

#### The Story of the NAIA . . .

The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) is a completely autonomous association, currently administering programs leading to national championships in 15 sports for 513 fully accredited four-year colleges and universities.

Established in 1940 as the National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball the NAIB evolved from the institution of a "National Small College Basketball Tournament" which was inaugurated in 1937. In 1952, the NAIB expanded to include tennis, outdoor track and field, and golf, and that year the organization was officially named the NAIA. In the last 25 years, the NAIA has further expanded to encompass football (it was split into two divisions in 1970), cross country, baseball and swimming, which were added to the NAIA program in 1956, wrestling (1958), soccer (1959), bowling (1962), gymnastics (1964), indoor track and field (1966), ice hockey (1968), and volleyball (1969).

The NAIA, with its national office located in Kansas City, is organized into 32 districts, grouped into eight geographical areas. All areas of intercollegiate athletics are organized and administered at the national level. The National office staff consists of an executive director, three assistant executive directors, the public relations staff, as well as mail room and secretarial staff.

On the district level, a District Chairman, a District Publicity Chairman and a District Eligibility Chairman are appointed to handle various matters at the district level. A major factor in the success of the NAIA program is the importance placed on "grass roots" organization, in which each district administers and organizes the programs of the schools within their own district. The districts are small enough in the number of schools involved that each individual institution has a major voice in the policy and decision-making process within that district. This procedure carries on to the national level, where each of the 32 districts have an equal voice in national matters.

The NAIA clearly outlines its own responsibilities and those of its members: a sound athletic program, administered and controlled by those responsible for the administration of the college or university. The NAIA encourages a broad program of athletic pursuits in its member schools and aims at uniformity and equity in policies and practices through its district and national tournament meets.

Eligibility rules in the NAIA govern all competition in sports recognized by the NAIA, not just post-season competition. These rules must be adhered to by all NAIA member institutions, including those members holding dual affiliations with other associations. NAIA member institutions must pay the annual membership dues and be in support of the policies of the Association.



# A Look at MISSISSIPPI VALLEY STATE UNIVERSITY

Mississippi Valley State University was founded in 1950 as Mississippi Vocational College. It is a co-educational multi-purpose university offering liberal arts and teacher\_training programs at the baccalaureate level. It is governed by the Board of Trustees of State Institutions of Higher Learning.

In 1954, Mississippi Vocational College was renamed Mississippi Valley State College by an act of the Mississippi Legislature.

On March 15, 1974, Governor William L. Waller signed into law House Bill 298 which elevated Mississippi Valley State College to Mississippi State University.

At Mississippi Valley State University the building program has been constructive and continual. The Fielding L. Wright Science and Mathematics Center, Edna Horton Five-Story Dormitory for Women, Five-Story Men's Dormitory, H. M. Ivy Cafeteria, Lucile Petry Leon Nursing Education Building, Technical Educational Building, Lois Aron Meditation Chapel, J. H. White Library, Friends Building, Health and Physical Education Center, and the Education Classroom Building have been recently completed. The Social Science Building, Five-Story Dormitory for Women, the Annex to the Administration Building and a men's dormitory primarily for athletes are now under construction.

Likewise, the University has continued to expand its




