IMPORTANT DIRECTIONS.

The attention of prospective students is directed to the following important matters contained in this catalogue:

1. Please read carefully "Requirements for Admission" on pages 12-15.
2. See the College Calendar.
3. An estimate of the expenses may be found on page 14. The prospective student should read this carefully.
4. A student will find under "Curriculum," page 23, an outline of the work required for graduation. For description of Vocational courses see page 16. Note carefully the conditions under which students are admitted to Vocational courses.
5. To be admitted to any examination, each student is required to present a receipt from the Treasurer showing that all fees have been paid up to date.
6. Any student taking an examination out of the regular time will be required to pay \$1.00 as examination fee.
7. No student is permitted to make a deposit for certificate or diploma until all other fees have been paid.
8. Any student applying for admission to any class after the term has opened, may be admitted conditionally. He will be required to pass examinations on all back work before the final examinations in all the subjects of his course. Should his class record show after two weeks trial that he is not qualified to do the work, he will be assigned to a lower class. No credit will be given in any course where a student enters later than the middle of the term.
9. To obtain a *certificate* of any grade, a student must have attended a minimum time of thirty-two weeks and satisfactorily completed the required courses.
10. To obtain a *diploma* a student must satisfactorily complete the course of study undertaken and he shall have attended at least thirty-two weeks in the Senior year.
11. Students are required to use the same edition of texts as adopted by Committee on Text-books. These text-books should be purchased after arrival at the College.

DAILY ROUTINE.

Students rise at 5:30 a. m. Study hour from 6 to 6:30 a. m. Breakfast from 6:30 to 7 a. m. Clean rooms from 7 to 7:30 a. m. Chapel exercises from 7:30 to 8 a. m. Pass to class rooms at 8 a. m.

The morning is divided into five recitation periods of fifty minutes each, with ten-minute recess; and two industrial periods of a hundred minutes each for the first and second years.

PRAIRIE VIEW STATE NORMAL AND INDUSTRIAL COLLEGE.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT.

The Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College was organized under an act to provide for the organization and support of a normal school at Prairie View, Waller county, Texas, for the preparation and training of colored teachers. This act was approved by Governor Oran M. Roberts April 19, 1879.

This institution is given recognition in an act of Congress passed in 1890 for the further endowment of Agricultural Colleges and known as a Second Morrill act. The provision of that act under which the Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College receives financial benefit reads as follows:

Provided, That no money shall be paid out under this act to any State or Territory for the support and maintenance of a college where a distinction of race or color is made in the admission of students, but the establishment and maintenance of such colleges separately for white and colored students shall be held to be in compliance with the provisions of this act if the funds received in such State or Territory be equitably divided as hereinafter set forth: *Provided*, That in any State in which there has been one college established in pursuance of the act of July 2, 1862, and also in which an educational institution of like character has been established, or may be hereafter established, and is now aided by such State from its own revenue, for the education of colored students in agriculture and the mechanic arts, however named or styled, or whether or not it has received money heretofore under the act to which this act is an amendment, the Legislature of such State may propose and report to the Secretary of the Interior a just and equitable division of the fund to be received under this act, between one college for white students and one institution for colored students, established as aforesaid, which shall be divided into two parts, and paid accordingly, and thereupon such institution for colored students shall be entitled to the benefits of this act and subject to its provisions, as much as it would have been if it had been included under the act of 1862, and the fulfillment of the foregoing provisions shall be taken as a compliance with the provision in reference to separate colleges for white and colored students.

OBJECT OF THE COLLEGE.

The object of the College is set forth in Article 2722 of the Revised Civil Statutes (Edition of 1911) as follows:

“Art. 2722. Four years’ course of studies to be maintained.—There shall be maintained a four-year college course of classical and scientific

studies at said college, to which graduates of the normal course shall be admitted without examination and to which the others may be admitted after having passed a satisfactory examination in the branches comprised in the normal course; provided, that no State student shall be admitted to the privileges of said course; and, provided further, that the diploma conferred on the completion of the said course shall entitle the holder without other or further examination to teach in any of the colored public free schools of the State." (Act 1901, p. 35.)

GOVERNMENT.

The Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College is a branch of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and is under the control of the Board of Directors and President of that College. The Board of Directors elect a Principal and Faculty, to whom are entrusted the work of administration and instruction. It is the duty of the Principal to exercise immediate supervision and direction subject to the regulations and restriction imposed by the Board of Directors.

Articles 2718 and 2720 of the Revised Civil Statutes (edition of 1911) defines the government of the institution as follows:

"The normal school for colored teachers at Prairie View shall be under control and supervision of the Board of Directors of the Agricultural and Mechanical College, and said Board of Directors shall in all respects have the same powers and perform the same duties in reference to this College as they are clothed with in reference to the Agricultural and Mechanical College, located in Brazos county.

"Said Board shall appoint a principal teacher and such assistant teacher or teachers of said school and such other officers of said school as may be necessary, and shall make such rules, by-laws and regulations for the government of said school as they may deem necessary and proper, and shall regulate the course of study and the manner of performing labor to be performed by the students, and shall provide for the board and lodging and instruction to the students, without pecuniary charge to them other than that each student shall be required to pay cost of said board, lodging and instruction, monthly, in advance; and said Board of Directors shall regulate the course of discipline necessary to enforce the faithful discharge of the duties of all officers, teachers, students and employes of said school, and shall have the same printed and circulated for the benefit of the people of the State and the officers, teachers, students and employes of said school."

ORGANIZATION.

The College comprises the following divisions:

A division of Normal Arts; Household Arts; Rural Arts (Agriculture), and Mechanic Arts. A director of each division is responsible for the faithful administration of each course and it is the duty of each director to make an annual report at the end of the scholastic year concerning the work of his division. The Faculty of the College

directs the general policy of the institution and determines the regulations concerning the instruction in all the subjects of the College.

DISCIPLINE.

The isolation of the College enables the authorities to exercise effective oversight over the student body. The object of discipline is to secure the best conditions for scholarship and moral conduct and no more restraint is exercised than it required to meet these ends.

