

GRAMBLING UNIVERSITY TIGERS

Saturday, October 2, 1982 TODAY'S GAME:

"A Game and a Half"

It's the matchup between Prairie View and Grambling, two teams that have dominated things in the Southwestern Athletic Conference in years past.

Prairie View, the lone original member of the 62-year-old league, and Grambling, a member since 1958 rank among the top in number of football championships won.

Prairie View has won 10, its last coming in 1964 and Grambling has won 14, its last just two years ago.

But to today's game.

Grambling brings one of the nation's most outstanding football players to the Cotton Bowl in Trumaine Johnson, a 6-3, 190-pound senior from Baker, La.

Johnson has been called by some professional football scouts as the best wide receiver in the nation. Last year he caught 43 passes for 772 yards and six touchdowns. Career wise

he has caught 89 passes for 1786 yards (not counting the Tigers first three games) and is close to breaking a school record of 118 career receptions and also a state career touchdown reception record of 29.

The Panthers top offensive threat is Longview sophomore Edward Jackson, who leads the team in rushing who has 185 yards on 65 carries.

While the Panthers are keying on stopping Johnson the Tigers will have to stop Jackson, a 5-8, 174-pounder who has led Prairie View in rushing all four games.

Today's game also matches veteran coach Eddie Robinson, who became only the fourth collegiate coach to garner 300 victories. He reached that milestone last week in a 43-21 triumph over Florida A&M last week. That brings his record to 300-98-13.

Prairie View's Jim McKinley is in his first year coaching at Prairie View. In eight previous seasons he forged a 46-42-1 career record with three years at Central State in Ohio and five at North Carolina A&T.



Dr. Ivory V. Nelson, a career educator with impressive credentials, officially assumed his new post of acting president of Prairie View A&M University on June 1, 1982.

Formerly serving as vice president for Research and Special Programs, Dr. Nelson was named by the Texas A&M University Board of Regents to replace Dr. Alvin I. Thomas.

He joined the staff of Prairie View A&M University in 1968 as Professor and Academic Dean of University and three years later was named to the position he held when the Board of Regents tapped him.

After graduation from high school in Shreveport, Louisiana in 1951, the young chemist and math major entered Grambling State University where he received his B.S. then on to Kansas State University where he received his Ph.D.

Dr. Nelson was on the honor roll at both institutions.

In between his educational endeavors, he enlisted in the U.S. Air Force where he spent four years and attained the rank of Staff Sergeant.

Before arriving at Prairie View A&M University, Dr. Nelson was on the faculty of at least five universities, and held several chemist research positions in the private sector.

Grambling State President

When Dr. Joseph Johnson became president of Grambling State University six years ago he became the first alumnus to take over the reins of the northwestern Louisiana school in its history.


Dr. Johnson earned his bachelors degree from Grambling in 1957, a masters degree from the University of Colorado in 1967, and his doctoral degree from the University of Colorado. He has also done post doctoral study at Harvard University.

Prior to assuming the reins as president of Grambling, Dr. Johnson taught high school at Shreveport and Hammond, La.

He then went to Boulder, Colo. and the University of Colorado where he held several administrative positions.

He was associate director of recreation, assistant to the executive vice president, assistant professor of physical education and recreation, executive assistant to the president and director of urban specialist training programs.

Dr. Johnson also served in the United States Army serving tours of duty at Fort Polk, La. and Munich, Ga.

Tribute to . . . Eddie Robinson



This season should be the most historic in the annals of athletics at Grambling State University, as athletic director and football coach Eddie Robinson will win the 300th game in his illustrious career which began in 1941.

Since 1941. A lot of you reading this weren't even born. Most of us dream about working at a profession long enough for retirement. Robinson truly loves his as he is into his fifth decade.

When Robinson records victory number 300, he'll join two other Robinson's who have left their marks in history, Jackie Robinson was the first Black man to play professional baseball while Frank Robinson was the first Black man to manage a professional baseball team. Eddie Robinson will be the first Black college coach to win 300 games.

The modest Robinson doesn't think about records, though he does love to win. As stated in a 1981 interview: "I want to be the

best." In order to be the best, this entails winning.

The giant of a man from Baton Rouge, himself a quarterback at Leland College, produced the first Black from a predominantly Black college to play professionally in 'Tank' Younger, then with the Los Angeles Rams.

