

When one has an audience as intense and fascinated as this one, it's hard to avoid being a bit of a ham, what with definitions. explanations, and examples having to be given, but Andy has proved to be a rapt student of the sophisticated art of pumpkinry over the years, and this year the challenge came.

My guess is that a conspiracy developed between him and his grandma, as often happens against the grandpas of this world, and as we were washing the pumpkins and getting them hollowed out for the operation, andy's "lawyer" suggested that maybe he could carve "just a little one"to see if he had learned anything from our past surgeries. I was very nervous about

Bentsen Bill Denies Trade Break To Terrorist States

Washington, D.C. Senator Lloyd Bentsen introduced to countries that support terrorism special trade privileges reserved for nations friendly to the United States.

The Bentsen bill would effectively double most of the tariffs Iran, Syria and

Libya pay on exports to the United States by revoking the Most Favored Nation status of those countries. "We are all grateful that four men allegedly involved in the hijacking of the Italian cruise ship Achille Lauro have been apprehended and will stand trial for the murder of Leon Klinghofer, an American citizen, " Bentsen said in remarks accompanying his legislation. "It is fair to say, though, that terrorism directed against U.S. citizens and property in the Middle East will not be ended by the successful apprehen-



sion of these men, because much of the terrorism in legislation that war-rayaged part of Monday that would deny the world is state-sponsored. Much of it can be attributed to three countries: Iran, Libya and Syria.

> The Iranians, we can say to a moral certainty were the force behind the bombings of the U.S. Embassy and embassy annex and the US Marine Barrucks in Beirut The Libyans and Colonel Qaddafi have established themselves as supporters of terrorism not just in the Middle East, but here in the United States as well. And the Syrians, despite the help they may have given us during the TWA hijacking last summer, are strong supporters of the PLO."

"Each of these countries has been named by the U.S. Secretary of State as a supporter of international terrorism."

The Bentsen bill would deny trade preferences including Most Favored Nation status, to any country listed by the Secretary of State as a supporter of terrorism.

During the first seven months of this year the three countries affected by the legislation exported goods valued at almost \$280 million to the U.S. The bill would double duties on crude oil from Iran and naptha from Libya, among other items, and it would triple the tariff on Syrian tobacco.

By ending the favorable Cariff treatment of these terrorist-supporting nations, we will give additional credibility to the action we took last Thursday night in bringing the four PLO hijackers to custody where they can be tried for their crimes, Bentsen said.

"This legislation tells nations that support terrorism: You cannot do so with impunity. You cannot o so and continue to enjoy the trade benefits we give our friends," Senator Bentsen said.

he Eyesight Why can't I see as Of Texas

Q. Why can't I see as clearly at night as compared to daytime? I do not wear glasses.

Paula Hughes
A. Many people see very
well during the day and do
very well on the usual eye
chart. However, there
may be factors present in
your visual system that
can cause your visual
acuity to worsen under
dimmer conditions.

When illumination is lower such as driving at night, some people tend to assume a slightly near-sighted (or myopic) posture This condition is referred to as "night Myopia".

When there is lowered lighting, there may be fewer visual cues for your eyes to naturally focus. In response to this the eyes may overfocus (or overaccomodate) in attempts to see clearer. As a result, instead of making things at night easier to see and clearer, the eyes can make your vision more blurry. Researchers also feel that the bigger your pupils get in the dark, the more we tend to be nearsighted.

To help with this problem,

your optometrist can do special tests to determine what type of optical power may be needed. Usually, the spectacles will end up being low in power and may be used by the patient only at night or under dimly lit situations. This relatively simple solution can offer needed relief to people who do experience night-myopia.

Some people experience a very drastic difference in their ability to see in darker situations. For example, if you have a very difficult time walking around in a dimly lit restuarant, you may be a victim of an eye desease called Retinitis Pigmentosa. Your optometrist can tell if this is your problem by examining the inside of your eyes. Retinitis Pigmentosa is a hereditary

disease that leads to severe vision loss and at this time, has no effective treatment.



Prussic Acid Poisining Presents Problem in Livestock

Frost will be hitting Walfer County before long, and this could lead to prussic acid poisoning in livestock grazing certain pasture grasses and forage, points out Mr. David McGregor, County Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. Our average frost date is around November 24th.

Although many plants contain the toxic material that causes poisoning, those causing the highest mortality in livestock when grazing after they have been frozen and wilted are Johnson and Sudan grasses and sorghum or hybrids of these.

The most dangerous time as far as the grazing of these plants is concerned is following frost when the plant material begins to wilt. emphasizes McGregor. Livestock should not be allowed access to the willed material until it has dried complete-This usually takes three or four days of good sunlight. New plant growth usually becomes nontoxic and can be grazed within 10 days to two weeks following a rain. As far as prussic acid poisoning is concerned, the poison acts rapidly and can kill animals within minutes. In most acute cases, animals become affected within 10-15 minutes after eating toxic material and can die in two to three minutes. Symptoms may include a brief period of stimulation followed by depression and paralysis. Signs of colic may be present. Stupor Noss of sensibility), difficult breathing and frequent convulsions may result. Death is caused by suffocation since oxygen remains in the blood and is not exchanged to the tissues. This and causes the

blood to appear bright red.

To prevent prossic acid

poisoning in livestock,

McGregor outlines these

steps

1. Allow plant material affected by frost to dry thoroughly before grazing. This may require a week or more of good sunlight.

2. Feed animals hay or a supplement before turning them in on plants that may contain prussic acid. Animals that are not hungry will not be affected as seriously by toxic material since their intake will be limited.

3. Remove all animals


the 2,000 people in the stands watched as the football contest unfolded. The kickoff was at 7:30 PM with ASU receiving.



STATE SESQUI-NEWS

A stroll down a brandnew riverwalk paved with bricks initialled by sponsors will complete Orange County citizens' gala Sesquicentennial observance next March 1 & 2, when Phase I of a \$125,000 downtown plaza improvement project is completed. This "facelift" for the Sabine river is just one example of the many permanent civic improvement projects that are underway in honor of Texas' 150th birthday in 1986, with hundreds of thousands of dollars being spent statewide on lasting reminders of Pexas' proud year. From the renovation of Fair Park in Dallas. financed by city bonds, to the ambitious museum/ Buffalo Bayou renovation project of the city of Houston, even the larger cities are getting into the

And plans for the actual celebration, scheduled to begin in January, are proceeding at a breakneck speed as hundreds of thosands of cummunity and association organizers gear up to stage the nearly 10,000 events that will take place place throughout 1986.

"There is no doubt that the Texas Sesquicentennial will be the biggest celebration in the history of the state, with events and activities planned by nearly 2,000 communities and statewide associations," said Lynn Nabers, Sesquicentennial Commission Executive Director. As of the last meeting of the Commission, 1,800 community and association committees were either pending official sanction or had already received sanction from the Commission as Texas Independence Communities, Counties or Associa-

Plans of the local committees are as varied and colorful as Texas itself. Tying it all together is a 3,000mile Wagon Train, which will circle the state during the first six months of 1986 and pass through nearly 100 communities.

"The Sesquicentennial Commission has operated from day one on the basis that we were panning a grass roots celebration to be executed on the local level by the committees. And it is evident that each of these committees has done a supurb job," said Nabors. "The Sesquicentennial will be the biggest, most exciting celebration Texas has ever
