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

I tried to dial that local number several times, and it never would ring for me. Silence. Dead air. Of course the first thing I think of when that happens, and it happens often, is that every customer of ours in Waller has probably tried to call, and all got the same results. Of course, I did what all of us in this area have been trained to do through many years of this kind of service, I called the operator, and she dialed it for me. It worked perfectly for her.

I guess that all of us know better than to believe what we're told on the famous recordings we often get when we try to place a direct dial call, or a local call around here. One might assume than when "the number has been disconnected or is no longer in service", than the person has moved away, or the business is no longer in business. Right? Wrong! So far this month, I've gotten this recording for two school districts, a bank, my business, my home, and several of my friends' homes, offices, or businesses. We have all learned to simply ignore the recordings, and try to figure out some other way to communicate, or beat the system, by calling the operator and getting her/him to dial it for us. This must cost the phone company a lot of money for labor, and you'd think that things would get better

I know that they aren't trying to "get" any of us, and that they are trying their best to make it all work, but it simply isn't happening. The price goes up, and the service goes down. At least it seems that way to me.

We all know how the folks at the southern part of Waller County feel about being the "poor cousins", with all of the county's services being located up here. Ask them what they think about the phone company's decision to split us up into two different area codes, but be ready to listen for quite a spell. You're going to get an ear full. It's my opinion that somebody, somewhere in the phone company, has been given the title of "Vice-President in Charge of and Deteriorating Service". I'll bet his paycheck is a whopper, as he has to be the busiest guy in the company.

There will be four stops during this Field Day and Tour with registration to begin between 8:30 and 9:00 a.m. The first tour stop will be at Lindsey's Rice Mill in Hockley. During this stop you will get a chance to see a rice milling operation, procedure, etc. Tour stop number two will be the Bud Adams Swine Farm. Individuals will

get a chance to tour the facilities; farrowing house, feeding facilities and management practices. The third stop will be Nine Bar Ranch in Hempstead. A barbecue meal will be served after which we will tour the beef operation. This ranch consist of 4,000 acres, with registered Santa Gertrudis cattle. Interested individuals touring Nine Bar Ranch will get a chance to see the cattle, the facilities, along with the managerial practices implemented on this ranch. 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The Narrow Guage

During plantation days the rich Brazos River bottom land around Pattison grew fabulous amounts of cotton. Early the cotton was hauled by ox wagons or mule teams to Houston. later to Hockley when the H&TC reached that point. But the Pattison area needed an easier means of getting cotton to market. so in 1870 the Texas Western Narrow Gauge Railway Company was formed The company built some 40 miles of rail from Houston to Pattison which was opened for public use in 1878. The primary reason for building the railroad was to get cotton shipped from the Pattison area to Houston markets A few years later the road was extended to Sealy where it connected with the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe which was of standard guage rails Financial troubles arose as well as disputes as to the merits of narrow gauge versus standard gauge. The Narrow gauge argument lost out and it ceased to operate in 1895. (taken from A History of Waller County, Texas.) M. Abshier

Texas Congressmen

Do they Vote Conservative or Liberal?

A voting analysis compiled by The Baron Report and The National Journal show the voting tendencies of Texan Congressmen in 1984. The ratings are considered a good barometer of voting tendencies because they include a broad spectrum of special interest organizations, such as the liberal Americans for Democratic Action and the conservative Chamber of Commerce.

The votes are arranged into three categories-economic, social and foreign policy. There were 46 Senate votes and 47 House votes in the calculations. The test votes were on such subjects as aid to El Salvador, tutition tax credits and abortion. As a group, the Texans scored an average of 50.8 on economic issues. 45 6 on social issues and 22.8 on foreign policy. The averages for the entire Congrss were 59 on economics, 52 on social policy and 44 on foreign policy

The ratings range from zero to 100, with 100 being the most liberal

Former Sen John Tower, a Republican scored 13 on economic votes, 9 on social issues and 6 on foreign policy. Lloyd Bentsen a Democrat, scored 36 on economics, 73 on social, and 69 on foreign policy.