Robinson has sent close to 200 other players to the proleague, the NFL and Canadian, including Hall-of-Famer Willis Davis of the Green Bay Packers. Among the many who have or still are toiling in the pros are Buck Buchanan, Ernie Ladd, Willie Brown, Doug Williams, Sammie White, Charlie Joiner, Gary 'Big Hands' Johnson, Frank Lewis, James Harris and Everson Walls.

While the number of pros is large, an even greater number is the amount of Robinson products who have finished college. Eddie Robinson doesn't brag about his pro alumni, but about the

number that have gotten their degrees.

Robinson is a doer and goer. He attends national meetings and participates. He was the 1976 president of the American Football Coaches Association and has held many other positions. Presently he is chairman of his district's All-American Committee with the AFCA and on the publicity committee.

Though he started his quest as the only football coach, and he coached basketball and track also, keeping long hours, he never lost the family values. He married his childhood sweetheart,

Doris, and has two offspring, Lillian and Eddie, Jr.

He worked hard, he endured, he works hard, and he endures. He is a legend and when he picks up his 300th win, the legend will grow. While the only thought on this master's mind is winning the next game, next on the horizon is a Division 1-AA national championship and eclipsing 'Bear' Bryant's record for most wins by a college coach.

And, if you ask him who is responsible for his achievement, he'll credit his wife, his high school and college coaches, his own coaches, his players and Ralph Waldo Emerson Jones.

NCAA: Serving Higher Education

Now in its 77th year of service, the National Collegiate Athletic Association continues to meet the demands of its member institutions. While serving the nation's colleges and universities, the NCAA is the voice of intercollegiate athletics.

A call for stricter control of college football by President Theodore Roosevelt because of the violence in the game brought together 13 institutions in 1905, formulating the original communications base for college athletics.

This initial body called itself the Intercollegiate Athletic Association and was officially constituted March 31, 1906. In 1910, the name was changed to the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

More than seven progressive decades have molded this original 13-member body into a membership today of more than 900 colleges, universities, conferences and affiliated organizations.

Administration and rules interpretation occupied early efforts of the organization. Shortly after World War II, the NCAA adopted legislative and executive powers, changing its function into one dealing with virtually all issues concerned with intercollegiate athletics.

Many things have become associated with the NCAA during its colorful history. Highest priority goes to the service it provides to its members, acting as the true "voice" of college athletics today.


Each January the NCAA membership comes together at the annual Convention to review, propose and amend legislation. The Convention presents the opportunity for the nation's institutions of higher learning to speak and act on athletic matters on the national level.

Acting in the best interests of its membership, the NCAA strives to perform these specific functions among its many other responsibilities:

• Conducts 42 annual National Collegiate Championships in 19 men's sports for three separate divisions. Three championships (Division I, Division II and Division III) are held in baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, swimming, tennis, outdoor track and wrestling. Two championships are staged in gymnastics, lacrosse and ice hockey. Fencing, rifle, skiing, indoor track, volleyball and water polo hold single National Collegiate Championships, while football is contested in Divisions I-AA, II and III. The NCAA is conducting 31 women's championships

in the 1982-83 academic year in addition to the 42 held for men. Women's championships will be held in all three divisions in basketball, cross country, field hockey, softball, swimming, tennis, outdoor track and volleyball. Two championships (Division I and Division II) will be staged in gymnastics, while fencing, golf, lacrosse, soccer and indoor track will hold single National Collegiate Championships. The National Collegiate Championship dates back to 1883 in tennis; and during this 100-year history, more than 13,000 student-athletes have earned the coveted title of "National Collegiate Champion."

- Maintains 23 men's sports committees, including 14 men's rules committees to formulate, copyright and publish rules of play for the government of collegiate sports. Members of these and many other committees, including 16 women's sports/rules committees, are elected by representatives of member institutions at the annual Convention.
- Publishes a tabloid newspaper 46 times per year, rules books in 12 sports, record books in football and basketball and various other publications.
- Collects, compiles and distributes the official statistics of college football, basketball and baseball in men's sports, and basketball and softball in women's sports.
- Conducts studies as a means of developing solutions to athletic problems.
- Represents the membership in legislative and regulatory matters on the state and Federal levels.
- Annually selects the College Athletics Top Ten and the Theodore Roosevelt ("Teddy") Award—the Association's highest honor.
- Administers an honors program which annually awards 90 postgraduate scholarships to recognize outstanding senior student-athletes who have excelled in the classroom as well as athletics. This scholarship is for \$2,000. The program has provided \$1,784,000 to 1,354 recipients since its inception in the 1964-65 academic year.
- Promotes and participates in international sports planning and competition through membership in the United States Olympic Committee, Amateur Basketball Association of the USA, Track and Field Association of the USA, and the United States Baseball, Gymnastics and Wrestling Federations.
- Maintains more than 80 full-time staff members at its national headquarters in Mission, Kansas, under the supervision of Executive Director Walter Byers.

