A native of Maryland and graduate of Maryland State, Hoover Wright joined the Prairie View coaching staff in 1961 as an assistant to Billy Nicks. When Nicks stepped down in 1965 he named Wright to succeed him and in his first season (1966) Wright posted a 5-3-1 record.

Wright moved from football to track in 1968 and became one of the top track coaches in the nation. He was called back to the gridiron part of last year and in 1974 is directing the football coaching staff. He brings with him a 10-year head football coaching record (4 at PV) of 43-38-2.





#### SOUTHWESTERN CONFERENCE (SWAC) BRIEF HISTORY

The Southwestern Athletic Conference had its beginning as an alliance of small Texas schools in the early twenties. By mutual agreement, representatives from Jarvis, Texas College, Bishop, Prairie View and Paul Quinn met for preliminary consideration of a series of recommendations in 1921. They later acted upon the recommendations, resulting in the formal organization of the SWAC.

The function of the conference, as stated at the time, was to legislate the management and control of all intercollegiate athletics of the schools represented. With the exception of Prairie View charter membership was composed exclusively of church affiliated schools.

Later, Langston (Okla), Arkansas AM&N and Southern University were added by election. They were followed by Grambling, Alcorn A&M and Jackson State in the late fifties.

Wiley College, Marshall, Texas, the only church affiliated school holding membership in the league, dropped out in mid-summer of 1969 and was replaced by Mississippi Valley State, Itta Bena.


Today, the SWAC ranks as one of the nation's strongest small-college leagues. Conference teams have won national championships in basketball, baseball and track. The SWAC also ranks as one of the most prolific producers of professional football players, with Grambling placing next to Notre Dame in the number of active players.



The Panthers rely on Billy Isaac (235), Travis Weatherspoon (220) and Jim Sweet (180), for most of ground attack.

All NAIA defensive back David Shaw heads the secondary. Shaw leads the nation in punt returns.

# Grambling State University

### Coach Eddie Robinson Head Football Coach

Coach Eddie Robinson is a man with immense dedication and drive.

In football quarters around the country, he has been exalted for the enormous influence he has had on the game in a career spanning 33 years.

An affable, soft-spoken man with a pleasant demeanor, Robinson has been something of a miracle worker at Grambling, commanding leadership and winning consistently, while surviving the hazards of his profession in a silent, unassuming way.

Brought in to vitalize the football program in 1941, he went to work immediately building part-bypart on the road to respectability.

Robinson bucked the odds until Paul "Tank" Younger came along in 1944 to help complete the metamorphosis.

Younger, a spectacular wheelhorse fullback for four seasons, scored 60 touchdowns and earned All-American honors on his way to a scintillating pro career with the Los Angeles Rams.

Hard work and enthusiam continued to pay off for Robinson as he went about his duties with passionate fervor.

As meticulous as a lawyer preparing a brief, he adheres to the theory of attacking in strength. "Oldfashioned head knocking will always be a part of football," he declares.

Robinson didn't originate the thinking, but he stresses it as much as any coach.

A firm believer in a strong running game, his Grambling squad think, move and operate in unison.

"We emphasize running and passing together for an adequate offensive balance," he explains.

There isn't much argument that his gift for organizing and a knack for arriving at effectual decisions are the keys to Grambling's success. He displays a lot of moxie with bold, unhesitant action.

The Grambling mentor has an insatiable appetiate for big strong backs and massive linemen. He recruits them by box-car lot.


Robinson casually told a sportswriter several seasons ago, "I like my players agile, hostile, mobile and elephantile."

It is not unusual for him to field offensive and defensive alignments averaging 265-pounds from end-to-end.

Grambling plays a coast-to-coast schedule each year and Robinson's coaching feats have assumed epiclike proportions. And he seems to improve his handicraft each season.

Without frills or embellishments, Robinson has compiled a remarkable 225-80-11 won-loss record while developing more than 100 players who starred in professional football.

Only Paul "Bear" Bryant of the University of Alabama with 232 victories has scored more wins among active coaches.



Off the field, Robinson has a down-to-earthness that impresses people on their first meeting, and a strong, well-disciplined sense of loyalty that lines them up as friends.

His coaching peers widely recognize him for two traits — resourcefulness and imagination. Robinson is also a recruiter without peer.

Few coaches possess his drive, fire and commanding presence.

When he took the Grambling job back in the summer of '41, a psychology of failure hung over the campus. His first year was beset with doubt and indecision.

However, the vicissitudes of that season didn't discourage him.

He likes to recall that "We didn't have much to look ahead to, but even less to look back on."

Today, Grambling is a household word in college and professional football circles.

It is almost impossible to watch a pro game on TV without a Grambling product in the lineup.

Widely respected as a humorist, Robinson has built a reputation as a fine public speaker. He holds membership in numerous professional organizations.


Two years ago he served as National President of NAIA.

When it comes to names, some people, some institutions, some places have all the luck.

Take Grambling College, for instance. It's now officially GRAMBLING STATE UNIVERSITY, as of July 1, 1974. But in every respect, it's still just Grambling. Oh, it's true that a bit of stationery and a few documents will have to be reprinted, a few road signs revised, a new batch of T-shirts and pennants stocked up and put on display, and secretaries and switchboard operators will have three more syllables to enunciate from saying Grambling College to Grambling State University.

Grambling State University, a new name yes, but actually an old story. One that began about 74 years ago when a group of concerned citizens, the North Louisiana Farmer's Relief Association, made the bold decision to establish a school in the rolling hills of north central Louisiana, patterned somewhat after Tuskegee Institute in Alabama. They even insisted upon having a Tuskegee man to head the school, who turned out to be Charles P. Adams.


There are now a lot of recorded epic in-between developments, but the school **was** established, moving from literally no status, to high school status, to normal school status, to three-year college status, to four-year, degree-granting status, and now to university status. And what's truly significant about it all is that it happened in a fairly short while, as far as the life of institutions of higher education go, and more amazing still, it all happened in an allegedly isolated area, where by all odds and circumstances, it couldn't be done. But it did happen. What happened? What happened is pretty simple when you look into it. What happened was that, from the very beginning, the school started off and indeed was founded upon the idea of basic concern for people, especially for the individual himself, but also for his family, for his community, for his state, and for his nation.

So what happened was that a unique outreach was generated, something called and known nationwide as "The Grambling Spirit", a unique slogan became automatic, the school where "Everybody is Somebody", and a captivating and deeply respected image created, which is now a part of the American Lingo — academics, sports, music, society, human relations, community development, you name it, GRAMBLING.

Grambling State University, yes. One could catalog the Divisions of Basic Studies, Education, Liberal Arts, Applied Sciences and Technology, and Graduate Studies, with all of the academic departments and the ramifications thereto. One could set forth numerous cold bare facts regarding the more than 15,000 graduates generally placed and working successfully in all lines of human endeavor, or speak of communities developed, or of numerous "firsts' and championships and assorted rarities experienced.....

But no matter, it all boils down to GRAMBLING. So whatever the statistic, whatever the occasion, wherever it is, whoever it is, its Grambling. A university, a town, a special spirit, a special image.

And the great story is, as stated in the beginning, everybody likes it that way.




