## Dr. Gerald Slater **Speaks To Waller CofC**

Members of the Waller Area Chamber of Commerce enjoyed an informative talk from Dr. Gerald Slater, superintendent of Waller Independant School District, on Tuesday evening, April 21st.

Dr. Slater brought members up to date on new school construction, pointing out that the new elementary school, being built at Hockley, near Ranch Country, is due for completion October 1. The 73,000 square foot structure cost \$3.6 million - or \$55.72 per square foot to build. The new school was made necessary due to increased enrollment in the district.

The new junior high, which is going up on Stokes Road, on the east side of Waller, cost \$4.5 million and encompasses 80,000 square feet. It will be available September 1.

According to Dr. Slater, there are now 2750 students in the district, with 1100 in grades K -4, more than 400 in fifth and sixth (middle school), a little under 500 in junior high and about 750 in high school. He pointed out that the present high school was designed to handle 500 students.

In the two hours devoted to intensive instruction, the local youths were exposed to the same curricula currently in effect at the University of Texas, Blinn College, University of Houston, Texas Christian University, San Jacinto Junior College, and others, according to Hal Wadsworth, a charter member of the

Wadsworth pointed out that the association was formed in 1947, with Johnny Keene as its first president. There are now 160 active members who meet every two months and who put on clinics of this type throughout the

will help me keep things in their proper perspective, and they do! They do!

Speaking of perspectives, let me share this small item with you. When I was in first grade, ten or twelve years ago, (at most) my art project in Mrs. Orr's class, was to fashion a tongue depressor into the shape of a letter opener, sand it smooth, print "MOM" on the handle with red and bule colored pencils, and paint it with clear shellac. This elaborate gift was lov-

ingly wrapped and presented to my mom on Mother's Day, 1944. She was very pleased with my labor of love, and immediately placed it on the nightstand by her bed, to keep it close at hand. Being an inveterate reader, she soon began to use it as a bookmark, and I remember always having seen it sticking out of whichever book she had by her bed, marking her place.

A lot of years have gone by, since that small gift was received and I've been fortunate enough to have given morn lots of gifts since then. All of my adult life

has been spent thousands of miles away from mom's home, and most of our visits have been brief, or by phone or letter.

A few summers ago, on a visit to mom's home, I happened to go in to her bedroom to get something for her, and there, on the nightstand, was her customary book, with a thin, worn stick of wood marking her place. It was not much larger than a popcycle stick, and no markings were visible on it now, but she remembers exactly what it once looked like, and what it once said, both written, and implied.

And I realized, as I considered how often she must have taken it in her hand over the years, that she was simply saying, "I love you, too, son."







I feel good to know that we have people like Dixie and the Tomball ambulance drivers there at the Tomball ball fields and that they know what they are doing when someone gets hurt.





## Waller County History

HARVESTER, WALLER COUNTY, TEXAS

Not too long ago, someone raised the question, "Where is Harvester, Texas? My parents were married there."

Harvester Post Office, established June 9, 1887 and discontinued January 31, 1913, was in Northeast Waller County and was believed to have been named for the abundance of agricultural crops raised in the areamostly cotton and corn.

The location may be spotted by driving eight-tenths of a mile Eastward on Hegar Road from its intersection with Kickapoo Road. At a bend in the road at this point, on a slight rise on the South side of Hegar Road, the old building sat.

In conjunction with the post office, there was also a small country store, and in the community close by was a Baptist Church, forerunner of Friendship Baptist Church of today. Too, a country doctor, who made his rounds in a buggy, lived near.

#### **FENELLA**

Who named this old post office? Was the name a combination of names? 'ella' is prominent in the post office name, but what about 'fen'? Who knows. The life of Fenella post office was short-December, 1987 to March 1899. The post office was in Bush's store, five miles south of the Retreat (Grimes County) office. The 'shotgun' style building housed both the post

Generally, disease pressure is low during this period, and these materials will do an excellent job of control.

Insecticides can be applied with any of the fungicides, adds McGregor. Insecticides are important because areas damaged by insect feeding can be entry points into the fruit by the various fungi that cause decay

With the arrival of scab infection period, peach growers and gardeners should give careful attention to a spray schedule, adds McGregor.

## Peach Trees Needs Special Attention

tion now to control peach scab, a fungus disease that attacks young fruit.

Peach scab causes black spots or freckles on fruit, points out David McGregor, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A & M University System. The spots can be over the entire surface of the fruit but most often are found in greatest numhers on the stem end.

During the first few weeks of the peach's life, the fungus is prevented from coming in contact with the peach by various parts of the flower and by the peach "fuss." But as the fruit grows, the fungus comes in contact with the surface of the peach and infection can occur.

In Texas, this occurs between petal fall and shuck split, or the first two to three weeks immediately after bloom in the spring, says McGregor. Infection rarely occurs after this period of time, and if it does, the fruit will mature before the fungus is visible on the fruit.

Growers and gardeners can control peach scab by applying fungicides during the susceptible period. Make the first

Peach trees need special attenapplication when about 75 percent of the petals have fallen from the blooms. Repeat the application in 10 days, explains McGregor.

Several fungicides can be used, but some have proven to be better than others in Extension demonstrations conducted in different areas of Texas, Benomyl and chlorothalonil are two of the better materials. Benomly (Benlate and Topsin - M) is used at ½ pound per 100 gallons of water or 1 pound per acre of trees. Chlorothalonil (Bravo 500 and Bravo W-75) is used at the rate of 1.5 pints per 100 gallons of water of 4.5 pints per acre of

Several homeowner products have both chlorothalonil and benomyl as their active ingredient benomyl as their active ingredient. Rates for these products are on the container label and should be followed closely, says McGregor.

Other materials that can be used for peach scab include captan, maneb and sulfur. These are less effective but can be used in areas where scab is not a major problem. They can best be used during the period following the last scab spray and the harvest period. Sprays applied during this period are commonly called cover sprays.







## Hempstead volunteer **EMS**

By Sallie Planty

Three Emergency Medical Service units serve all of Waller County, with headquarters in Waller, Hempstead and Brookshire-Pattison. All the units are relatively new, having been founded within the last two ars in response to the needs of growing county.

The Hempstead Volunteer Emergency Corps was founded on Feb. 2, 1984 by Steve Colburn, J.D. Lousch and Dwayne Tompkins, all of whom had been ECAs for a number of years and FMTs for about four years. Now there are 15 active members in the corps and Colburn states that new recruits are being actively sought.

The Hempstead volunteers have one fully equipped ambulance and an equipment vehicle at their disposal at the present time. Another ambulance is under repairs. However, the one in operation is a traveling emergency room, according to Colburn, and can handle the most severe emergency. The corps is on call 24 hours a day, seven days a week and is able to maintain an average response time of a little more than two minutes in an area that extends to Hwy. 6 and the county line to the North, the Prairie View light

According to Colburn, the excellent response time is due to the pagers that each member wears. The pagers are connected to the Sheriff's Department and all members can be summoned simultaneously if necessary. In addition, a donated trailer home is available for those on night and weekend duty and this makes it possible for them to have the ambulance there and ready should a call

In addition, Colburn adds, a great deal of credit goes to employers in Hempstead and the surrounding area, who allow employees to leave work to respond to emergency calls.




