God, Love, and Doing Things For People

Presence of the "Y" Leadership Institute brings to mind the last sermon able, Rev. Matthew Carter preached on our campus. He related a story in which a lady, having sought for years the frothy, nothingness of her hometown society, is suddenly given pause by wounded soldiers suffering on a French battlefield in World War I.
