Prairie View A Cappella Concert Choir Sustains A Brilliant Reputation

Standing Ovations in Four Cities in the Sixth National Tour by Miss Lillian Hodge and Velma Ervin

The Golden West and many points between were invaded by the well known Prairie View A Cappella Concert Choir February 20-March 7, 1965. Wearing collegiate apparel inclusive of their beloved black and gray sweaters that have "A Cappella Choir" mirroring across the back and keyed to the peak of training they stood ready as Dr. H. Edison Anderson, Director, gave the signal for the traditional ceremony. Mr. Alfred L. Earle, President of the choir, conducted the Alma Mater in front of the Administration Building, and the choir members hade adieu to friends, parents, and well wishers among whom were Mrs. Gloria C. Anderson, Dr. R. von Charlton, Head of Department of Music, and our devoted and untiring President, Dr. E. B. Evans who spurred us on as he has many times with words of en-couragement that never fall short of a worth while objective.

Exiting the first East entrance of our busy campus, with our emblem printed on our chartered bus, rocket V-549, a personnel of 39, chaperoned and tutored by Miss Kathryn N. Jordan, with our siren blowing, we re-entered and rode around the campus square one time and headed into a massive network of highways.

The smash hit program arrangement of terrace dynamics paid off in audience enthusiasm and appeal that was noted in standing ovation in: Roswell, New Mexico, the well watered garden cities of San Diego, Los Angeles, San Francisco, California, where the audience thundered in applause.

Snow and ice was on the ground at Roswell, New Mexico. As we were making a hurried exit, amid standing applause, a nordic patron, the mother of four daughters offered her fabulous three story home to the Choir in case the icy mountain roads would become impassable. Dr. Anderson graciously thanked her. The audience had previously heard him quoting his famous objective rhyme, "Rain or shine, sleet or snow, the A Cappella Concert Choir will go!" The choir faced up to that unforgettable experience, rode into the night in their warm charter and slept through the slippery climb and icy blasts of the Sacramento mountain range to wake in the tropical and desert paradise the next morning for breakfast at Tueson. Taking the Mohawk and Aztee trail, inclusive of Casa Grande and Yuma, and what appeared to be Tombstone Territory and Cactus Wonderland, the choir arrived for dinner in San Diego where we were well received, and dined in the elite Jazzville Supper Club.

Our concert was rendered in the well kept famous Russ Auditorium of San Diego, where many top artists have carved their names in the corridor gallery.

In the bright sunshine of Los Angeles, we made our entrance ahead of time as our V-549 came to a halt before the huge white stone Mt. Zion Baptist Church, recently reconstructed with many added spacious features and ornamentations by the young industrious Prairie View graduate, Reverend Edward V. Hill! Our concert was heard before a huge audience with bids for more, and at the completion of the performance, the throng stayed on, many of whom sent greetings to friends, students and relatives.

Next morning we departed thirty minutes late, and as our V-549 slowly elimbed and crawled through the hazardous drive of the snow covered "Bear Mountains," we looked back at the dark clouds through which we could see Los Angeles and it faded as if having been brushed away by the magie wand of Disneyland. Lunch was ours at Fresno, California, at 12:25 p.m. and on through the orange groves, via Bay Bridge into San Francisco at 4:25 p.m. This was the first evening, February 27th, to have a few hours rest from a performance or travel since leaving "Dear Prairie View."

formance or travel since leaving "Dear Prairie View." February 28th, at 3:00 p.m. in the elite Nourse Civic Auditorium the lights darkened and the spot light flooded the stage, heavy velvet curtains rolled back amid hundreds of pin point lights, that shone from plush seats, giving the auditorium spectacle an image of night with many stars, and the crowded scene was hushed immediately. Another curtain opened, and the 38 voiced choir smiled as their director tipped out and bowed amidst a tremendous ovation. "Episodic Telstar of Songs" unfolded as sung by the Prairie View Choir in an array of talent that might be called concert stopers, the male and female quartette, soloists and choir. When we sang "The Alma Mater," "Texas Our Texas," it was thrilling as usual to see so many standing representatives. The ladies were dressed in white faille floor length formals, and the men in tuxedo tails in all performances, added to the formality and appearance of the well blended ensemble.

Graduates, friends and relatives were in the audience from Oakland, California and as far away as Oregon. The Woman's Society of Christian Service, headed by Mrs. Elna I. Love, has presented us for several years and hence no limitation is placed on the cultural sightseeing tours throughout the city and the choir always relishes such thoughtfulness.


We were enroute to Denver, Colorado at 12:30 a.m. by way of Salt Lake City, Utah. The warm rays of California were soon lost in the mountains before we reached Reno, Nevada. The afternoon, the same day at 4:30 p.m. found us touring the wonders of Temple Square at Salt Lake City where we thrilled to the sound of our voices as we tried the perfect acoustics in a short rendition. We boarded our bus at 12:45 a.m. and safely skated and skidded from one mountain to another into Denver as our driver masterfully brought us to the milehigh eity by 12:14 p.m. of March 2nd.

We were well received in Denver, Amarillo, Dallas, and Bonham, where our tour ended March 7th. It is noteworthy that two performances were given at Dallas, where Mr. Maceo Johnson was the executive liason officer.

The choir enjoyed and shared such wholesome and rich experiences as a tour through the world's largest underground cave, Carlshad Caverns and a special ride through the shipping and island areas of San Diego. Individuals went on sight sceing tours in Los Angele San Francisco, the Fisherman's Wharf, the Mint, University of Berkley, Calif. and Univ of Denver.

Traveling on tour with the choir were two members on the honor roll, Miss Lillian Hodge, Corpus Christi, Texas and Mr. Nolan Dixon, Rosebud, Texas. Among the soloists with the choir who rated 89-95 as participants in the National Association of Teachers of Singing auditions at the University of Texas were: Miss Ruby Webb, Soprano, Miss Lillian Hodge, Soprano, Mr. Robert Dixon, Tenor and Mr. Alfred L. Earle, Tenor.

Finally, the varied program entitled "Episodic Telstar of Songs Internationale" was overwhelmingly successful instate, interstate and in the words of our conductor, "Teamwork, spirit, discipline, and musicianship in the choir this year climaxes our rich endeavors second to nonel"