The discipline, as well as instruction, is committed to the Faculty, the Principal being held responsible for the enforcement of regulations and the maintenance of discipline with the privilege of calling in at any time assistance from any or all of the Faculty.

The immediate supervision of the young women of the institution is entrusted to a Dean of women, whose duty it is to see that the conduct of the young women and personal habits, manners, modes of dress and habits of study conform to correct standards.

The immediate supervision of the young men of the institution is entrusted to a Dean of men, whose duties are similar to those prescribed for the Dean of women.

No student is permitted to leave the campus without first securing a permit. This permit must be addressed to the Principal through either the Dean of women or the Dean of men, and when recommended by the Dean concerned it must be finally approved by the Principal of the College. The permit must state the reason for absence and the hour and date of departure and return.

For improper conduct or failure to keep up with classes, a student may at any time be required to withdraw from the College. Cases of discipline will be considered by the Discipline Committee, but no student will be required to withdraw from College until a written report by the Discipline Committee recommending dismissal is approved by the Principal.

For the information of parents and guardians, a report will be made

at the end of each term showing class standing and record of conduct of each student in the College.

LOCATION.

The College is located one mile north of Prairie View in Waller county on a beautiful hill that gives a commanding view of the surrounding country. The Houston & Texas Central Railroad passes within one mile of the College campus. The town of Hempstead is five miles away, but students and visitors are advised to purchase their tickets to Prairie View, which is the nearest station to the College. Students are advised to take trains arriving in the daytime.

POSTOFFICE.

Prairie View is a money order postoffice. Prairie View is provided with telephone, telegraph and express offices.

HEALTH.

The College is situated on an elevation with sufficient slope in every direction to insure proper drainage. The health of the student body is excellent. The campus is kept in a sanitary condition throughout the entire year, and constant effort is made to prevent the appearance of mosquitoes, flies and other disease-bearing agencies.

Drinking water is supplied from deep wells and is protected in every way from surface contamination. The dormitories are inspected daily and are kept neat and clean throughout.

HOSPITAL.

The hospital is a frame structure containing one ward each for young women and young men and an office for resident nurse, a dispensary, bathrooms and other hospital conveniences. A trained nurse is employed throughout the year and her entire attention is directed to the care of the sick. The services of two competent physicians are provided by the College authorities, who reside at Hempstead but are subject to call whenever needed.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION.

1. *Age.*—Students shall not be less than sixteen years of age at the time of their admission. (Article 3886, Revised Statutes, Chapter 5, Title 86, as amended by S. H. B. No. 379.)

2. *How to Apply for Admission.*—Write to the Principal for an application blank, which will be forwarded, giving full instructions. No applicant should come to the College without having made application for admission and accommodations, subject to the entrance examination. For requirements, see No. 4 below; also see application blank in the back of this catalogue.

3. *Moral Character.*—All candidates for admission must furnish

testimonials of good character and if coming from other schools must bring a letter from the head of the institution certifying to honorable dismissal from the last school attended.

4. *Health*.—No student will be admitted to the College whose physical condition appears to be such as to make it inadvisable, in the opinion of the Principal, to admit him, either because his physical condition is such as to make it dangerous to his own health to undertake serious study or because of his having a disease that may make his presence dangerous to the health of other students.

5. *Vaccination*.—Each student must file with the College nurse a certificate of vaccination signed by a reputable physician, or be vaccinated as a requirement for admission.

6. Candidates who have complied with the above requirements may be admitted to the Freshman class in one of the regular courses in one of the following ways:

- (A) By examination.
- (B) On diploma from an affiliating high school.
- (C) On special approval.

(A) *Admission by Examination.*

Candidates for admission into the Freshman year must pass a satisfactory examination upon arrival at the College, in the following subjects:

Arithmetic.—Examinations will be based upon the usual topics found in a higher arithmetic, including the application of the four processes: fractions, denominate numbers, percentage, interest and mensuration.

English Grammar.—The examination will include a knowledge of the parts of speech and uses and relations; sentence analysis, construction and classification.

English Composition.—Every applicant will be required to write a composition on some familiar topic and it must be of sufficient length to illustrate the student's grasp of the principles of composition.

Geography.—Examination will be based upon the more familiar features of descriptive geography.

Texas History.—The applicant will be expected to know the epochs in Texas historical events. The examination will be based upon the adopted text-books in use in the public schools of Texas.

United States History.—The student must show by written answers his familiarity with the leading facts of our nation's history.

No formal examination will be required in writing and spelling, but any student may be refused admission to the Freshman class who reveals by examination that he is very deficient in either of these subjects.

(B) *Admission by Diploma.*

Admission to the Freshman class will be granted to graduates of Texas high schools designated by the State Department of Education as high schools of the first class. Such graduates will be admitted with-

out examination at the opening of the first term on credentials certifying to their age, character, scholarship and graduation.

(C) *Admission by Special Approval.*

Students over twenty years of age who may not be able to meet these requirements may be admitted on trial to the Freshman class if, in the opinion of the Principal, the student has had such training as will enable him to do the work acceptably.

ADMISSION TO SHORT COURSES.

Students will be admitted to the two-year course in Agriculture and the two-year Home Makers' course, who have completed the eighth grade in a Texas high school designated by the State Department of Education as high schools of the first class, or by examination prescribed by the Faculty.

ADMISSION TO TRADE COURSES.

Admission to trade courses is not based upon formal examination. The applicant, however, must be at least seventeen years of age. The student is referred to the description of these courses for details in connection with the admission requirements.

A student failing to meet dues promptly will be subject to suspension. Parents are earnestly requested to send money for student's accounts

directly to R. L. Isaacs, Treasurer, Prairie View, Waller county, Texas. Money should be sent by registered mail, or express money order, or by bank money order or draft. Money sent by personal check will be subject to the usual bank discounts.

Students should come to the College with sufficient funds to pay all fees for one month in advance and with a sufficient additional amount to cover the cost of books, stationery and incidentals. The Board of Directors have established a book store in the main building at Prairie View, where all students can purchase their text-books and stationery at reasonable prices.

UNIFORM.

