about all'I saw. Now look at it Up until the last 2-3 years, you could drive from Waller to Tomball on FM 2920, and never meet a car after 8:00 at night. If was a lonely road. The only business you saw was the old feed store at Rose Hill. Now it is being built up on both ides of Rose Hill, and about all of the way into Tomball. 



My eye doctor told me that I am far-sighted when I thought that I was nearsighted. What is the difference between farsightedness and nearsightedness? Joy Farrar Dear Joy,

Basically, a farsighted person can see easier far away than up close. A near-sighted person sees clearer at close range than they do far away


In most cases, the difference between these two types of vision

nearsighted, or myopic, eyeball is usually a little longer than a farsighted, or hyperopic, eveball An eye that is neither hyperopic or myopic is called emmetropic. Therefore, optically speaking, a nearsighted eye has an overpowered visual system

With extra effort, mildly farsighted people may be able to adapt enough to get by without glasses, especially is they do not do much close work and have good


is the length of the eyeball. A focusing ability. Anyone who gets tired or has headaches after doing close work; has aching or burning eyes; or is irritable after a long period of concentration, however, probably needs help.

To correct the vision for these two types of problems, on the curved lenses are sued. As the power needed for a nearsighted visual system increases, the edges of the lenses become much thicker Conversely, the center of the lens gets thicker for a farsighted eye as the power goes up
