

Students Attend Leadership Institute

Five students from Prairie View A & M attended the first Texas College Leadership Institute, March 14-16, at the Holiday Hills Resort, Wimberley, Texas.

Attending from here were Bobby D. Freddie, Armond J. Hathaway, Morris X. Winn, Jr., Lawrence A. White, and Andrew G. Washington.

In all, 75 outstanding student leaders and 45 campus officials from 20 Texas colleges and universities participated.

The course was conducted by The National Leadership Institute, a private non-profit organization headquartered at Austin, under a grant from the Humble Oil Education Foundation.

These institutes provide advanced leadership training based on industrial management techniques. Robert T. Davis, NLI president, says the curriculum has been designed to emphasize those human relations concepts the campus leader requires to exercise sound leadership. Students invited to attend were selected on the basis of academic achievement and campus leader-

The institute was directed by Dr. Paul Rothaus, who holds a Ph. D. degree in clinical psychology and has had extensive experience in sensitivity training labs. He reports that the course objective is to give the student participant an experience in interpersonal relationships where his personal needs for self-fulfillment are recognized in relation to his needs for acceptance by a group.

The Humble Oil Education Foundation started this advanced leadership training for outstanding college students in 1967 and sessions of the Institute have been conducted with outstanding success in several other parts of the country.

Two Year Program To Be Expanded

The two-year ROTC Program, authorized by the ROTC Vitalization Act of 1964, has become increasingly popular nationwide. It has developed, however, somewhat differently from its original purpose of extending the advantages of ROTC to junior college graduates and students in the four-year colleges who could not participate in ROTC during their first two years. The program is also designed for Veterans who qualify.



Today's Students Are Treated Like Packaged Goods! Dr. Mead Charges

New York, March 19, 1969-Anthropologist Dr. Margaret Mead charged, in an article released today, that today's students are treated like "packaged goods" and said that the older generation is to blame for the current student revolts and the restlessness of young people everywhere.

Writing in the current issue of Redbook magazine, Dr. Mead accused the older generation of "failure" to plan adequately for the increase in young people it was warned against. "Twenty years ago we talked glibly about the 'baby boom' and then about the dire effects of the population explosion. But in spite of all our talking, what we did to prepare for masses of young people was on too small a scale, shoddy and too late."

"The result has been crowding, poor facilities, schools in antiquated or unsuitable temporary buildings, poorly trained teachers (and far too few of them), inadequate supplies and - inevitably - irritability, impatience and strained relations between students and teachers and between students and the administrators who have to keep things going," Dr. Mead declared.

She said students "are treated as irresponsible minors subject to the most arbitrary decisions. Many of them hope that now, when they are learning to think as individuals. they will be treated as individuals. What they find instead is that they are treated like packaged goods - so many to be processed, pushed through the educational maze, examined and granted degrees at the end of a standard course."

Dr. Mead attributed the "hostile attacks by the young on the old and the established" to a "profound distrust" of all those in power. "We speak of the generation gap, but I believe this distrust is the mirror image of the distrust members of the older generation, living in a world they feel has got out of hand, have for themselves and one another."

"What has happened," Dr. Mead said, "is that we have displaced onto the young our own sense of malaise, our distrust of our ability to cope with the deep changes we have brought about in the world; and the young are acting on our communication to them. Our distrust is clear, I think, from the emphasis we have

"The danger is that as long as we continue to distrust ourselves, as long as we continue to respond with alarm instead of conceding with honesty that our world is not as we would wish it to be, our and their distrust can only grow and spread to include new and still younger groups."

Dr. Mead said we are "mistaken" if we view student power as no more than a new version of traditional student restlessness or the "creation" of mass media. Calling student power a "reality," she warned that the problem it poses is not how to contain it or know to meet its immediate demands. "The problem now is how to bridge the ever-widening generation gap and find a new basis for trust that both generations can share."