By action of the Board of Directors, all students must hereafter wear school uniform. This applies to both the male and female students. The uniform for both boys and girls may be purchased at the school. The cost of the uniform for the boys, including hat, will be \$15; for girls, \$7.50. The money for uniform must be deposited on entrance along with the usual entrance fee. No student will be admitted to enrollment and class work until the deposit for uniform has been made with the Treasurer.

COURSES OF STUDY.

The College offers four regular courses, extending over four years and leading to a regular diploma, the particular course pursued being specified in the diploma.

- I. Normal Arts course.
- II. Household Arts course.
- III. Rural Arts (Agriculture) course.
- IV. Mechanic Arts course.

In addition the following short courses are offered:

- I. A two-year course in Agriculture.
- II. A two-year course in Home Economics.

In addition, the following trade or vocational courses are offered, extending over a period of one year:

1. Blacksmithing.
2. Wheelwrighting.
3. Cabinet Making.
4. Carpentry.
5. Steam Laundering and Dry Cleaning.
6. Hat Making.
7. Shoemaking.
8. Printing.
9. Tailoring.
10. Power Plant Machinery.
11. Plumbing.
12. Automobile Running and Repairing.

TRADE COURSES.

Trade or vocational courses are offered for the benefit of two classes of students: (1) Those who cannot afford the time or expense of taking a longer course and who desire to apply their limited time directly to acquiring more skill in some one industry with a view to following it as a trade; and (2) for the benefit of those who are engaged in some industry but who feel the need of acquiring more skill and efficiency in the work in which they are at present engaged.

LENGTH OF COURSE.

All trade courses are planned to extend through one academic year. It may be possible, however, for those who have had some practical experience in a trade to complete the course in a shorter time. How-

ever, no certificate will be granted unless a full year has been devoted to the work. An applicant who has had some experience in a trade may be admitted to advanced standing provided that satisfactory evidence is shown of his ability to do the work. It is recommended that those who have had some experience in a trade endeavor to enroll at the beginning of one of the regular terms of the College year.

Students taking a *Trade* or *Vocational* course will be required to devote practically eight hours a day to practice work. However, the Faculty reserves the right to prescribe such academic instruction as may be thought to increase the efficiency of the students.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ENTRANCE.

In order to enter a *Trade* or *Vocational* course, the applicant must be at least seventeen years of age. There are no formal academic requirements for admission to these courses, but in all cases admission is granted on the approval of the Principal.

EXPENSES.

Trade or Vocational students must pay the regular entrance fees, including maintenance, cost of uniform, etc. They will also be under the same regulations as the students taking the regular courses. All students are expected to do willingly, at all times, what appears to be to the best interest of the College community. An opportunity is offered for the students taking a Trade or Vocational course to earn all or a part of his College expenses.

TRADE COURSE CERTIFICATES.

Upon the satisfactory completion of a Trade or Vocational course a special *Industrial Certificate of Proficiency* will be awarded. As previously stated above, a certificate will not be issued unless the applicant has spent the full year in attendance and completed the required course.

BLACKSMITHING.

The aim of this course is to impart to the student a knowledge of the principles of blacksmithing and to give a thorough training in the practice of the same. The student will be required to practice on the repair of wagons and farm implements; to construct and repair farm machinery.

The College shop is well equipped with stationary forges, blowers, drill press, grindstones, emery wheels and small hand tools of various kinds.

DESCRIPTION OF COURSE.

The course of study includes the following:

Care of shop: Making fires; names, uses, care and selection of tools and machines; proper arrangement of tools; forging; heating; draw-

ing out; forming; bending; twisting; upsetting; welding; chain making. Steel: drawing, forming, welding, refining and tempering, spring and tool making. Horseshoeing: study of the anatomy of the horse's foot; making shoes to correct knee knocking, interfering, stifle trouble.

WHEELWRIGHTING.

The aim of this course and the method of instruction is similar to that of Blacksmithing. All of the farm wagons are built in this shop and the repair of all woodwork is done by students taking this course. Other repairs to wagons are done by students taking the Blacksmithing course.

DESCRIPTION OF COURSE.

The course of study includes the following:

Wheelwrighting: study of different kinds of wood used for construction purposes, making of various parts of wagons or buggies in the shops; shop management; selection of material; estimates and bills for all material used in the erection of farm vehicles. Ability to make all the parts and to assemble them for a farm wagon will be required for a certificate in this course.

It is advisable to combine the Blacksmithing and Wheelwrighting courses for those who can spare the time, but it will require two years to take both courses.

CABINET MAKING.

The object of this course is to prepare young men as experts in making built-in furniture and other articles and equipment for the interior of homes, stores and shops.

DESCRIPTION OF COURSE.

The course of study includes the following:

Shop equipment: names, uses, care and selection of tools; making simple household articles such as tables, chairs, bookcases, screens, wash-stands and music cabinets. Finishing: sand papering, staining, filling, waxing. Methods and practice in selecting material and estimating labor cost.

CARPENTRY.

The object of this course is to prepare young men to go out as practical house builders.

DESCRIPTION OF COURSE.

The course of study includes the following:

Drawing: free-hand and mechanical drawing; how to use a blue print frame and practice in interpreting plans and specifications. Wood-

working; bench work, including a knowledge and use of tools; making and repairing window screens, lawn benches and other simple household articles. House repairing: building; foundation; selection of building sites; excavations; footings. Forms of construction: the full frame; half-frame; balloon frame; sills, joists, steadings; porch roof construction, boarding-in; steep construction; cornice construction; roof construction and covering. House planning: form of plans for different types of residences, specifications for the same, and estimating material and labor costs.

STEAM LAUNDERING AND DRY CLEANING.

The object of this course is to fit the student for work in a steam laundry. The College steam laundry with all of its equipment is used for purposes of instruction in this course. A student completing the course in Steam Laundering and Dry Cleaning should be able to take charge of any of the work in an up-to-date steam laundry plant. The College laundry is fitted up for both hand and steam laundry.

DESCRIPTION OF COURSE.

