Our Story Begins . . .

On April 19, 1876 Governor Oran M. Roberts approved and signed and established Prairie View as a branch of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas. Founders Day is celebrated on March 11, marking that triumphant day in 1878 when Prairie View's doors were finally opened.

Records are unclear as to who performed the duty of determining and securing a place for the institution ordered by the legislative act, but it is assumed that W.E. Minor of Mississippi was appointed by the Board of Directors to do this. He visited and chose this site which was then called Alta Vista and was formerly the Kirby plantation. In fact the Old Kirby Building served the purpose of dormitory, laundry, recitation room and - all in the dawning of Prairie View's day. Prairie View's early years were dominated by the concentration of Agricultural study. The school never had an enrollment of over 140 pupils annually in the first 17 years of its existence. This is because in those days many students were given employment to pay for part of their education, and until 1909 most employees were appointed by the state. After 1909 enrollment increased because the funds for the "appointment system" were abolished by the Twenty sixth Legislature. In 1917 the record enrollment so far was over 925 students. This information was included in the first yearbook produced at Prairie View. This was the 1917 edition of "the Prairie." It was also said in that book that the name of our school was "coined" when W.E. Minor and Richard "Dad" Wells were taken in by the view of the surrounding prairie from their vantage point in the attic of the old Kirby Hall.

The second Yearbook, or annual, produced at Prairie View was also titled "The Prairie" and came out in 1926. It is to this book that we dedicate this issue. The picture across the top of these pages was also taken in the 1925-26 school year. It depicts the entire student body of the time.

L. W. Minor was selected as the first principal of Prairie View by Thomas, S. Gaithright of Texas A & M. On March 11, 1878, Professor Minor enrolled eight young men as the first Negro students to enter a state-supported college in Texas. However, the school was forced to close the next term due to lack of students and funds.

E.H. Anderson, minister-teacher of Memphis and Fisk Univ., became the second principal when the school reopened October 6, 1879 with an initial 36 students. E.H. Anderson was plagued by economic distress and conflicting laws; however, he saw Prairie View through the storms until his death on Oct. 28, 1885 at 35.

L.C. Anderson became the third principal when his brother died. During his 10 years the Agriculture and Mechanical and girl's industrial departments were added, as well as many other improvements. He was a leader in his profession and worked untiringly. He also founded the Colored Teachers Assoc. in Texas.








E.L. Backshear was elected the fourth principal in 1895, and brought what he learned in public school work and from Booker T. Washington. Mr. Washington addressed the first commencement. During his 20 years the school expanded vastly and intercollegiate athletics was introduced.

I.M. Terrell, the fifth principal, came from Fort Worth in 1915. During his three years physical improvements were made despite the world war. The ROTC was introduced in 1918 and later the Cooperative Extension.

J.G. Osborne became the sixth principal in 1918 after acting as such. A medical doctor, he strengthened the Natural Science offering and created the nursing Division. The campus was expanded further and the four-year senior college was begun.

W.R. Banks became the seventh principal in 1926, ending a 50 year era that shaped the Prairie View of today.

Mr. Banks retired in August, 1947 as Principal Emeritus, after accomplishing major physical and educational improvements. He witnessed two name changes and increased the school's status and efficiency, making possible certain master's degrees.

The first name was established by the legislative act that created the school. It was used in 1878-79. With the onslaught of the training patterns of the New England "Normal" school, the second name welcomed students at the reopening in late 1879. In 1889, after additions to Prairie View's curriculum, the Twenty-Sixth Legislature changed to the third name. The fourth name was incurred in 1945 after many improvements in the school's program. However, two years later, in 1947, the fifth name was created by the Fiftieth Legislature. Just in time for the Centennial celebration of Prairie View, the Sixth and present name was adopted.



It is the spirit of Prairie View, the spirit which has made it possible and which assures its perpetuity as the guiding spirit of the Negro youth of Texas."





In the past few years we have carefully observed our fellow students in the routine of their scholastic duties and in the pleasure of their social life.





Mission And Purpose






What do the years mean? For man or institution, if they are filled with the honest sweat of service to humanity — with the patient following of that higher law of unflinching fidelity to the dictates of a calling — the years are a benediction.

Prairie View is an institution — a public institution. But an institution is an empty thing without the beating hearts and yearning souls of mortal men . . . men have lived and dreamed here until every blade of grass and every rock, in that wise primordial way in which the primitive earth knows the cares, has joined the choir invisible to bless their memory. For every man whose foot has touched this hallowed soil has found spirit, and has broadened and deepened it until what started out as an aimless meandering stream has become a purposeful river upon whose tide, now turbulent, now tranquil, floats the destiny of countless human hopes and dreams.





