## NAIA Football Teams Prepare for Second Century of Competition

During most of the period covering the first hundred years of college football, there was little or no distinction between "large" or "small" football playing schools. Schools like Notre Dame, Centre, Carlisle, Sewanee, Coe, Knox and Fordham were the class of any football Saturday afternoon against any team in the country.

However, with the explosion of college enrollment following World War II and the advent of television, it became more and more apparent that two levels of collegiate football were emerging. A relative handful of universities saw their enrollments reach ten, twenty, and even thirty thousand students and their athletic programs grew likewise.

In the face of sophisticated methods of recruiting, massive financial outlays and the competition of televised games every Saturday afternoon, the football programs at many colleges and universities faced extinction. Although many schools were forced to drop football altogether, most of the nation's colleges worked only harder to develop their programs within a sound financial and educational context.

The NAIA met this crisis when football was added to it's program in 1956 with the first NAIA National Collegiate Football Championship. Now it is in it's fourteenth year, this program remains as the only national football championship in extistence for college today.

Once again in 1969, the hundredth anniversary of college football, 289 of the NAIA's 535 member institutions who play football will begin the season with a chance at becoming the nation's intercollegiate football champions. The NAIA's method of selection insures each of these schools an opportunity to become one of the four teams selected for the post-season NAIA Champion Bowl playoffs.

Each week a panel of 16 officers and area chairmen of the NAIA Football Coaches' Association rate the NAIA football teams. Following the final week of regular season play, the top rated team from each of the four evenly-divided geographical areas — Northwest, Southwest, Southeast, and Northeast — are selected for the Champion Bowl Semi-Finals. One team from each area is selected if that area has a team in the Top Six in the NAIA ratings. Otherwise, a second team from the same area is selected.

These four teams then meet in the Champion Bowl Semi-Finals on Thanksgiving week-end with the winners battling for the Champion Bowl crown and the National Championship two weeks later. All three games are played at the sites of one of the competing schools.

Prior to the Champion Bowl being played at the site of one of the competing schools, the game was played in Little Rock, Arkansas; St. Petersburg, Florida; Sacramento, California; Augusta, Georgia, and Tulsa, Oklahoma. During the past 13 years, 33 NAIA schools have had an opportunity to participate in this unique post-season program.

The excellence of ability and the closeness of competition in these championship matches has been amazing. In the 13 previous Champion Bowl contests, the difference in scores has been only slightly more than a touchdown per game.


Two of the games have ended in ties and two more were decided by a single point. No school has ever been able to repeat as champion and only two colleges — St. John's (Minn.) and Pittsburg State (Kan.) — have been able to win more than one title.

Although many of the players that participate in the NAIA football program have not become household words in college due to a lack of publicity campaigns and national television exposure, the large number of these athletes who make their marks in the professional ranks is ample proof of the quality of the programs at their schools. In 1968 for example, there were 160 former NAIA football players on the active rosters of the National and American football leagues. In fact, the 1967 AFL Champion Oakland Raiders counted 14 former NAIA players on their active 40-man roster.

So as college football celebrates it's first hundred years and recalls the glories of it's past Saturdays and former heroes, all colleges, both large and small, stand on the threshold of another hundred years of giving the nation's youth an opportunity of playing one of the greatest games ever devised by man for preparing one's self for the game of life.
