one that causes me more grief than the other two combined, as one of two things usually seems to happen. First, I procrastinate, thinking that when I get some time I will check it out, do the necessary studying of the problem, ask knowledgeable friends to advise me, give it a try, or dive in and see what happens. Putting it off brings on the pressure from Cheri, along with my sense of guilt for not having gotten it done, combined with the embarrassment over having my freinds or neighbors mention "how long it's been since that was working or some such pressure. Second, when I do jump into the job, it isn't long before I'm up to my knees in alligators (my discription for BIG troubles). I may not have the correct tool to get something off, or I don't have the guages necessary to measure or calibrate it, or I break part of it trying to diassemble or reassemble it. If the problem can be solved by running up to the store to get a replacement, then the trouble strikes just after the stores close, or on Sunday afternoon when all of my friends who can help are up at the lake, or down to the beach.

It is usually a sense of false pride when I risk placing a job in the "maybe" category, and I often overextend myself, leaving myself open to ridicule and shame for having ever messed with it in the first place, but I hate it when the troubleshooting guide in the back of the book says "if this, or that happens, immediately turn it over to a qualified service person". They don't understand that Waller County may not have the "qualified" person in town, or maybe he went to the beach too, after a week of fixing up other would-be mechanics' messes. I don't blame him.

Once and a while, I surprise even me, when I'm able to educate myself enough to pull one off. Completing the job sure gives me a sense of smug satisfaction, impresses the heck out of my wife, and saves me a few bucks in the bargain. It makes it a lot easier to place a job in the "call in the expert" category, when you know that you have saved up enough on past service charges to pay for this one in advance. Not really, but it makes for good rationalization, anyhow.

So, the next time it falls upon one of you to fix it for me, and you find things in a worse mess than they were when it quit, please try to understand how important it was to me to "give it a try" before calling you in on the job, and be gentle with me. I've got my pride too, you know. See you up-n-down the road. MARTY

If mowing your lawn is getting you down, you may perk up both yourself and your lawn if you note a few helpful tips from lawn and garden ex-

 Mow when cool. Mowing during the cooler part of the day helps grass grow better. Root development is best when soil is cooler. Moreover, mowing during the hotter part of the day exposes the soil to sun, slowing root growth
 Mow regularly. Intervals

between mowing should not be longer than a week. Allowing grass to grow to an excessive height before mowing will lead to a reduced root system

• Use a sharp mower. A sharp mower will keep freshness and color in your lawn. A dull-bladed mower will cause a reduction in yield and the development of a brown tinge in the lawn which may persist for several days

• Removal of clippings. Excessive clippings favor the formation of thatch restricting air and water movement. They also provide for the development of disease organisms. Some return of clippings helps retain a nutrition balance

 Mowing height. Cutting height should be raised during hot summer months, especially on northern grasses. Mowing too closely encourages shallow rooting.

Against Alcohol

The Waller Parent Peer Support Group Against Drug & Alcohol Abuse met Tuesday, May 7, in the Activity Building, at Waller Baptist Church. We now have 60 members in our organization and new members are being added each week

John Isom, group coordinator, distributed a list of hotline numbers, and a copy of the groups goals and objectives which were adopted at a previous meeting. Mr. Isom announced that a program called: "Drug Awareness Week" at Waller Schools will be scheduled in the near future. The Health classes will present the educational instruction

A petition was circulated, called SMART (Stop Marketing Alcohol on Radio and Television) for the purpose of stopping alcohol commercials on radio and television. After signatures are collected, the petition will be mailed to the President and Congress of the United States. Mr. Isom announced that Ed and Diane Rivenbark will staff the booth for drug and alcohol abuse at the annual Waller Fest, with other members of the group assisting.

In the absence of our scheduled speaker, Waller County Constable Rod Leggett advised the group on legal aspects and procedures, when a person is appreheded for possessing a controlled substance. A local parent addressed the group on their family experience and tortures, while their child was a user. Also, a Waller School student shared his story on drug abuse and discussed how, when, where and why he started using drugs, and discussed his rehabilitation. Law Enforcement Committee Chairman, Clay Cole announced to the group that the May 14 meeting would be a panel discussion. The following agencies will

comprise the panel: Waller County Sheriff, Waller Police Dept., Prairie View Police Dept., Hempstead Police Dept., Juvenile Probation Office, Waller County Constable, and a Justice of the Peace. The Waller School Board and the Administration will be represented in the audience. Special invitations have also been extended to the Waller Mayor and City Council. The purpose of this program is to receive input and advice on how we, as a group, can most effectively concentrate our efforts to make a firm committment to our law enforcement agencies, our school system, our community and our children, to eliminate the pressure and use of drugs and alcohol.

We, as a group of parents and citizens, are very concerned at the alarming rate of use and exposure our children are getung to both alcohol and drugs right here in our community. We have now begun to fight back by educating ourselves and becoming better informed on these substances and their use, availability and consequences. The May 21 meeting of the Waller Parent Peer Support Group will

feature Mrs. Gracie McClure. Houston Coordinator of Terras War on Drugs. Mrs. McClure will be showing a film titled "Epidemic". At this meeting children are invited to attend with their parents. If you have questions please call John Isom 372-9155.



The Eyesight Of Texas

Dear Dr. Doctor Redfield,

I was told by an eye doctor that I can see 20/20 In the distance, but, he gave me a prescription for glasses and said that I would see better with this prescription. I thought 20/ 20 was perfect vision, so why do I need glasses? T.P.S.

Degr T.P.S. First of all 20/20 is not

"perfect vision." It only means that you have norman vision for ng at a certain distance.

20/20 vision is only one of many vision skills that we need to adequately. A complete 500 vision examination should include testing of these other vision skills. It takes 30 to 60 minutes to thoroughly evaluate the visual status of our eyes to ensure proper ocular function. During an examination, your doctor may find that one or more elements of your visual function may need help in the form of spectacles, contact lenses or therapy.

You can, for example, have 20/ 20 vision and still not be able to "see with your side vision", see clearly for reading and other close work, or change focus from far to near without noticeable blur. Without the best correction possible for your eyes, you may be sacrificing critical depth perception, even though you can read a 20/20 eye chart.

Also, 20/20 vision does not guarantee you that your eyes are free of disease. Eye health is also evaluated during a thorough optometric examination.

Many people with their best correction or with no correction at all, can see 20/15 which is 50% better visual acuity than 20/20. A study done on the Asros and University of Houston baseball

kindergarten level only so they will have an adequate background for an accelerated educational program. The school places very strong




