Mac is about a year old now, and still growing, so it's a good thing Tom owns a grocery store, because he's going to need it to keep Mac fed. Lord knows how big that "puppy" will be when he gets his growth, but he shows all the signs of being large enough to ride while working cows.

Mac is the usual lab, curious, loving and beautiful, but not long on training. I can't help but remember when I bought my lab, "Duke" many years ago. I did a fair amount of waterfowl hunting in those days, and had the opportunity to gun over some truly fantastic dogs, so l made up my mind that I was going to have a really well-trained hunting companion in Duke.

He was just a little ball of black fur when I got him, so I had plenty of time to read several good training books by famous gun dog trainers, and Duke & I set off on a program of getting each other trained to hunt together

We went through several months of the usual puppy training exercises, and all went according to plan, more or less. Labs are very smart dogs, and Duke was no exception, so my job was relatively easy. All of the authors agreed on the early steps of basic discipline training, and Duke & I were going by the books.







Dear Mr. Hughes, A cataract is an opacity or a darkening of the clear focusing lens which is located directly behind the iris or colored part of the

Cataracts have been known since the beginning of medical history and are the leading cause of blind-

ness throughout the world.

Cataracts are not a disease. In change in the tissue that makes up the focusing lens. However, cataracts may also be the result of trauma or due to some other underlying factor such as diabetes or certain drug therapies.

Many professionals believe that "old-age" cataracts are due to the harmful rays of light, called ultraviolet rays, that are found in sunlight. These "harmful" rays of light

pupil and react with the lens tissue and result in opacification or cataract development.

Recently, a new type of ophthalmic lens, called the U-V 400 (for ultraviolet), has been developed to help slow cataract progression This lens is designed to filter out harmful rays of the sun that may be responsible for cataract development.

Many of my patients who have

(which are more intense in the beginning cataracts have their presun-belt) enter our eye through the scriptions made with this new lens. Even some of my younger patients have their sunglasses made with the U-V 400 lens.