The giants, the world shakers, have stood on our hill to mingle their search for truth with the fledgling's hope for life. And men of dedication have worked here — worked to bring a new heaven and a new earth often only with faith and their hands — often without the spiritual or material compensation that their sacrifices merited — but always with a sense that somehow, some way, time would reward their efforts — would give to those to whom they had given their minds the victory of a new world — of an enlightened society.

Could we do better . . . than pay homage to this amalgam, this spirit? Can we do less than dedicate our lives to the task fostering it, nurturing it, stimulating it — that those who will walk this ground, these halls, will know, and be better men because of it?




... Our Heritage and Traditions



Week 93 - 94



The Gilpin Players

The Gilpin Players were organized in 1939 by Dr. Charles Sasser. The Gilpin Players are 65 years old this year.

The Gilpin Players were named after the famous Black actor Charles Gilpin. Gilpin was the first Afro-American to make an outstanding contribution to theatre. He played the roles of OTHELLO AND THE

EMPEROR JONES to critical acclaim.

He gave his life to art. The performing arts organization of the theatre arts program in the Department of Art, Music and Drama at Prairie View A&M University is the Charles Gilpin Players. Then and now the Gilpins are an excellent troupe. This renowned theatre troupe has as its components a Mime Troupe. Five major main-stage productions, a new faces show student directed one act plays, acting style classroom production and plays for special occasions and holidays make up the yearly theatre season for the Gilpins. In addition, there are several musical and cabaret shows the troupe tours throughout the south-west.

In 1989, the Gilpin Players honored Dr. Earl L. Sasser, founder of the Charles Gilpin Players during the 60th anniversary commemoration convocation. Also during that year the troupe prepared a special performance on Cross Cultural Casting for the Southwest Theatre Conference held in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

In 1990 was the year when the Texas Education Theatre Association (TETA) honored the sponsor of the Gilpin Players, C. Lee Turner, with the prestigious "TETA Teacher of the year Award." Additional accolades were bestowed upon this outstanding troupe when six graduating seniors were awarded scholarships to graduate school at the famed California Institute of the Arts in Acting, Stage Management and Design.

The tradition of excellence continued in 1991, when the award-winning Gilpin Players were incited by the Texas Democratic Party to perform as part of the Pre-Inaugural Victory Celebration for newly elected Governor Ann Richards. In November at the West Texas ACTF held on the campus of the University of Texas at El Paso, the Gilpins received three Irene Ryan Acting Awards, Best Light Design, Best Makeup Design, Best Ensemble Acting Ward and three Certifications for Highest Honors In Critical Analysis.

In 1992, the Gilpin Players presented their regular main stage production as well as tours to neighboring cities for Black History Month. A Highlighted the spring semester for 1992, was an encore performance of "The Shadow Box" by Micheal Cristofer, plus performances for the Texas Black Historian Society in Austin, Texas and the East Texas Folk Festival In Hunts-

ville. The year the Gilpins' among the "creme de la creme." Miss Evers' Boys, their 1993 entry into the American Theatre College Festival Texas, won eight (8) of the eleven (11) awards included the prestigious Critic's Choice Award and the Best Director's Award.

On the other hand, that part may be played with great care as to every detail, with much preparation, with the thought ever in view that: "no man lives to himself alone", but that we are building character for each other for inspiration.


With this idea in view, Prairie View A&M University 1985-87 Yearbook staff decided that it was time to reveal the men who were striving to learn the lesson of true success, and thus planting such footprints on "the sands of time" that observing them one will be impressed, and encouraged to follow them, seeing they lead to excellence, not only here at Prairie View A&M, but in our society. The path had been set in 1983 when Thomas Carol was selected as Mr. Prairie View A&M University following his performance in the campus Talent and Fashion Show.

Hence, in the late 80's, Prairie View A&M University was in the process of "Entering a New Dimension" in the sands of time. The year 1987 was embarked upon by the First Annual Mr. Prairie View University Scholarship Pageant, which was held on April 28 in the Memorial Student center Ballroom. The purpose of this contest was to honor those men whose footprints led in the direction of success, leadership, and excellence: men of great caliber who possessed such qualities and leadership characteristics that made them worthy to be "Lord of Pantherland" and hold such a prestigious title as "Mr. Prairie View A&M University."

Although the other contestants were competitive and the sands appeared a little quickening at times, Mr. Ricky Valentino LaFontaine was selected as the winner, thus becoming the first "Mr. Prairie View A&M University" selected by a panel of judges.