The course of study includes the following:

A study of fibres and how to cleanse each as illustrated in practical work with cotton, linen, silk and woolen garments; effects of soft and hard water; different cleansing re-agents; preparation and uses of each. Study of and experiments with common bluing; various stiffening materials; preparation and proper use. Practice work includes the various processes of laundering and dry cleaning and use of laundry machinery, including cylinder washers, extractors, shirt starching, starch cookers, mangle, shirt and collar ironers, collar shaper, etc. Practice will also be given in wrapping of bundles; making office records and looking after other details connected with the business side of laundering.

HAT MAKING.

The object of this course is to prepare a student to become a practical hat maker.

DESCRIPTION OF COURSE.

A study of the tools used in the hat making industry, dyeing, pressing, sizing, pouncing, blocking, finishing, rebuilding, rounding and finishing for stores. The department is well equipped with tools for carrying out this course.

SHOEMAKING.

The object of this course is to prepare a student to become a practical shoemaker. All of the repairing of shoes in the College community is

done in this department. This work gives the student a considerable amount of practice.

The department is well equipped with benches, stands, lasts and the following machines: One channeling machine, one Puritan harness stitcher, one hard wax power sole stitching machine, one Chase leather splitting machine, one Progressive power finishing machine, one riveting machine, one hook and eyeleting machine, one vamping machine, one Lufkin folding machine, two universal feed machines, and one crimping machine.

DESCRIPTION OF COURSE.

The course of study includes the following:

Names of tools and uses; making thread and bristling ends; leveling heels of old shoes; fitting half soles for nail work; fitting soles for sewed work; the best way to apply a nail sole to a welt bottom; applying a nail sole to a McKay bottom; stitching on half soles on welt and turn sole bottoms; finishing bottom and edges by hand and by machine; kind of ink used; putting patches on by hand stitch and machine stitch; cementing; revamping old shoes; measurements for new shoes; building up last when not large enough for measurement; cutting insoles and channels by hand method and by machine method; lasting the uppers over a wood last after the counter and toe box have been fitted and pasted in; sewing welts on welt bottom shoes; putting on shanks and bottom filler; putting on bottom soles; putting on heels.

PRINTING.

The object of this course is to prepare a student to acquire a practical knowledge of the art of printing in all its phases. The practice work and theory embrace all forms of job work and the publication of the *Prairie View Standard*, the weekly newspaper issued by the College. The course in printing offers an opportunity to learn a useful art and at the same time it affords, incidentally, a most useful practice in spelling, grammar, punctuation and composition.

The equipment consists of numerous fonts of new and up-to-date job and display type, latest improved newspaper and job chases, wood and metal furniture, new 10x15 Chandler & Price job press, one large newspaper power press, one 23-inch Chandler & Price paper cutter, wire stitcher, 20-inch Rossback perforator, Price paper cutter, type cases, stands, etc.

DESCRIPTION OF COURSE.

The course of study includes the following:

Names and uses of material and the care of printing machinery; practice in ad setting and job composition; practice in pamphlet binding and table composition. Study and practice of the prevailing styles of composition for billheads, title and cover pages, envelope corner, cards and tickets, programs and menus. Methods and practice in mak-

ing up estimates for printing material and equipment, cost system, and newspaper machinery.

TAILORING.

The object of this course is to prepare the student to become a practical tailor and garment repairer. The student completing this course will be enabled to enter the tailoring trade and to do creditable work. The uniforms of the young men of the College are made by students in this department. This work offers an opportunity for a large amount of practice and gives the student taking this course here an unusual advantage in preparing for this trade.

DESCRIPTION OF COURSE.

The course of study includes the following:

Practice in hand needle work, basting and making different kinds of stitches; dry cleaning, dyeing and pressing; measurements, drafting and cutting of trousers; practice in making coats, vests and trousers' pockets; practice in cutting and making coats and trousers; a study of all materials and different styles, including frock, Prince Albert, cutaway and double-breasted coats.

POWER PLANT MACHINERY.

The object of this course is to prepare students to operate and to repair steam and power driven machinery. The steam power plant machinery is used for instruction purposes for this course. The College power plant is equipped with tubular boilers and adequate electric machinery. Power is furnished for lights in all the buildings and campus, for operating the ice plant and the various shops by the power plant machinery.

DESCRIPTION OF COURSE.

Care and management of boiler plant; different types of boilers; feed pumps and all accessories around the boiler room. Repairs and upkeep of the plant.

Care and management of a steam power plant; different type of engines, their installation and care; repairs and upkeep. Use of the steam indicator, and other tools and accessories around the engine room.

Care and management of dynamos and motors of different types. Repairs, windings, use of instruments, etc. Practical wiring and general upkeep of plant.

Gas engines. Study and repair of the gas engine. Setting valves, etc.

PLUMBING AND STEAM FITTING.

The object of this course is for students to become practical plumbers and steamfitters. The school offers excellent opportunities for all phases of this work on the various buildings and in the steam plant.

DESCRIPTION OF COURSE.

Names and care of tools; cutting and threading pipe; tapping water mains; running sewer pipe; running soil pipe; calking; wiping joints; soldering; roughing-in for bathroom and toilet fixtures; setting bathroom and toilet fixtures; connecting boilers, engines and pumps to water and steam lines; repair work of all kinds; steam heat; hot water connections; study of plumbing laws and city ordinances.

AUTOMOBILE RUNNING AND REPAIRING.

The object of this course is to prepare students, not only to become safe and intelligent drivers, but also to enable them to make any repair not involving machinery.

DESCRIPTION OF COURSE.

Names of the different parts of cars; study of the principal parts of cars; study of the different makes of cars; methods of transmission; gasoline engines, electric motors applied to automobiles; methods of ignition; lubrication; forging; chipping and filing; running; study of city traffic laws; elementary accounts.

DEPARTMENT OF MATHEMATICS.

N. A. BANKS.

MISS O. C. GRIGGS.

The purpose of this department is to give each student an intelligent grasp of the *fundamentals* in each mathematical branch here offered. To this end, throughout the several courses, stress is placed upon (1) the development and establishment of fundamental principles; (2) drill exercises, and (3) test work.

