

Proposed Power Line Concerns Local Citizens

The utility companies are planning to erect a 400,000 volt Direct Current power line, which will run from Huntsville to Bay City, and they want to run it

through Waller County.

The plan calls for erecting 110' to 170' high towers to hold the lines, and a growing group of concerned citizens trying to block the action. In addition to the eyesore and safety hazard that would be created along the route, concern exists that D. C. power lines ionize water molecules in the air, which can then drift a mile or more from the lines. The group says that people and animals inhale these ions, which studies have shown will surpress the

dairy farms, on its way to the spot just above the fairgrounds where we liked to swim. Of course, we had to sneak in under the pasture fence, hide our bikes in the trees, slip through the woods, and shed our clothes in the bushes near the bank of the swimming hole we favored. Swimsuits? Heck, those were for sissies! We had to stash our clothes in just the right place for making a fast getaway, because the farmer who owned the land didn't want us swimming there either. I don't know if he was worried about liability insurance like folks do now, or if he objected when we rode his cows, just for the fun of it.

The younger boys had to start out swimming up around the bend, where the water wasn't quite so deep.

As you grew older, and bolder, you worked your way down to "Highbanks", our name for the best hole on the creek. The water had cut the bank into a high

cliff on one side, and we used to show how brave we were by choosing the highest parts of the bank to dive or jump off from. The water was very deep there. and it made for good diving and showing off. We would walk back 40 or 50 feet from the edge, get a running start, fling our bodies out into space, and see just how out in the water we could land. We had some sort of system for keeping records, but I have forgotten now just how we did it.

Anyhow, there were lots of hazards, real and imagined, that included briar bushes, stumps, old barbed wire, busted bottles, undertows, etc., which only called for more bravery, but the greatest hazard of all was those cows! Now, they knew that when the weather got really hot, they could walk down to the creek and stand in the water up to their bellies, and cool themselves off. We had no trouble shooing them

away from Highbanks, but they merely moved upstream and watched us from their spot in the

The problem presented here has to do with the little known fact that cow patties float! When we made our running leap from the bank, we couldn't see the surface of the water as we jumped, and sometimes our trajectory would be dead on aim for a floating pattie, and we had to go through some pretty wild gyrations of the body to avoid landing on "Cow Island". If we made a clean entrance, the next hazard had to do with coming up to the surface; as we had to be careful just where we broke surface, or things could get messy again.

I don't remember ever getting sick from those swimming trips, and I'm sluggish that Newtown Creek wouldn't have passed all of those swimming pool tests for Ph, acidity, and chemical purity, especially near the cow patties, but the boys in our town have all learned to swim there, for two hundred years, and they probably still do. I'm sure that I wouldn't swim there now, due to my education on health and all, but Newtown Creek still conjures up some pretty fond memories of hot summer

Letter to the Editor:

Next year's county budget has been approved, and (once again) it increases taxes and not services. In the case of the Sheriff's Department it may even mean a reduction in services.

I am concerned about our county: I'm also a Democrat and I'm concerned about the Democratic Party. Voters throughout the country are turning away from the Democrats because they ae perceived as "wasters of tax dollars".

The problem in Washington is the same as in Waller County. That problem is a blotted bureaucracy and inefficient governmental management. The course that our government (both local and national) is on, is a deadend street; and

without indepth re-organization, the cost and inefficiency of government will continue to climb.

The Republicans' answer has been to simply reduce funding, but this does not get to the heart of the problem. This approach causes minimal pressure on the bureaucracy while greatly reducing the often truly needed services. However, democrats have been "in power" and in the best position to restructure bureaucracy; but, politicians rarely want to make difficult decisions.

Bureaucracy usually grows as people "in power" employ or find jobs for "friends and family". And very often these offices resist staying current on new management practices that might threaten

"the system". Private businesses run this way go bankrupt: politicians raise taxes.

Waller County government has gotten so top heavy that tax increases just maintain the status quo, with nothing left over to improve the operation. For example, several vears ago there was talk about the need for computerization of county business, but apparently no one was up to the task. In lieu of one coordinated system, several small computers were bought. Unfortunately, these computers are incompatable; thus, extra work must be done just so the different machines can talk to each other. Additionally, in the various county offices there are duplicated tasks needless cause

Dollars are now so hard to find that Commissioners Court can't seem to afford updating county operations; although we must. County management direly needs some new initiative and planning. But how could we pay for it?

Instead of raising elected officials' salaries and travel expenses, maybe these inflated expenses should be cut. Also, the duplicated tasks in various county offices could be pooled, thus reducing some expenses. These funds could then be used to start planning and implementing a more efficient county management system

If we Democrats don't have the courage, imagination, and integrity to update and improve our county government, then we shouldn't be surprised if the voters give the Republicans a chance to improve county government. Whoever does it, it's time for Waller County to step up to the '80s. It's up to us!