During the exploration of this "New Dimension," the Yearbook staff discovered that Mr. Prairie View A&M University would not only serve as an honor to men of this outstanding university, but also to women by serving as the official escort for Miss Prairie View A&M University.

In 1988, the pageant received formal recognition by the Office of Student Activities, where Mr. Prairie View A&M was elevated to the level of Miss Prairie View A&M University and received some of the same amenities prizes including scholarship and housing. Homer Smith, Jr. of Dallas, Texas formally participated in the Royal Coronation




for Miss Prairie View A&M University. This year also marked the acceptance and respect for the male pageant concept. The increase in pageant contestants caused the pageant to relocate to Hobart Taylor Recital Hall.

The 90's ushered in a new era for the Mr. Prairie View A&M University Scholarship Pageant. The pageant was enhanced by the candidates and the rules which received a widespread recognition and taken to new heights. Mr. Prairie View A&M participated in various campus activities as well as community based events. The pageant also served as the impetus for the creation for the Mr. Collegiate African American Scholarship Pageant for Black college men in 1991. Mr. Deosick Burney, a Junior Accounting major Los Angeles, California became the 1st Runner-up to Mr. Collegiate African American at the first pageant on April 4, 1992.

Ron Washington- is a twenty-two year old Senior Architecture major from Port Arthur, Texas. He is the son of Mr. & Mrs. Ike Washington, Jr. He aspires to obtain his degree in Architecture to own and operate RW Enterprise; and to publish his first book of poetry called "The Daybreak of Life."




Founded at Cornell University, December 4, 1906 by seven innovative Black men Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, incorporated is the oldest predominately Black Collegiate Fraternity. These seven men we proudly call Jewels are Henry A. Callis, Charles H. Chapman, Eugene K. Jones, George B. Kelly, Nathaniel A. Murray, Robert H. Ogle, and Vertner W. Tandy. "First of all, servants of all, we shall transcend all", is the motto of the fraternity and it has been the endeavor of its members to make this axiomatic truth, a living reality. Originally organized to promote brotherhood among Black men on college campus and to assist the graduate in realizing his career goals, the fraternity has since widened its scope to include programs serving many other segments of culturally diverse American and International communities.

Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, the precursor of all Black Greek Letter Organization, has a long distinguished history of involvement, achievement and leadership in civil and human rights efforts. Its leadership was evident when it launched a national Voter Registration drive under the rally theme "A Voteless People is a Hopeless People." Its 'Go to High School - Go To College' program was equally successful. These dynamic social action programs placed the fraternity in the forefront of leadership roles in the development and delivery of services to the masses. The fraternity has agreements with the March of Dimes and the Boys Scouts of America to work in conjunction with them in providing leadership and responsibility training for young men. Alpha stands equally committed today to the causes that serve the interest and common good of mankind.

There are many famous people that are members of Alpha Phi Alpha. They include Brothers Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., U.S. Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall, Atlanta Mayor Maynard Jackson, Ambassador Andrew Young, Gold Medalist Jessie Owens, and many many more.



On January 16, 1920, five young ladies founded Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Inc. These ladies, Arizona Cleaver, Fannie Watts, Myrtle Tyler, Viola Tyler and Pearl Neal, with the help of frat brothers Robert and Charles Taylor, created the organization on the campus of Howard University in Washington, D.C. Zeta was created to be the "official" sisters to Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Inc. These two organizations are constitutionally bound together.

Back in 1922, during times of severe oppression of blacks, segregation, blatant discrimination, and Jim Crow Laws, at Butler University in Indianapolis, seven black school teachers came together with an idea that is now a legacy.

These young women had a vision. They witnessed the hardship that our people were facing and decided to unite and fight against the oppression before them. So, they created an outlet "for all womankind who are interested in every phase of education." This vision on November 12, 1922 became known as Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority. On December 30, 1929, it was recognized

nationally as the fourth historically black, incorporated collegiate sorority.

Chapters continue to render community service in the areas of education via the sorority's national projects. Some of these projects are Assault on Illiteracy, Emphasis on Elderly, Project Africare, and Project Reassurance.

Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority, Inc. gives leadership service, and resources toward removing barriers and inequalities so that all people of America may develop their potential and exercise full citizenship. We are committed to slogan "Greater Service, Greater Progress."





THE FRATERNAL ORDER OF CLASSY GENTLEMEN

The club also participates in moot court competition and offers free tutorials for all law classes offered on campus. It is a small club but it is very active and effective. Prairie View






The Prairie View A & M University Choir was established in the early days of the university – the exact date is not known. From interviews it is concluded that the first choir appeared in the late 1800s. The earliest choral director that we have record of is Dr. Oscar Anderson Fuller, who is credited with writing lyrics for the Prairie View Alma Mater.