As the student advances he is shown the dependence of his advancement upon the previously established principles; and accuracy and thoroughness are insisted upon so as to make his mathematical knowledge readily available in the practical arts as well as in scientific research, thus securing both the *practical* and the *cultural* values of mathematical study.

Arithmetic.—The study and application of this subject is continued throughout the Freshman year, a period of thirty-six weeks, the last quarter being devoted to elementary accounts. Special stress is placed upon the fundamental principles of percentage in application to interest, discount, partial payments, taxes and insurance. The Metric system of weights and measurements is taught by the laboratory method. Thorough drill is given upon problems for analysis, mensuration, ratio and proportion, and powers and roots.

Algebra.—This subject extends through the entire Sophomore year, a period of thirty-six weeks, and comprehends the *fundamental principles* of the subject, special attention being given to equations and problems involving equations, the solving of simultaneous equations

both by elimination and by graphs, powers and roots, pure and affected quadratics, simultaneous quadratics, and the graph of quadratic equations.

Plane Geometry.—This subject is continued throughout the Junior year, thirty-six weeks. The proper use of the ruler, compass, and protractor is taught in the construction of requisite and adequate figures. The demonstration of original theorems and the construction of original problems are required throughout this course. Special properties of the triangle and the numerical evaluation of "Pi" are given special attention.

Solid Geometry.—This subject extends through the first eighteen weeks of the Senior year, and includes polyhedrons, the cylinder, the cone and the sphere.

Plane Trigonometry.—This subject is taught during the last eighteen weeks of the Senior year and includes a brief treatment of functions, the right triangle, the development of essential trigonometric formulae, and the solution of the oblique triangle.

ALTERNATIVE COURSE.

High school graduates and graduates from other normal schools and colleges who enter the Junior year will be given such instruction as needed in geometry during the first eighteen weeks, and plane trigonometry during the last eighteen weeks of the Junior year.

The Senior year work for the same students will consist of the first eighteen weeks in college algebra, and the last eighteen weeks in analytics.

DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH AND LATIN.

The aim in any good course in English is to prepare the pupil that he may be able to express both orally and in writing, with freedom, clearness and force, those thoughts of his which are worthy of expression. And, too, the proper appreciation of literary masterpieces of the ages is impossible to one who is ignorant of and without the practical experience of literary creation.

Aside from the mental discipline which comes from a study of Latin, it is the aim of this course to help the student very materially in the acquisition of a large vocabulary through the derivation and association of words. True enough, there is a deal of good to be had from a study of Latin classics, and so far as this may be done in this very limited course, it shall be done.

The work of the Freshman year is divided into three parts. During the first term a careful review of English Grammar is given, Compo-

sition and Rhetoric throughout the second and third terms, with a deal of attention paid to practice work in composition writing and story telling, keeping in mind that correct oral and written expression is the chief end.

During the Sophomore year a brief history of English and American Literature is taken up. For the first term, American Literature; for the second term, English Literature; and for the third term a careful study of the best English and American classics. A fairly good and growing library insures ready reference and much real good from the work of this year.

The work of the Junior year is a beginner's Latin. As the advanced work in Latin depends very greatly on the thoroughness of the work of the first year more than ordinary stress will be laid on the fundamentals, such as accent, pronunciation, declension, conjugation, syntax idiom of the language, etc. Sight reading will come in for its part of the year's work, as well as some work in prose composition.

The work of the Senior year will be a study of Caesar's Gallic Wars and the peculiar literary style of this historian-general. During the last term one or two of the orations of Cicero will be studied, and compared with Caesar's works as to style, etc.

An alternative course is offered the graduates of first class high schools and colleges, the Junior year offering Cicero and Virgil, and the Senior year De Senectute and De Amicitia.

FRESHMAN.

Ancient History, 3 units. (Myers.)—This course undertakes to conduct the student into an investigation of the underlying principles and forces which condition outward events; and much interested attention will be given to the men that gave impetus to great movements and their achievements down to the founding of the Empire of Charlemagne, A. D. 800. Five times a week.

SOPHOMORE.

Medieval and Modern History, 3 units. (Myers.)—In this course time and attention are put on the study of those peoples who have contributed largely to the economic and political progress of the world.

Special attention is given to the study of the men and the great movements which have influenced the course of modern progress and made it continuous. Five times a week.

JUNIOR.

While no specific subject has been named under the caption, "General Methods," we hope to have sufficient time to give incidental instruction in the subject of Economics.

The insistent purpose of this is, that the student may know, by investigation, the many economic questions in their broad and current relation to social welfare. (Time adjustment to be made.)

SENIOR.

Amer. History and Civics—2d Amer., 1st Civics.—The purpose of this course is to study intelligently the social and political movements of the American people, and by the agencies of conscience and judgment decide that great beneficent movements and achievements are attended by some petty wrongs to a few, but great good to many.

The intelligent study of the American institutions will heighten the confidence and deepen the patriotism of the student, and ultimately grow a high class citizenship. All teaching in this department will have this objective point in mind.

FOR HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES.

Industrial History, U. S., 3 units.—In this course the student will note critically the causes that gave rise to higher civilization and how the acquired civilization redounds to the good of commerce and religion.

DEPARTMENT OF SCIENCE.

Physiology and Hygiene.—This subject is given in the first term of the Freshman year, and treated in a practical way, giving the student a clear knowledge of the human body as a working organism, and its functions are worked out as they relate to health and sanitation.

To facilitate the work, a Mannakin, lantern slides, and clay models of the different organs are used.

Physical Geography.—This is offered in the second and third terms of the Freshman year, and will be treated as in Tarr's Physical Geography, supplemented by means of charts, raised maps and slides.

Special attention is given to climatic conditions, distribution of animal and plant life, and its effects upon trade and production.

Physics I.—Physics I is given in the Sophomore year and is intended to give a knowledge of the elementary laws of the simple mechanical powers, giving special attention to the laws of the mechanics of fluids, heat, sound and electricity. It is studied during the whole year with

five recitation periods a week, three of recitation and demonstration lecture periods, forty-five minutes each, and two laboratory periods, ninety minutes each.

