In this AAA meeting charbon, cotton, legumes, and grasses were discussed, the meeting was held in the assembly room of the New Court House Tuesday, July 21, 1942. The information on charbon pointed out that it was necessary to vaccinate as follows give spores, 2,3, and 4 at twelve days intervals then one 4 at 75 days after the last one and ev ry 120 days thereafter.

The legumes recommended by the speakers from the Angleton Experiment Station were whilte dutch clover parison clover, and lespedeza for summer. The grasses recommened were bermuda, dallis and carpet.

The program discussed was the setting of rates for the Cotton insurance for 1943 as for as this county was concerned.

The County Council of Agriculture met Saturday, July 11, 1942 at Mr. Link Perry's House in Anchor Community. The Council opened at 2:00 p.m. with the president in charge; general business was transacted. Mr. John Mirant was selected to and confirmed as County Victory Leader and was also selected to represent the Council at Prairie View College at the Agents and Leaders Conference with all expenses paid. A committee was appointed to work in connection with a committee to be appointed from the Home Demonstration Council to work out some plans for 1943.

Nine horses and mules were used as demonstration animals and farmers were taught the technique of vaccinating by the agricultural agent. Several new members were enrolled; refreshments was served and the meeting adjourned to meet in Angleton on Saturday August 1, 1942.

The Council recommended ~~the~~ the purchasing of two syringes by each Agricultural Community Council in the County.