NCAA Honor Roll

Program recognizes past, present student-athletes

Bill Cosby, five current studentathletes and five former student-athletes were honored at this year's NCAA honors luncheon held during the Association's 76th annual Convention in Houston in January.

Cosby received the NCAA's highest honor, the Theodore Roosevelt Award. The award is named for the 26th President of the United States, who was the individual most responsible for implementing the organization of the NCAA.

While attending Temple University, Cosby participated in track and field, basketball and football. Although he was a second-string fullback in football, his best sport was track. A versatile performer, he scored at various times in the high jump, shot put, low hurdles, javelin and discus. He also won the Middle Atlantic Conference high jump title in 1962.

The "Teddy" is presented annually to a prominent American "for whom competitive athletics in college and attention to physical well-being thereafter have been important factors in a distinguished career of national significance and achievement."

Previous winners include former President Dwight D. Eisenhower; Senator Leverett Saltonstall; Supreme Court Justice Byron R. White; Purdue University President Frederick L. Hovde; Jerome H. Holland, ambassador to Sweden and last year's winner, Art Linkletter.

Also honored at the luncheon were five current and past student-athletes.

The NCAA recognized five outstanding student-athletes who completed their college eligibility in 1981. Two football players, two swimmers and a women's basketball player were honored.

Ken Sims, a defensive tackle for the University of Texas, was the winner of the Lombardi Award in 1981, emblematic of the outstanding lineman. Sims also was named to an all-America team for the third straight year.

Oliver Luck, a quarterback at West Virginia University, accumulated 6,150 yards of total offense during his career, a WVU record, and led the Mountaineers to a 9-3 record and Peach Bowl win in 1981. Luck is a two-time academic all-America and a National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame Scholar-Athlete.

The two swimmers honored were Par



Arvidsson of the University of California and Rowdy Gaines of Auburn University. Arvidsson captured a gold medal at the 1980 Olympics while competing for his native Sweden and is the world-record holder in the 100-meter butterfly. Gaines was a member of the U.S. Olympic team and won five NCAA individual swimming championships.

The first woman to receive a Today's Top Five award was Lynette Woodard, a basketball standout at the University of Kansas. Woodard set a national career scoring record of 3,646 points during four years as a Jayhawk and was a three-time all-America selection.

Silver Anniversary awards were presented to five former student-athletes who have accomplished distinguished careers. They were honored on their 25th anniversary after college graduation.

All five played football and three of the five also played basketball.

Jimmy Brown is recognized as one of the greatest players in the history of football, but also starred in basketball and lacrosse at Syracuse University. Brown went on to the NFL and since retiring has enjoyed an excellent career in acting.

A two-time captain of the Grambling Tigers, Willie Davis went on to greater fame with the Green Bay Packers. Davis played on five world championship teams and never missed a game. Davis currently owns the Willie Davis Distributing Company and is a member of the Joseph Schlitz Brewing Company board of directors.

Jack Kemp was an all-America at Occidental College and went on to quarterback the Buffalo Bills to AFL championships in 1964 and 1965. His jersey—No. 15—is retired in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Kemp is currently a member of the U.S. Congress from the state of New York

Another Green Bay Packer great, Ron Kramer, was a football and basketball star at the University of Michigan. Kramer caught 53 passes from his tight end position in college and led the Wolverines in scoring in basketball his junior and senior years. Kramer is currently vice-president of Paragon Steel Corporation.

The final honoree was Jim Swink, former Texas Christian University running back. Swink is the only TCU player to rush for over 1,000 yards in a season. Swink also was a two-year letterman in basketball. He is currently an orthopedic surgeon and chief of surgery at All Saints Hospital in Fort Worth.
