



#### **Political Observations**

By Pully Ticks The English Language Amendment (ELA) has been reintroduced in both Houses of Congress. First sponsored in 1981 by former Senator Hayakawa, The ELA was reintroduced in 1983 and again this year. Senate hearings were held in June 1984. Senator Steve Symms (R-ID) is the sponsor of Senate Joint Resolution 20, along with ten other Senators. The SJ. Res. reads: "Section 1. The English Language shall be the official language of the United States.


Section 2. The Congress shall have the power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation." In his introductory remarks, Senator Symms told his colleagues: "The American people are impatient with us . All around them they see the results of the language policies Congress has imposed, policies that challenge the uniqueness of English in our national life. We removed the heat from the melting pot, and the melting seems to have very nearly stopped. Many Americans now feel like strangers in their own neighborhoods, aliens in their own country." Symms, referring the "ELA" acronym, urged the Senators to "remember it, for they will encounter it often in their constituent mail"

The House version of the ELA was introduced by Congressman Norman Shumway (R-CA) and 20 co-sponsors. Known as House Joint Resoultion 96, it is some what longer than the Senate bill, and the basic difference is Section 3, which reads: This article shall not prohibit any law, ordinance, regulation, order, decree, program, or policy requiring educational instruction in a language other than English, for the purpose of making students who use a language other than English, for the purpose of making students who use a language other than English, proficient in English.

It will be interesting to see if congress, with so many major pieces of legislation to consider, will also take up this source of aggravation for many voters. It is apparent from the fact that amendments or resolutions have been introduced in both houses, that some congressmen are listening to the "folks at home".



## **Stiles Field Day Set** For June 18

The 1985 field day at the Stiles Farm at Thrall will focus on cotton, corn, forage and vegetable production.

In addition, mini tours will feature grapes and blackberries, swine, catfish, beef cow pregnancy determination, furrow diking, a computerized "taking" tractor and the Stiles Farm's computer operation.

The 23rd annual field day is set for June 18, with tours beginning at 2 p.m. followed by a 5 p.m. program and barbecue, announces David McGregor, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A & M University System.

David Eller, newly elected chairman of the Texas A & M University Board of Regents, will emcee the Program, with State Senate Kent Caperton of Bryan delivering the keynote address.

Featured as major tour discussions will be stripper cotton varieties and new strains of cotton, clovers in a forage production program, corn planting dates and fertiltiy rates, and new vegetable hybrids and cultural practices.

A host of educational booths and exhibits also will be featured at the annual field day and will deal with a wide range of topics interest to Central Texas farmers and ranchers, says McGregor.


Stiles Farm is located on U.S. 79 one mile east of Thrall in Williamson County. The 3,300acre farm serves as a crop and

livestock demonstration site for the Central Texas Blacklands. Everyone throught Central Texas is invited to attend the annual field day to obtain the latest information on crop and livestock production, says McGregor.

earnings at the Junior Sale to fairly represent the costs involved in entering such an event. Their by-laws begin with the following statement of purpose:

"The Friends of Youth is a local, non-profit organization, made up of concerned citizens

and businesses who each pool their resources in order to help the Waller County youth at the annual Waller County Fair auction. The Friends of Youth, organized in 1983, is comprised of individuals who do not wish to purchase a 4-H, FFA, or FHA project alone, or who are financially unable to do so. In the Friends of Youth, the monies are collected and distributed to several projects during the livestock sale. Each year, approximately one-half of the money collected during the year is used to increase the sale price for many of the youngsters' projects that have sold at a loss or near break-even price. The unused funds collected during the year are placed into an interest bearing account to help with future sales."

The group holds a barbeque sale every month, at a different city in the county, to give the local folks the opportunity to participate by purchasing food & cokes. A quick peek at the savings book indicates that there is nearly \$7,000.00 in the account so far this year, and it is hoped that the total will be near \$15,000.00 by fairtime. They spent about \$5,500.00 at last year's fair.