The Ordeal OF The Statue Of Liberty

One of the enduring American symbols of freedom, the Statue of Liberty at the entrance of New York harbor, almost ended up staying in Paris and becoming an unwanted gift from France to America.

On June 17, 1885, the French freighter ISERE arrived in New York harbor with 225 crates containing the dismanteled massive Statue of Liberty, the work of sculptor Frederic Auguste Bartholdi (1834-1904). The event 100 years ago was the climax of a 20 year campaign to honor the friendship between France and America which began with French military assistance to George Washington during the American war for independence.

The idea for the Statue of Liberty was the brainchild of French historian Edouard de Laboulaye, who proposed the project at an informal Paris dinner in the summer of 1865 at which sculptor Bartholdi was present. He did not know the frustration

Why Such **Hugh Trade Deficits?**

by Lloyd Bentsen U.S. Senator

We know the United States has huge trade deficits. We do not, though, know enough about potentially unfair foreign trade practices that may be adding to those deficits.

Our trade deficit is expected to grow from a record \$123.3 billion last year to \$160 billion this year.

In one area of trade, manufactured goods, our \$12 billion trade surplus in 1980 is predicted to erode by the end of 1985 to a \$100 billion deficit.

There are several factors that contribute to our weakening trade position. Not least among them is unfair competition from our trading partners.

Korea, for example, re-





portedly has sidestepped antidumping duties in the U. S. levied last year on Korean color television sets by using many of the same components to manufacture and export computer monitors. I have been looking for steps

our government can take immediately to combat these unfair practices.

A little-known provision, Section 305 of the 1974 Trade Act, is one of those steps. Under Section 305. information on foreign trade activities may be requested. The U. S. Trade Representative has 30 days to

respond by either asking the foreign governments involved for requested information not already available, or by explaining in writing why he will not do so.

The Senate Democratic Working Group on Trade Policy, of which I am chairman, wrote last month Trade Representative

Clayton Yeutter asking him to investigate specific trade practices by Korea and seven other countries. We suspect the practices may be unfair and harmful to U.S. exporters.

Among these are a requirement by the West German telephone service that U.S. firms process some computer data in that country before it can be transmitted for further processing in the United States. This inhibits American firms from competing in data transmission and processing services.

The European Community pays export subsidies on beet sugar, which depresses world prices, increases the cost of U.S. sugar support programs and destroys the effectiveness of the International Sugar Organization. Brazil not only imposes a 60 percent duty on general aviation aircraft made in the United States, but also has prohibitively restrictive licensing requirements.

We also asked questions about technology transfer policies in Mexico and about telecommunications policies in Canada and Japan.

In addition to answering

our questions, the Trade Representative must also explain what United States rights are in these cases under current laws and trade agreements.

We already know enough to

By this time Jacket had become well known for her expertise in swimming. She came to Prairie View on September 1, 1964 to teach







and delays his Statue of
Liberty would encounter.
Initially, neither the French
nor the American govern-

ments found much merit in the massive statue that came to weigh 225 tons and tower to 305 feet, making it, a century ago, the tallest structure in New York City. The U.S., in the 1860s, was too busy recovering from the bloody Civil War.

In France, the Franco-Prussian war delayed any consideration until 1875. Funds from 881 towns and 100,000 Frenchmen financed construction of the statue, which was composed of copper sheets hammered into shape by hand and assembled over four huge steel supports. The design was the work of Alexandre Gustave Eiffel of Paris tower fame.

Historians James B. Bell and Richard I. Abrams. in their 1984 book, In Search of Liberty - The Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island noted that the American committee formed to raise money to pay for the pedistal on which the statue would stand ran into official and press resistance.

New York City, the State of New York, and the U. S. Congress refused to appropriate a penny for the work. The New York Times was a leading critic of the project, officially known as "Liberty Enlightening the World". The paper said that the project was "too expensive".

Five months before the Statue of Liberty was due to be shipped to New York City, oficials of the committee to raise the funds confessed that they might have to inform their French counterparts that their gift may have to be rejected because the required money could not be raised.

It was about this time that a Hungarian-born jewish immigrant, Joseph Pulitzer, saved the Statue of Liberty by launching, through his

Keeping the

Torch Burning New York daily, The World, a successful fundraising campaign. By appealing to New York City's immigrant poor and working class to contribute their pennies, dimes and nickels, in six months he raised the required \$100,000 needed to

pay for the completion of the pedistal. His success was due, in no small measure, to making New York's wealthy the target of his newspaper campaign.

"Let's not wait for the millionaires to give this money," The World wrote.

"It's not a gift from the millionaires of America, but a gift from the whole people of France to the whole people of America.

Joseph Pulitzer's successful campaign saved the
