

#### **Psychology Class** Visits Isle **Child Center**

The class in Psychology 403 Foundations in Early Childhood visited early pre-school education center of the Galveston Public School District. This center is unique for children from two to four years of age and based on the belief that most kindergarten teaching four years too late to give the mentally undernourished child a chance to catch up" and that early programs "should begin with infants in a cuddletalk-and-play system." ### I. E. Prof. Has Paper Presented At Annual AIAA Meeting

On April 22, 1971 a paper by W. J. Hall, Chair-Industrial Arts Teacher Education, School of Industrial Education and Technology, was presented to the American Industrial Arts Association which convened in Miami Beach, Florida. The title of the paper was "Technology and Related Technics of the Space Age.'

Due to a last minute emergency Mr. Hall was unable to attend the Convention. Dr. W. A. Mayfield, Associate Professor of Texas A. & M. University, College Station, Texas delivered the paper.

Hall's paper dealth with the effects aerospace has had upon our constantly changing social environment and pattern of living. He stated that scarcely a home, scarcely an individual will fail to feel the impact the "Space" program has had on our lives. It is of vital importance that disciplines as astronomy and terodynamics, communications and chemismathematics and meterorology, plasma, psysics, and radiation has great effects upon our lives, in addition to that technological the sciences.

Approximately 3,000 persons were in attendance at the A. I. A. A. convention. The A. I. A. A. convention will convene in Dallas, Texas April, 1972. According to Dr. S. R. # Science Department News

#### BIOLOGY PROFESSOR GIVES PAPER

Dr. B. K. Chopra, a profesor in the Biology Department, read a scientific research paper at the Texas Academy of Science meeting in Nacogdoches, Texas. These meetings are held annually and scientists representing all disciplines from all parts of Texas gather to exchange information concerning their research. The 1971 meeting was held at Stephen F. Austin College in Nacogdoches from March 11 through 13. About 300 scientists attended this year's meeting.

Dr. Chopra reported on research concerning the effect of Cotoron (a herbicide) on the growth of the mold Aspergillus flavus in liquid and soil cultures. The paper he read was co-authored by Felix Ojusi, a graduate student in Biology and Dr. L. C. Collins, the chairman of the Department of Biology. The results of this research showed that the herbicide had a stimulatory effect on the growth of the mold.

Dr. Chopra, Dr. Collins and Dr. T. P. Dooley, Professors in the Biology Department, all attended the meeting and agreed that the quality of the research and presentations this year was excellent.

#### BIOLOGY MAJORS ON HONOR ROLL

Dr. L. C. Collins was informed by Dr. E. W. Martin, Chairman of the Awards and Honors Committee for Prairie View A & M College, that twenty-four biology majors qualified for the honor roll.

The number of students in the various categories are as follows:

- - 1. Summa Cum Laude 8
  - 2. Magna Cum Laude 6
  - 3. Cum Laude 10

Out of 325 students who qualified for the honor roll, 24 were biology majors, which constitutes more than 7% of the entire School of Arts & Sciences and 18.6% of the total Biology enrollment.

#### PROFESSOR ATTENDS MEETING

Mr. S. A. Smith, Assistant Professor of Biology, attended the National Science Teachers Association Convention in Washington, D. C., which was held March 26-30. Approximately 8,000 persons from public and private schools, colleges and universities were present. The theme of the Convention was: Decision-Making in Science Education.

Mr. Smith attended sessions in which discussions were held on selecting materials for curriculum planning and implementing existing programs and evaluating programs in order to make future programs relevant to the student's need. The public and private school representatives felt that the colleges and universities should follow progress of new teachers and work with established teachers in meeting the demands placed upon the teaching profession. It was felt that the greatest problem with new teachers is in the area of social adjustment.

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