Houstonians elected the two most politically devergent House members in the Texas delegation, according to the ratings.

Rep. Bill Archer, a Republican was the most conservative among the 17-member delegation, while neighbor Mickey Leland, a Democrat, was the Perfect Liberal, according to the ratings.

Leland, the only black member from Texas, elected in 1978 to fill the seat Barbara Jordan left, scored 100 in all three categories, the only Texas to do so. Archer, who represents afflu-


Archer, who represents antu-

ent River Oaks, the district that used to be represented by then-Congressman George Bush, scored zero on economics. 7 on social issues and zero on foreign policy.

Phil Gramm, then D-later R-College Station, was second most conservative, scoring 9 on economic issues and zero on social and foreign policy votes. He is now in the Senate in the seat that John Tower left. Second-most liberal was John Bryant D-Dallas, who scored 86 on economics, 100 on social

The Writing Road to Reading. known as the Spalding Method. is a "unified phonics" approach of teaching reading developed by Mrs Romalda Bishop Spalding. It is a total language arts approach to learning the phonetic base of the language through listening, speaking, writing. spelling, and reading. It includes a study of seventy phonograms. The phonograms are single letter or letter conbinations which represent forty-five basic sounds. During the summer in 1983, Mrs Godwin participated in the

Spalding training course at the St. Francis Episcopal School in Houston, Texas.

In May, 1984, Mrs. Godwin had the pleasure of meeting Mrs. Spalding, now eighty-five years old and still training teachers. Mrs. Splading recently conducted her forty-hour Spalding course for house parents and teachers at Boys' Country, in Hockley, Texas. Mrs. Spalding believes that her method is the only correct approach to teaching reading and if taught properly will eliminate remedial reading classes.





On May 23, the United States House of Representatives rejected 329 to 102 a GOP alternative budget proposed by Rep. Delbert Latta (R-Ohio). Latta's budget eliminated an array of domestic programs, including the Synthetic Fuels Corp., **Small Business Administration** direct loans, the Economic Development Administration, and cuts funding for other programs like Amtrak and Urban Development Action Grants. The proposal, which allows defense spending to keep up with inflation in Fiscal 1986 was supported by just one Democrat-Florida Rep. Earl Hutto and opposed by 79 Republicans. Of those 27 representatives voting from Texas, here are their positions on the vote.

On May 23, the United States House of Representatives, led by Budget Committee Chairman William Gray (D. Pa) approved its version of the 1986 Budget Resolution by a 258 to 170 vote. The measure eliminates just one federal domestic program (revenue sharing), whereas the Senate Measure approved May 10, eliminates 13. The House budget which "freezes" defense, agricultural, housing, transportation, education and other "social service" programs at fiscal 1985 levels, was warmly welcomed by freespending liberals like Rep. Mike Lowry (D.Wash.)and Mario Biaggi(D.-NY), who effusively praised it for slashing defense, allowing full Social Security COLAs, and retaining "porkbarrel" programs like Export-Import Bank direct loans, the Small Business Administration and Urban Development Action Grants. The town of Hempstead was ud out as a railroad town in 856. Through an agreement ith the Hempstead Town Co. ts and blocks in the new town ere offered to Houston and exas Central Railroad. (H&T) as inducement to bring the ilroad through the town. An rement was struck and by 157 the railroad was in operaon from Houston to Cypress ity by May. 1857 it was impleted to Hockley and by 858 the H&TC was completed Hempstead. On June 30 and y 1 of that year Hempstead ki a great celebration on the

arrival of the train. There were barbecues and fireworks and parades, and drill teams of soldiers who marched out to meet the train And though people came to Hempstead by foot, on horseback, in wagons and buggies, several hundred rode in on the train. Ten platform cars and three passenger cars were loaded with people were aboard. The H&TC line was completed to Navasota by August, 1859, later to Millican where it was halted by the Civil War. 


