Councilman Report

In order to negotiate the representatives of the water syetems and to learn the critical details of the issues which confronted us, we adopted a flexible approach so that we could shift gears or change our course, always keeping in mind our major purpose for negotiating.

The major purpose of this special committee is to negotiate some understandings, commitments and procedures which will lead to honorable agreements between the owners of the water systems and the City of Prairie View in regard to an orderly transferring of the control and management of the systems from the owners to the City of Prairie View.

On Tuesday, January 8, 1974 at 7:30 p.m., the Special Committee met with representatives of the South Campus Water Users Association at the City Hall, These representatives were: Dr. T. P. Dooley, Mr. Luther Francis, Mr. F. G. Fry, Mr. J. C. Williams and Mr. C. L. Wilson.

The following understandings were established:

The South Campus Water Users Association is at present operating under the terms of the agreement made with the Board of Directors of the Texas A&M University System which states that water can be delivered through the lines of the parties who own the systems.

The representatives of the South Campus Water Users Association wish to continue to operate under the agreement until an orderly transfer of the control and manage ment of the system is arranged between the owners and

the City.

The representatives are willing to enter into a formal. agreement for bringing about this transfer, provided that the City makes an acceptable offer to the owners.

On Tuesday, January 15, 1974 at 7:30 p.m., the Committee met with representatives of the Hill Crest Water Users Association at the City Hall. These representatives were Dr. J. L. Brown and Mr. J. L. Hill.

The following understandings were established:

The Hill Crest Water Users Association is at present operating under the contract it has with the Alta Vista Utilities System. The representatives feel that although the City is operating the Alta Vista Utilities, the contract under which they operate is valid. Hence, they wish to continue to operate under their contract until the City acquires the Hill Crest facilities through purchase.

The representatives agree to pay the water bills that are due the City, provided that the citation ordering Mr. J. L. Hill to appear before a court is rescinded.

The representatives agree to negotiate a price for selling their system to the City.

The Special Committee offers this report to the City Council of Prairie View for comments, recommendations and action.