Industrial Education "Thank Tank"

What is education except a clearing house for ideas? A College plays many roles as an education - that of counselor, teacher, cafe, hotel, and parent, but its real function is that of clearing house for old and new ideas. The educator must be flexible to be able to take ideas, sort them out, and put them in the proper perspective for his

The colleges role is not finished upon graduation of the student. True, industry, elementary, secondary, technical schools, as well as junior colleges has its own methods of orientation of teachers. But, these agencies know that they must be receptive to new ideas and methods to be able to perform its function of growth and development of the students they serve, so they continue to look toward the college as a "Think Tank" to provide these services.

Instructors and industrial personnel cannot, however attend nine months of school and still maintain their instructional or industrial services. The way out of this dilemma seems to be found in short courses or seminars in specialized and concentrated areas of study. Here, instructors attend a short course or seminar on campus to obtain exposure in this "Think Tank" atmosphere to other peoples knowledge and experience. A Thought For You

This is part of a tape-recorded lecture by F. T. Hawkins to his class during his absence from the college.

Let us think about this situation which we call education. Let us think about this discipline called mathematics. Why should we study mathematics? Because it teaches us to think, to reason and to imagine. The very broath of this subject noses difficulties. The teacher recognizes the necessity of the limited amount of materials covered in a course of mathematics. This leads to a challenge. The abiding impulse of every human being is to seek order and harmony in his way of thinking. Therefore "a thought for you".

Remember as we probe nto what we feel will lead to success tomorrow, we must ask question after question. How else to learn? Not by finding answers to the questions, but rather by finding better questions to be answered.

In this course the novice usually complains that he is too ignorant to ask questions. How should he make a beginning? Let him ask himself a question, any question. If it seems empty or trivial, in that very judgment, he has begun to learn. He, then, makes another question and vet another without pausing for an answerfor he is not searching for an answer, but for a pertinent and sound question that is worth an answer. Indeed, the real genius of a thinker lies in framing the essential question, in insisting on making clear what the problem is that he wants to solve.

Learning requires an active curiosity as to the how and why of things and an alert sense of observation. Nevertheless, the mere noting of events, even if done with a photographic eve to detail, does not interpret what they mean. The camera merely records, it is only the artist who can give meaning to a picture, for he creates order through selection in accordance with a mind's sense of values.

Broadly speaking, the purpose of education is to develop one's critical sense and judgment of values in matters rolating to mankind. It is the manner of learning, not the accumulation of knowledge, that distinguishes the educated mind. Whatever the situation, the keen inquisitive determination of the trained thinker seeks out the fundamental ideas, discard the irrelevant material, and neatly organizes the learnod results.

The President's proclamation paid tribute to Girl Scouts of the U.S. A. on its 57th birthday, and hailed the firmness of purpose which has guided the lives of many million Girl Scout members since the organization's founding on March 12.

Dr. Thomas called upon all citizens of Prairie View to give Girl Scouts their "continued interest, cooperation, and support so that an increasing number of girls may benefit from a program which also benefits each and every one of us."

Girl Scouting was founded in Savannah, Georgia, in 1912 by Juliette Gordon Low, who brought the idea home from England with the statement "I've got something for the girls!" The movement has grown in this country from an original troop of 18 girls to an organization of three and three-fourth



Use Preaddressed Tax Forms

Taxpayers who received a 1968 Form 1040A or a Form 1040 with a pre-addressed label on it are urged to file that form if it fits their needs and they are eligible to use it.

Allison B. Clark, administrative officer of Internal Revenue for Brenham, said recently that substantial savings will be realized if the form provided is used because fewer key-punch operations are necessary to process the return. "It also helps us utilize the full capabilities for which the Automatic Data Processing system was designed," he said.

If your name or address has changed, make the necessary corrections by striking lightly through the preprinted information. If you have a refund due, this will help insure delivery of the check to the correct address.

Taypayers should also verify that their correct social security number is entered on the return they file.

Most taxpayers are able to prepare their returns themselves by closely following the instructions.