Other directors who served as builders of the Prairie View Choral Tradition were Rudolph E. Charlton, Dr. Nicholas Gray, Dr. Robert A. Henry, Dr. H. Edison Anderson and Mr. Thomas Wallace. The current Director of the Prairie View University Choir is Mr. Curtis Everett Powell.

The Prairie View Music Department became the nucleus for a new movement on the black college campus. The two choir systems, the A Cappella Choir, and the University Chorale. The two groups concertized in most of the major cities of America, the Commonwealth of the Bahamas, Mexico and Canada. The chorale has performed with the Houston Symphony Orchestra and has had several premiere performances of new compositions. The chorale participated in the Houston Grand Opera world professional premier of Scott Joplin's Opera Treemonisha.

The Prairie View A & M University Choir has a wide and versatile repertoire, which includes music representing each of the historical periods: Western Music, African-American spirituals, Gospel and Popular/Broadway tunes. The Prairie View Choir is not strictly for music majors. In fact, more than 89% of the students are enrolled in academic disciplines other than music.

Mr. Powell joined the Prairie View A & M University music department during the fall semester of 1991. He also serves as organist and director at the Wheeler Avenue Baptist Church in Houston, Texas. Mr. Powell holds membership and has participated in many professional organizations in his field. He is a member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity. In 1990 he received a proclamation from the Community Leaders of America for his outstanding service to the music profession. In 1989 he traveled with a Special Directors Tour of Italy as a part of Arts Development Agency of Princeton, New Jersey. Mr. Powell encourages all students to join. President Julius Wesley Becton's public service career includes two key federal positions after nearly 40 years of service in the U.S. Army and rising to the rank of lieutenant general. He is the first graduate of Prairie View A&M University to attain star rank in the military. In November 1989 The Texas A&M University System Board of Regents unanimously elected him President of Prairie View A&M University.

After receiving his B.S. degree in mathematics from Prairie View A&M University in 1960, he later earned his M.A. degree in economics from the University of Maryland in 1967. He is also a graduate of top military schools, including the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College, the Armed Forces Staff College and the National War College. He holds honorary degrees from Huston-Tillotson College in Austin and Muhlenberg College in Allentown, Pennsylvania.

He enlisted in the U.S. Army in July 1944 and graduated from Officer's Candidate School in 1945. A veteran of World War II and the Korean and Vietnam conflicts, he has served in many positions at posts throughout this country. Overseas duties carried him to Germany, the Philippines, France, the Southwest Pacific, Korea, and Japan. His active duty assignments included Deputy Commanding General, U.S. Army Training and Doctrine Command; Commander, VII U.S. Corps in Germany; Commander, 1st Cavalry Division; Commander, U.S. Army Test and Evaluation Agency.

He served 22 months as director of the Office of U.S. Foreign Disaster Assistance before being nominated by the President and confirmed by the Senate as director of the Federal Emergency Management Agency, a position he held for nearly four years before moving into the private sec-


tor. Prior to his acceptance of the position of president of Prairie View A&M University, he served as chief operating officer for American Coastal Industries.



One thing he would like to leave with the students of P.V.'s: that you can be anything you want to be if you try.





The Rev. Clarence Taley, Sr., professor of art at Prairie View A&M University, was born in Pineville, a small town in central La., and raised in Alexandria, just across the Red River from Pineville. He became interested in art as a third-grader. He recalls watching a classmate, next to him, drawing stick figures. "I remember being fascinated by what I saw, because he made his figures come alive and look real. So I asked him to show me how it was done. It was a lesson I never forgot."

He later began drawing Superhero pictures and producing back drops for school plays. By the time he entered high school, he was winning district and state competitions. He graduated from Southern University in 1973 and received his master's from Louisiana State University in 1975. He began teaching at Prairie View the same year. He prefers painting oils over watercolors, wood sculpture and assemblage pieces.

Talley, who is known for his vivid art paintings, was recently included in the 1993 Who's Who in Black America. He has competed in many individual and group exhibitions and has won numerous awards. He won the Purchase Prize Winner, entitled "21st National Works on Paper Exhibition" at Minot State University in Minot, North Dakota. During the summer months and school breaks, he enjoys traveling around with his art.

I asked Mr. Talley how he sees the future for his work. He said, "All I want to do is more work of a religious nature." The advice that he would like to share with future artists is, "follow your heart, love the craft, produce, produce, produce like there is no tomorrow and get as much training as you possibly can get out of the field of art."

the pain you have deep inside?


Being a giant is having a heart