Physics II.—This is advanced physics, and is offered in the first and second terms of the Senior year. It is intended to prepare the student for the higher work in mechanics and other work. It is treated in three recitations and demonstration lecture periods, and two double periods for laboratory experiment. Note-books must be presented from each pupil at the end of the second term.

The mechanics of electricity, sound and light will be studied.

Chemistry I.—This course continues throughout the year and aims to give the pupil the principles underlying inorganic chemistry, and a clear knowledge of the elements and compounds. The last term of the year will be given to dry tests.

Chemistry II.—This course is given to the Junior of the alternative course or high school graduates and domestic science classes. It is a course in chemical analysis, both qualitative and quantitative.

Chemistry III.—Chemistry III is a one-term course in organic chemistry, and is designed principally for domestic science pupils. It is intended to give the pupil some idea of the carbohydrates, protien and fats, and how to test some of the common food products.

Zoology I.—This course is given to the Seniors in the alternative course, and treats fully the invertebrate and vertebrate animals with special attention to insects and mammalia.

Botany.—Botany is given to all normal Seniors in the third term. It gives the student a working knowledge of plant life and its application to farm and garden.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION.

This department, consisting of school management, psychology and history of education, is intended to give the student: (1) a knowledge of the complex problems to be met with in the schoolroom and the best way to meet and make disposition of them; also the methods to be employed—general as well as specific—in teaching the different subjects; (2) a knowledge of the mind and its operations that in the teaching process the best results may be obtained at the minimum expenditure of time and energy; (3) a knowledge of the changes and development in education, theoretically and practically, from primitive man to the present day, and the persons who have been most instrumental in bringing about these changes.

The Department of Domestic Science aims to teach the fundamental scientific principles of cookery, both theoretical and practical, and to instill into the pupils a desire to appreciate the value and make full use of the vast amount of farm produce, studying the composition, preparation and food value of the various food stuff. It emphasizes systematic home management and the ways and means of reducing the high cost of living, so that those finishing may go out thoroughly efficient in all that pertains to household economics.

To that end there are offered the following three courses:

3—HOME MAKERS' COURSE.

The department offers a two-years course to those not desiring to teach the subjects, but wishing to do self-improvement for better household management. In this work the students are given thorough practice in plain sewing, home dressmaking and millinery. A statement of completion, which will enable those who finish this work by their efficiency to demand better wages, will be given.

Note.—Students satisfactorily completing the sewing in the Household Arts Course are given certificates in sewing and millinery.

The main object of the department is to foster a high appreciation of the value and dignity of intelligent labor. The boy who sees nothing in manual labor but dull, brute force, looks with contempt upon the labor and the laborer; but as soon as he acquires skill himself, the conditions are reversed, and henceforth he appreciates the work and honors the workman. The students are trained in the use of the various tools employed in the mechanic arts. The students are thoroughly grounded in the principle of engineering subjects. The subjects taught are: Mechanics, Kinematics, Gas Engines, Dynamo-Electric Machinery, Thermodynamics, and Hydraulics. These subjects are accompanied by a strong course in engineering laboratory work.

DESCRIPTION OF COURSE OF STUDY IN MECHANIC ARTS DEPARTMENT.

For description of cultural subjects see announcement of department in which they are taught.

Freehand Drawing I, II and III.—First year. Four hours per week. Study of the position and proportion of figures. Study of simple geometric forms. Freehand perspective. Object drawing.

Mechanical Drawing I.—Fall Term, second year. Four hours per week. Drawing instruments and their use; geometrical construction.

Mechanical Drawing II.—Winter Term, second year. Four hours per week. Lettering and dimensioning. Mechanical drawing from objects.

Mechanical Drawing III.—Spring Term, second year. Four hours per week. Isometric and cabinet projection. Mechanical drawing from freehand sketches of blocks, pulleys, etc.

Machine Drawing and Design I.—Winter Term, third year. Six hours per week. Drawings of the simpler machines; detail and assembly drawings.

Machine Drawing and Design II.—Spring Term, third year. Six hours per week. Design of simple machines with complete set of working drawings.

Descriptive Geometry I and II.—Fall and Winter Terms. Fourth year. Three hours per week. Problems relating to the point, line and

plane, the properties of surfaces and intersection and developments. Lectures or recitations precede the work in the drawing room.

Elementary Mechanics I.—Fall Term, third year. Three hours per week. Study of forces, velocities and the graphical representation of same.

Elementary Mechanics II.—Winter Term, third year. Three hours per week. Study of work, power, energy, friction, the general law of machines, elasticity, mechanic of fluids.

Kinematics.—Spring Term, third year. Three hours per week. A systematic study of the motions and forms of parts of machines constitutes this course. Bearings, screws, cones, gear teeth, levers, cams and linkwork are some of the subjects discussed.

Electrical Machinery I.—Fall Term, third year. Three hours per week. Study of laws and principles of direct current machinery.

Electrical Machinery II.—Winter Term, third year. Three hours per week. Study of laws and principles of alternating current machinery, including induction motors and transformers.

Gas Engines.—Spring Term, third year. Three hours. Study of the various types of internal combustion engines. The greater part of the course is devoted to oil and gasoline engines.

Steam Engineering Laboratory.—Fall, Winter and Spring Terms, third year. Six hours per week. Drill in steam engine and boiler tests and also test of refrigerating machinery, pumps, and air compressor.

Thermodynamics.—Fall and Winter Terms, fourth year. Three hours per week. Study of the principles of thermodynamics; a discussion of the properties of gases; study of various types of steam engines, air compressors, refrigerating systems, steam boilers, valve gears and power plant accessories.

Hydraulics.—Fall and Winter Terms, fourth year. Three hours per week. The study of the principles and hydrostatic and hydrodynamic pressure, the flow of water through orifices and nozzles, through pipe and channels, and the losses from friction and other sources. Also study of impulse wheels and reaction turbines with reference to regulation, construction and testing and to various sources of loss of energy in operation.

Pumping Machinery.—Spring Term, fourth year. Three hours per week. Study of the various types of pumping machinery as to construction, regulation and testing.

Shop Equipment.—Spring Term, fourth year. Three hours per week. Study of shop equipment of various kinds. The layout of equipment for manual training in a small school, with an estimate of cost.