If this organization sounds like one where you could enjoy serving Waller County young people, perhaps you could contact one of the club's officers, and find out how you can get involved. They are: Robert Fife Chairperson/Treasurer, David McGregor-Vice Chairperson, Peggy Randolph-Secretary, and George Bennett-Delegate to Waller County Fair Association Board. The governing committee, in addition to the above, consists of Lou Berger, Kenneth Berger, Bill Pickering, Floyd Randolph, Harold Mc-Mullin, Sue McMullin, Jim Royce, Edmond Brzymailkiewicz, Mrs. Ollie Reed, Peggy Kelly, and Bonnie Yates.

#### Waller Mayor Addresses Area Chamber of Commerce

Mayor, addressed the Waller Area Chamber of Commerce on May 28th, regarding the operation of the City of Waller. He stated that he wanted to inform the group of "what the City of Waller has done, what we are doing, and what we hope to do in the future"

Mr. Marburger covered a wide range of topics, from budgetary items and sewer problems, to police protection and future growth of the city. "This city", he said, "has a budget of over a million dollars a year, and that's not small business. We are constantly faced with the responsibility of spending the taxpayers' money wisely, and there are certain obligations which we must meet on a regular basis". He cited the payments on the existing bonds to which the city is obligated, such as that which paid for the replacement of the gas system a few years back, and the large bond issue passed last year by the voters. bond payments cost us \$71,000.00 every six months for the new bond payment, and \$14,000 for the gas system bond."

Our full time labor force of six

Danny Marburger, Waller ing our stop signs, and doing whatever necessary services people call in and ask us to perform. There are three full time people working in City Hall, handling the administrative tasks required to run this city," he explained,"and five full time policemen to patrol the area and enforce the laws." The mayor believes that the Police Department is the biggist single problem that he has had to face as mayor. "It's not the fault of either the police or the people, but whenever you have police responding to a domestic problem, you will please one and anger the other, or upset some one when they are stopped for violating the traffic laws, etc., and this causes lots of complaints, justified or not," he said We feel that we want to take the responsibility for our own law enforcement, and the city is growing fast, so keeping a welltrained force of police is a natural problem."

"Just a few years ago we didn't even have a police department, and it has had its ups & downs, but we feel as though we are on the right track to building an effective staff of police and dispatchers to handle our workload." "We now maintain the city

library, which we feel is serving the people well, and we have

had to add a City Judge to hear the complaints of our citizens, as our growing population simply has more legal problems than we use to face," said Marburger, and we have to have a municipal court secretary to handle all of the paperwork. These things all take dollars, taxpayer dollars, and the taxpayers simply must realize that we cannot perform these needed services without adequate funds to pay for them." "We now have a city Engineer, City Attorney, and a building inspector, all on retainer on a fee basis".

The mayor then displayed a series of maps, showing the outer limis of how far the city can grow, where the highways will run, and future plans for growth. He showed the group the subdivision ordinance now in force, explaining how it will protect the city from having to make unreasonable investments in new growth areas, while still allowing the investors to recoup their expenses at a later date.

"The single biggest problem facing us here in the Waller area today, is where we are going to dump our garbage", the mayor said. "Our landfill is about full, and will have to be closed soon, and we simply do not have any place to go. We are trying to solve this problem, but as of today, we don't have the answers. Nobody wants a garbage dump near their place, and I don't blame them, but we have to solve the problem

somehow." He told the group about the new water tower scheduled to be built behind the Lion's Center, then asked everyone to consider joining the Volunteer Fire Department and Ambulance Service. We have a few dedicated people who have been carrying this load

for years, but they need help. The more people we have involved in these efforts, the better off the city will be," he said.

The mayor said that the city has just completed a \$450,000 water well, which will provide 700 GPM of water to the city. "At the present, we have only 50,000 gallons of overhead water storage, but the new tower will be a big one, carring 250,000 gallons of water. Our sewer repair project is coming along nicely, but we face some major changes to our sewer plant, to handle the increased loads being generated by our growing population."

In general, the mayor feels that the city council is doing a pretty good job of coping with the city's growth problems, while planning for the future, and he expressed appreciation for the support and understanding of the local residents.

The mayor concluded his talk by observing that "we're just an area of good people trying to do the right thing, and I'm proud to be a part of it."
