THE COMMENCEMENT PROCESSION

An appropriate costume is a necessary part of Commencement. The costume includes a cap, a gown, and a hood. Each part of the costume has special significance. The most common head-piece (or cap) for the ceremony is the black square, flat-topped, or "mortar board" type with gold or black tassel. It is called a "mortar board" because it is shaped like the board of the mason which holds mortar. Recently we are seeing large velvet Tam-O-Shanter style head pieces replacing the mortar board. Some of the velvet tams are brilliantly colored such as orange or bright blue.

The tassel on the doctor's cap is usually gold, and permanently fastened on the left side. The master's cap is worn with a colored tassel on the left. The bachelor's cap is worn with a colored tassel on the right prior to graduation then moved to the left during the ceremony. The color of the tassel indicates one of the fields of study listed below.

The hood can be the most colorful part of the entire costume. The colors inside the hood are those of the college or university which is awarding the degree. The color of the outside rim of the hood indicates one of the fields of study listed below:

The gown is usually black. The traditional doctor's gown has velvet panels down the front and three velvet bars on the regular sleeves. The master's gown has no velvet, but does have unusually long sleeves. The bachelor's gown is similar to the master's gown but has regular long sleeves which tend to be pointed.

Some gowns may be in the color of the department granting the degree, such as "Education Blue." Others may be "Yale Blue" or "Harvard Crimson" for the graduates of these universities.

THE MACE

The mace is an ancient symbol of authority which is carried by the marshal ahead of the academic procession. The mace for Prairie View A&M University is four feet long and contains four bronze figures atop a Honduras mahogany base which tapers to fit into its stand. The four figures are symbolic of the four undergraduate academic years. Within the hollow area beneath the figures, and shared equally, is a flame which denotes knowledge and excellence. The base which serves as a grip and is carried by a faculty member, symbolizes the entire faculty; the stand which supports the mace characterizes the administration. The visual impact of the mace as a whole is "torch-like." The eight tassels represent the academic organization of the University.

THE MEDALLION

The President's Medallion, the official symbol of the Office of the President at Prairie View A&M University, was created especially to commemorate the lineage of the Presidency by the late Mr. Frank Hayden, nationally famous sculptor and Professor of Fine Arts at Southern University, Baton Rouge, Louisiana. The first medallion was presented to Dr. Percy A. Pierre, fourth president of Prairie View A&M University, on March 21, 1985.

The medallion is designed to be worn with academic regalia at all official University programs. Abstract figures, representing the academic disciplines in an attitude of celebration, encircle the outer rim. The inner circle symbolizes the pursuit of excellence throughout four years of teaching and learning. The weave of the chain is the facsimile of that used by the ancient Greeks.

A replica will be presented to each subsequent President during his inauguration. The medallion will ultimately reflect the history of the presidency, revealing names and dates of inauguration.

Marion Henry, Ph.D. Professor College of Education

Dr. Henry received his public school education in Dallas, Texas graduating from Lincoln High School where he earned a track athletic scholarship to Southern University. He earned his Bachelor of Science degree from Southern University, Baton Rouge, Louisiana, the Master of Science degree from Bradley University, Peoria, Illinois, and the Doctor of Philosophy degree from Syracuse University, Syracuse, New York.

Dr. Henry served three years in the United States Army as a member of the Signal Corp attached to the 20th Air Force Headquarters in the South Pacific and three years with the Federal Government in the United State Postal Service before coming to Prairie View.

He came to Prairie View A&M University September 1, 1956 as Head, Department of Audio Visual Education and Photography. During the past forty-seven years he has earned the rank of professor and tenure status. His current assignment is Director, Teacher Certification and Professor of Educational Research in the Department of Educational Leadership and Counseling. Many of his former students have acknowledged that he influenced them profoundly.

Dr. Henry has served Prairie View A&M University with distinction serving as University Commencement Marshal, Chairman, Commencement Convocation, Athletic Director, Chairman, Athletic Council, Member of the Faculty Senate, Teacher Certification Officer, Coordinator, Educational Media and Technology Program, Director, University Wide Audio Visual Program, Chairman, University Judiciary Appeals Committee, Chairman, University Dishonesty Committee, Chairman Committee for the University's Mace the President's Medallion and Podium, Co-Chairman, Search Committee for the Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs, Chairman, Teacher Education Admission Committee, Member of the Graduate Council, Chairman, The Naming of Buildings, Facilities and Other Entities, Chairman, Southwestern Athletic Conference Hall of Fame (SWAC) selection committee, Member, 75th SWAC Planning Committee.

The Southwestern Athletic Conference honored his service by selecting him Athletic Director of the Year and inducted him into the Southwestern Athletic Conference Hall of Fame as an Administrator.

Dr. Henry served 10 1/2 years as a member of the Waller Independent School Districts' Board of Trustees, and is currently a member of the Board of Directors, Prairie View Federal Credit Union.

He is a Lector at St. Katharine Drexel Catholic Church and a member of the Knights of Columbus.

He is a member of Phi Delta Kappa, Epsilon Pi Tau, Kappa Delta Pi, Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. (Lifemember).

Dr. Henry married his college sweetheart Mary Dolores Grant (deceased) of New Orleans, Louisiana. They are the parents of Byron Timothy Henry and Sharon Lynn Henry-Stephens and grandparents of Brandon Henry and Jordan Henry Stephens.