Shop Mathematics.—Spring Term, fourth year. Three hours per week. Solution of problems that arise in industrial practice, such as calculations of size of pulleys, belts, gears and the like.

Carpentry I.—Fall Term, first year. Nine hours per week. Shop equipment; names, uses, care and selection of tools, squaring up mill, planed stock to definite and to no definite dimensions, making chisel boards, broom holders, coat and hat racks and other simple objects.

Carpentry II.—Winter Term, first year. Nine hours per week. Squaring up rough stock and working curves, exercises in joinery, making stock bills, making simple productive articles, fastenings with nails and screws.

Carpentry III.—Spring Term, first year. Nine hours per week. Duplicate parts, things pertaining to further exercises in joinery, designing and constructing simple productive articles, estimating material, sandpapering, finishing furniture. Review of year's work.

Pattern Making I.—Spring Term, second year. Six hours per week. Wood turning; spindle work, porch spindle, table legs, chair rounds, balusters.

Pattern Making II.—Fall Term, third year. Six hours per week. A series of exercises showing the principles governing pattern construction in making plain and split patterns.

Forging I and II.—Fall and Winter Terms, second year. Eight hours per week. Systematic instruction in the use of each tool; of each material and the methods of treatment of each. The course includes instruction in the building and the care of fires, heating, drawing, forming, bending, twisting, upsetting, punching, bolt making, welding, chain making and tool making. Such articles as gate hooks, lap rings, chisels, hammers and andirons are made.

Shop Practice.—Fourth year. Ten hours per week. Practice is given in shipping, filing, scraping and drilling, reaming, boring, cutting of threads, chucking and problems in turning and calipering.

Mechanical Testing.—Fourth year. Eight hours per week. Calibration and use of laboratory measuring instruments and apparatus. Tests of cement and concrete aggregates; tensile, compressive and transverse tests of wood and metal; tests to determine loss of head in pipes due to various causes.

Work is offered by this department to students in other courses in carpentry, freehand and mechanical drawing, wood turning, laundry and dry cleaning. The work, although not as extensive as that given students in the Mechanic Arts Course is such as to ground the student in the principles of each subject.

The Agricultural Course is designed to meet the growing needs of the teacher and farmer. The student is given a working knowledge of botany, entomology and zoology so that he might classify and know plants, insects and animals, and their economic value. The College is fortunate in having registered horses, jack, cows and hogs, which en-

ables it to give the student first hand knowledge of breeding, feeding, judging and care of animals. We have a well equipped dairy for instruction in testing and butter making and ice cream making. We strive to make the work in this department just as practical as possible and this is one reason that as much practice has been placed in the course as has been done. Vegetable gardening has been stressed in this course, as there is such a large field open to the colored youth in growing truck and other products, with so little competition and a demand for everything produced. We have done this, as there are so many communities asking for school gardening and canning in connection with the regular school work. The course is designed to help the teacher to better present the subject of agriculture, to help the farmer with soil problems in preventing the depletion of the soil fertility, marketing and buying to the best advantage and in making the farm pay.

The ultimate aim of the course is to make better practical farmers and to teach them to see the beauty in farm life and the advantages of the same.

COURSE IN PIANO.

Piano, Violin and Mandolin thoroughly taught. Pupils advanced according to ability. The Piano Course includes the following studies: Root's Pleasant Hours Instruction Book, Sonatina Album, containing sonatinas and rondos by Bach, Beethoven, Haydn, Mozart and others; Sonata Album by Haydn, Mozart and Beethoven; Field's Nocturnes, Mozart's Sonatas, Chopin's Nocturnes and Artist's Repertoire.

GENERAL INFORMATION.

SITUATION AND SURROUNDINGS.

The Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College is located in Southeast Texas, in Waller county, six miles east of Hempstead. The situation is commanding and beautiful. The buildings face a broad prairie on the south, which runs for miles to the southeast. To the west and north lie extensive tracts of timber. Five miles southeast is the growing little town of Waller. The Houston & Texas Central Railway runs in front of the school, a mile distant, making the College easy of access by rail from all parts of the State.

A constant Gulf breeze, which often becomes a strong wind, insures a pure and healthful atmosphere, and the general health of the pupils has been good.

HOW TO REACH PRAIRIE VIEW.

Several days before leaving home, students should inform their nearest railroad ticket agent that Prairie View Station is in Waller county on the main line of the Houston & Texas Central Railway, and find out from him the best route to reach it. Find out also on what day and on what train you will arrive, and notify the Principal of the school of your coming.

OPENING DAY.

The thirty-seventh annual session opens Wednesday, September 6, 1916, and every student, if possible, should reach the College on the opening day.

MESS HALL.

All student boarders and all unmarried teachers take their meals at this building in the large dining hall. The aim of the State is to furnish a palatable, healthful diet at actual cost of material and service.

YOUNG WOMEN'S DORMITORIES.

The girls of the institution are housed in five dormitory buildings: one, a two-story frame building of 31 rooms; the second a three-story brick building of 36 rooms, and the third and fourth are three-story brick buildings of 28 rooms each on second and third floors, and containing on the first floor the Sewing and Cooking Departments, and the fifth a frame building with 16 rooms. These five buildings are all lighted by electric lights and have water connection and baths with hot and cold water.

YOUNG MEN'S DORMITORIES.

The Kirby Building has been moved to the east part of the campus, and has undergone an extensive and thorough remodeling and repair,

which has made this one of the most useful and tasteful buildings of the institution. The upper story contains ten bedrooms for Senior boys; the lower, seven rooms, are used for the Chemical and Physical Laboratory and recitation rooms.

Pickett Hall is a frame building of twenty-four rooms for the accommodation of young men.

The three-story brick dormitory, Foster Hall, was built for boys in order to meet the growing demand for room. This building contains twenty-nine rooms, with good light, ventilation and furnishings. Shower baths for boys have been installed in each of the dormitories.

ACADEMIC HALL.

