PEACHES

In writing to peach producers I suggest that the following questions be asked:

Were the trees sprayed for protection against worms and insects?

Was the fruit dusted to prevent brown rot?

Ask for prices f.o.b. and delivered of No. 1, 2 and culls.

Peaches will arrive in better condition if they are packed in baskets. Only the best quality of peaches should be packed in baskets because they are graded according to size and "ring-faced," They are then packed in paper liners, that is, each peach is placed in the basket by hand and covered with corrugated caps. This will be an additional cost but the peaches will probably arrive in better condition. If you are buying culls they are not graded and it would not be necessary to pay for the extra cost of "ring-faced" and packing.

TOMATOES

The "green wrap" season will be over about July 1, then tomatoes will probably be much cheaper. "Pinks" or "firm ripe" can be trucked a long distance and still be in good shape for canning. However, culls can frequently be bought that will be good for canning and for juice, although they will be "off-shape" and of various sizes. It probably will not be possible for the producer to provide lugs or baskets in which to deliver tomatoes but containers of various sizes for tomatoes might be sent along with the trucker. They should be as nearly as possible the same shape so as to conserve space.
