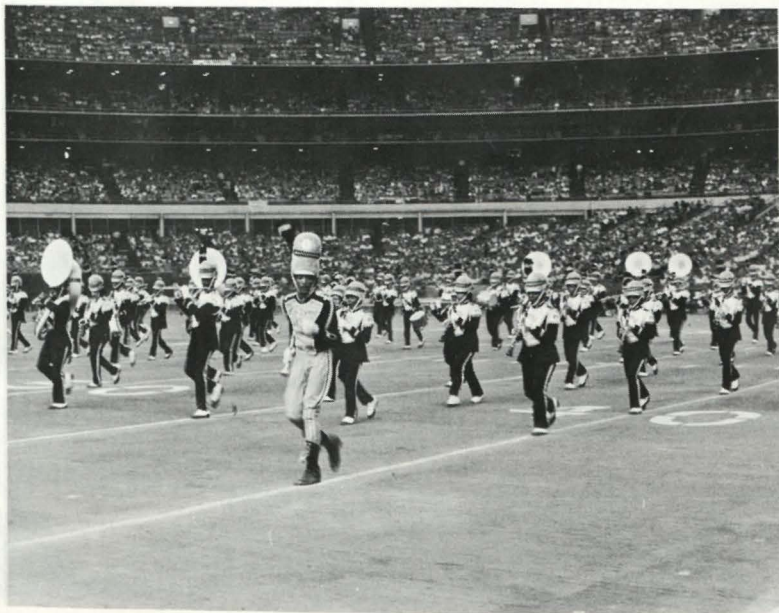
Prairie View A&M University Marching Band has received an invitation to participate in the 1976 New Orleans Mardi Gras Parade.

Mr. Hebert received his BA degree here at PV in 1964 and the Masters of Music degree at the University of Houston in 1971. Other staff members include: Dr. Lucius Wyatt, Upper-Brass; Dr. Aaron Home, Upper-Woodwinds; and Larry Jones, Percussion. Ms. Margaret Sherrod will be the guiding force behind the celebrated "Foxes."

The band will consist of one hundred-thirty exciting, enthusiastic members and expects a great season of performances. This year there is a possibility of financial aid to marching band members who meet certain pre-prescribed qualifications. Details can be furnished by the Director of the Marching Band. HISTORY OF THE SOUTHWESTERN ATHLETIC CONFERENCE

One Sunday morning in September of 1920, representatives from Bishop, Wiley, Samuel Huston, Paul Quinn and Prairie View colleges, known collectively as the "Big Five," met in Houston at the Old Oriental Hotel on San Felipe street and before the meeting was adjourned, they had founded the Southwestern Athletic Conference.

The purpose of the conference at that time was to coordinate the intercollegiate athletic activities (football and baseball) of the five colleges. In 1922 Texas College joined the conference and basketball was recognized as an official conference sport.

Later track, tennis and golf were added to the list. Langston, Southern and Arkansas joined the loop in the 1930's.

In the beginning, except for Prairie View, the members of the conference had been church affiliated schools. By the early fifties, the rising expense of college athletic programs plus the cost of staying competitive with state supported institutions caused a change in the conference membership pattern.

Bishop, Samuel Huston and Paul Quinn dropped out of the conference to be replaced by TSU in 1956 and Jackson State and Grambling in 1958 and 1959 respectively. Langston ended its affiliation midway in the decade.

Texas College discontinued football following the 1960 campaign and was replaced by Alcorn A&M. By now, Wiley, one of the original charter members, was the only remaining church school and the Wildcats departed in 1967. Mississippi Valley was the replacement.

In 1970, Arkansas joined the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference and the number eight SWAC team has yet to be replaced. SWAC has seven members with Prairie View the only school left of the original group. Southern, gaining admittance in the thirties, is the second oldest member with TSU, Jackson, Grambling, Alcorn and Mississippi Valley following in that order.

In June, 1972 the conference took a major administrative move when the Council of Presidents selected Andrew Brown, then administrative assistant and director of personnel in the department of athletics at Sanford University, as Commissioner of the 51 year old organization.

The Southwestern Athletic Conference ranks as one of the top collegiate conferences in the nation in its output of outstanding athletics in football, basketball, track and baseball. Its production of pro athletes in football, basketball and baseball is well-known.
