
The Bishop Bears will be our guests on April 23 and 30 and it is expected that the Panthers will end the season brealing even in the games won and lost by taking two from the Bears.



Thirteen football varsity players were awarded their sweaters a few days ago before the entire student body. The men getting the awards were: Captain S. W. Prince, Marion Lewis, P. M. Williams, Henry Staton, L. M. Kennedy, Otis White, R. Harrington, Captain-elect "Bud" Mason, W. W. Johnson, Eggleston Greeg, Dyers, Clyde Sanders, and Douglass Lilly. The first seven named are graduating this May. Dr. Evans made a very interesting talk after which Coach Willis awarded the letters.

Among some of the facts presented by Dr. Evans were the following:

1—The 1929 Prairie View football team was the first team of the Southwest Athletic Conference to play a game of football east of the Mississippi river.

2—The 1929 Prairie View football team played before more spectators than any other team in the Conference or in the history of Prairie View.

3—No man on the 1929 Prairie View team was put off the field of play for unsportsman-like conduct.

4-P. M. Williams, a Panther, was the only man from the Southwest Conference on P. W. L. Jones' All-American team.

5-We had the best conditioned team in the history of the school.

6—One of the best equipped football teams in America.

 7—Co-ordination and cooperation between captain and players could not be surpassed.

8—Only team in the Conference that is coached by a full-time coach.

9—The men remained in training from September 1 to January 1 without breaking training and not a one expressed a desire to break training during the holidays.
