It is the strong feeling of the NAIA that intercollegiate athletics are an integral part of the total educational process. More than 65,000 athletes are annually involved in our organization's athletic program. Football is just one of 15 sports sponsored by the NAIA. The Story of the NAIA . . .

The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) is a completely autonomous association, currently administering programs leading to national championships in 15 sports for 513 fully accredited four-year colleges and universities.

Established in 1940 as the National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball the NAIB evolved from the institution of a "National Small College Basketball Tournament" which was inaugurated in 1937. In 1952, the NAIB expanded to include tennis, outdoor track and field, and golf, and that year the organization was officially named the NAIA. In the last 25 years, the NAIA has further expanded to encompass football (it was split into two divisions in 1970), cross country, baseball and swimming, which were added to the NAIA program in 1956, wrestling (1958), soccer (1959), bowling (1962), gymnastics (1964), indoor track and field (1966), ice hockey (1968), and volleyball (1969).

The NAIA, with its national office located in Kansas City, is organized into 32 districts, grouped into eight geographical areas. All areas of intercollegiate athletics are organized and administered at the national level. The National office staff consists of an executive director, three assistant executive directors, the public relations staff, as well as mail room and secretarial staff.

On the district level, a District Chairman, a District Publicity Chairman and a District Eligibility Chairman are appointed to

handle various matters at the district level. A major factor in the success of the NAIA program is the importance placed on "grass roots" organization, in which each district administers and organizes the programs of the schools within their own district. The districts are small enough in the number of schools involved that each individual institution has a major voice in the policy and decision-making process within that district. This procedure carries on to the national level, where each of the 32 districts have an equal voice in national matters.

The NAIA clearly outlines its own responsibilities and those of its members: a sound athletic program, administered and controlled by those responsible for the administration of the college or university. The NAIA encourages a broad program of athletic pursuits in its member schools and aims at uniformity and equity in policies and practices through its district and national tournament meets.

Eligibility rules in the NAIA govern all competition in sports recognized by the NAIA, not just post-season competition. These rules must be adhered to by all NAIA member institutions, including those members holding dual affiliations with other associations. NAIA member institutions must pay the annual membership dues and be in support of the policies of the Association.



Southern University's fourth president, Dr. Jesse N. Stone, Jr. has said, "simply put, the goals of the Southern University System are to provide quality education for our students... developing their potential to the highest possible level; and to maximize the resources available to improve the quality of learning."

Approaching its "Centennial" as a university, the institution which got its humble beginning following the bitter years of reconstruction and amidst educational advancement retarded by the race issue...is today "truly a citadel of learning and beacon of hope" facing the challenges of new and increased demands on higher education.

Southern University Baton Rouge campus is parent campus for the only predominantly Black university system in the world. There are other campuses located at the two largest cities in the state, New Orleans and

Southern University was created by act of the Louisiana Legislature in 1880 and has been firmly rooted in Baton Rouge since 1914. As solidly entrenched as the live oak trees that shade its campus, Southern University is located in North Baton Rouge on Scott's Bluff off Interstate 110 North with 512 acres stretching its western border along the majestic Mississippi

Known as a ''people's University'' among academicians and as "Jaguarland" among sports enthusiasts, the Baton Rouge campus has a student population exceeding 9,000 and in addition of the 512 acres, has a 372 acre experimental farm five miles north of the campus.

The ever-expanding facilities continue to grow at a rate commensurate with enrollment increases and its general university thrust.

The Baton Rouge Campus is one of the most beautiful sites anywhere, with its Louisiana Oaks, Lake Kernan, and azaleas as part of a landscape enhanced by the Mississippi River, creating a picturesque-setting to go with its claim to "one of the most modern physical plants in the South."

The SU System is managed by an 18-member Board of Supervisors, provided for in the Louisiana Constitution, adopted in April 1974. The SU System is headed by a system president and each campus entity by a

On the Baton Rouge Campus, there are nine (9) schools and colleges, with a Law School and Graduate School. Collectively, these schools and colleges offer some 128 programs of study. The University confers the bachelor of sciences degree in agriculture, business, elementary and secondary education, vocational education, recreation, liberal studies, architecture, civil engineering, electrical engineering, mechanical engineering, industrial technology, and home economics. The University also confers the bachelor of music, bachelor of arts in liberal studies, bachelor of music education, the jurors doctorate, the master of art in education, the master of education, the master of arts in social sciences, the master of sciences, along with commissions in both, the Army and Naval ROTC. Additional components of the Baton Rouge Campus are the special schools, such as a School for the Deaf, a School for the Blind, and the SU Laboratory School with Grades "K" through "12."

"Mirroring Excellence And Providing Service

Few schools in the state approach Southern University in terms of accreditation. The University is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and each unit by the appropriate accrediting agency.

The quality of its faculty is well illustrated in the fact that 30 percent of the faculty hold the doctorate degree. Assembled on the Baton Rouge Campus is an unusually strong faculty - one that is creative, innovative, patient, tolerant, understanding and above all, competent in their respective

SU's system-wide faculty consist of 583 persons. Many of them have outstanding records in teaching, research, and publication, and have achieved recognition within their respective fields. Of the total faculty, 196 have earned terminal degrees, 17 have juris doctorates, and 355 are holders of the masters degrees. In addition, there are 898 classified and unclassified employees.

Southern University remains at the forefront in higher education, whether its hosting the Joint Administrators Conference for the State; the Annual High School Rally; A Summer NCAA Recreation Program for 1000 Underprivileged Youths; presenting the first amateur production of "Porgy and Bess"; or whether its designing an Extended Day Program, which affords the working public time to attend classes at times convenient for them...the University "mirrors Excellence in providing service as a people's



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