This hall is a stately building—the main central part being three stories in height and containing, above, class rooms, and below, the Principal's office, book store, library and reading room. Two wings, each of two stories, contain six recitation rooms and two committee rooms, used solely by the Board of Directors whenever the business of the school requires their presence at the institution.

THE SHOP.

The shop of the Mechanical Department is a two-story brick structure, with additional rooms of brick, containing the woodworking outfit, and additions containing the blacksmithing outfit, engine and boiler, printing, shoe and harness shops, etc.

THE CAMPUS.

The school campus comprises at present fifty acres in which the above buildings are appropriately situated. Thirty teacher's cottages are located around the campus. All the dormitories and school buildings have light and water connections.

HONORS.

Students who complete the studies of the full course satisfactorily, making required averages, will receive a Normal Diploma. Said diploma has by law the rank of a permanent teacher's certificate and is valid during good behavior.

First Grade Normal Certificates, valid for six years, and Second Grades, valid for four years, in the public schools of Texas, may be issued to those who complete the required subjects and attain the required standing in the work of the third and second years, respectively.

In addition to an attendance of at least 32 weeks, and satisfactory class-room work and deportment, students must show a commendable ability to teach before either certificate or diploma is granted.

The right of a pupil to receive a diploma or a certificate shall be determined by the Faculty, in full meeting, according to the standard of scholarship, and the mode of recording the same, as have been regularly and previously provided for.

LIBRARY AND READING ROOM.

The general library and reading room occupies a space on the first floor of Academic Hall. It contains about 2000 volumes of reference books, history, biography, poetry and general literature. Most of these books are selected with special reference to the tastes of students and young people—and are classified according to the latest methods. They are all catalogued on cards, and drawn by all pupils without cost.

The reading room receives regularly some of the leading newspapers and periodicals, and is open seven hours on each week day, two hours on Sunday and three hours on holidays. A reading room for girls with equal accommodations is located in their brick dormitory.

RELIGIOUS OBSERVANCES.

On Sunday morning at 9:30 a Sunday school is regularly held, followed by a review of the lesson by the superintendent. Two voluntary Christian societies are maintained by students, assisted by teachers, the Y. W. C. A. for girls and the Young Men's Christian Association for the young men. The Young Men's Christian Association is well organized and holds two meetings each week; one for Bible study as outlined by the International Committee, and another where different religious and moral subjects are discussed.

At 7 p. m. every Sabbath, students assemble in the Chapel to hear a sermon or a religious lecture.

LITERARY SOCIETIES.

In addition to the classes in monthly rhetoricals, each class is expected to organize and maintain a literary society throughout the session. These literary societies are officered and governed by members of the respective classes, a teacher being assigned to encourage and supervise each organization. Experience demonstrates that much useful drill and education may be derived from the proper conduct and management of these societies.

RHETORICALS.

The first and second periods of every other Saturday in the school year are given to rhetoricals. The whole student body is divided into groups and one group is assigned to a teacher. Two hours of the first Friday night in each month of school are given to a public program composed of pieces rehearsed during the month and the pupils rendering them.

Y. W. C. A.

MARY J. SIMS, Advisory Teacher.

During the past three years the Young Women's Christian Association has grown to be an important factor in the religious activities of the institution.

Regular meetings are held twice every month, but the prayer meetings, which are under the direction of this department, are held weekly, every Tuesday evening. The rapid growth in attendance and the spiritual interest manifested by all in these meetings has been marvelous. Then, every Sunday afternoon, from 3 o'clock to 4 o'clock, Bible classes are conducted.

The association also helps students in a material way. We hope to do more in this line from year to year.

The Y. W. C. A. library contains over 300 volumes of well graded books and hundreds of girls have been constant readers. By means of this library the girls have grown in closer friendship than ever. Better spiritual work can be done if each student will bring a Bible.

All contributions are voluntary except the annual fee.

All athletic games are under the supervision of the association. This year the games have been gymnastics, tennis, croquet, baseball and basketball.

It is the purpose of the Y. W. C. A. to have every girl attending the school become an active member of the association.

SOME GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1. The discipline of the school aims to lead its students to self-control, and to prepare them for the successful discharge of the practical duties of everyday life and citizenship as well as for the special duties of school, farm, shop and home.

2. Promptness to all school duties is exacted. Neatness and cleanliness as a rule of the institution.

3. Students are impressed that intelligent labor is dignified and necessary to all individual or social development.

4. No student need come to Prairie View with the idea that it is a place to get a certificate to teach with little real effort. Thorough, conscientious work must be done to merit any honor from the institution.

5. No student can leave the ground at any time, or omit any school duty, unless by written consent from the Principal.

6. The use of tobacco and of all narcotic or alcoholic stimulants is forbidden as being a hindrance to the process of education.

7. Students whose conduct raises doubt or suspicion of their character and motives may be requested to withdraw from the institution.

8. True politeness is the rule of social conduct, and rudeness in speech or manner, ill temper, noisy, boisterous behavior, disputes and quarrels, are forbidden.

9. Extravagance and showiness in dress are not approved of by the Faculty. A neat, plain attire, and a modest, self-respecting demeanor, are expected of each student. Young ladies who graduate are required to wear a uniform designated by the Faculty.

10. All students are required to settle their dues in advance for the month, and students who fall behind ten days in the payment of their dues shall receive a notice, giving them ten days more to settle; and at the expiration of that time, if settlement is not made, such student shall be sent home.

11. All students are required to improve their advantages to a reasonable degree and according to their ability, and when it becomes apparent that a pupil's time is not profitably employed he will be requested to withdraw.

12. Any student who marries during the school session forfeits his rights to any further connection as a student, and will be required to withdraw immediately from the institution.

13. Any student who proves physically unable to attend to school duties may be requested to withdraw.

14. Pupils proving to be consumptives will be sent home for proper medical treatment.

15. Idle, inattentive, refractory pupils will be dismissed.

CONCLUSION.

In preparing this catalogue, an attempt has been made to give the information necessary to those who think of attending school here. The course of study, entrance requirements, text-books, cost of board, and other matters of equal importance, are fully stated. However, if after carefully reading its contents the reader should desire further information concerning the school, a letter of inquiry addressed to the Principal will receive prompt attention.
