

From the discussion the committee tabulated the following suggestions to aid in the advisory program of 1938-39 (in addition to those contained in the Secretary's report):

- 1 To include, or incorporate, in the program a series of lectures to Freshmen students, subjects and lecturers to be decided upon; these lectures to be designed to enable the first year student to adapt himself to college life with greater ease.
- 2 To acquaint the Freshman student with the advisory system during his period of orientation, originating a special "Adviser-Night", at which time student groups will be introduced to their future counsellor.
- 3 To hold meetings of the advisers at least three times a year.

Following the discussion of the student personal advisory system, the Chairman called for reports from the chairmen of class supervisory committees:

Brief summaries of these reports follow:

Dr E M Norris (Senior Class) - The major activities during the year, with the exception of course, of graduation details, were:

- 1 Participation in the "Miss Prairie View" contest.
- 2 The purchase of an electric clock for the Gymnasium-Auditorium

Dr E B Evans (Junior Class) - The Junior class continues to follow its well organized plan which was evolved in 1935-36 by the class sponsors and officers. The program for each year is presented in mimeographed form to each class member at the beginning of each school term. Meetings are held monthly and the program aims to include as many students as possible. One class supervisor is always present at meetings.

Report (Cont'd)

Mr R P Perry (Sophomore Class) - The class was forced to reorganize after an unfortunate incident involving the president. A final meeting was held to discuss some suggestions given by Dr Evans. All difficulties are believed ironed out and the class looks forward to an eventful Junior year.

Dr G L Harrison (Alpha Pi Mu) - Alpha Pi Mu boasted its largest membership during the 1937-38 term. Discussion at meetings centered around methods of maintaining high scholastic average. Certificates of membership were awarded to all 58 members at the close of the term.

Miss A L Campbell (Y W C A) - In addition to the regular "Y" activities which included 200 members, a "Freshman Fellowship" club was organized, sponsored by three upper-class women and maintaining a personnel of 75 Freshman girls. Problems of race, worship, and public affairs were discussed at the meetings.

The "Y" took an active part in all religious conferences and sent delegates to the National Student Assembly which convened with 2,000 persons.

Mr J M Alexander (Sunday School) - The Sunday School is operated as a character building agency with emphasis on the development of spiritual insights and the strengthening of the basic ideals in our citizenship.

This organization is voluntary. Every student is invited and left to decide whether to take part or not. However, we had an enrollment of 210 students, 13 instructors, and 3 housewives in regular attendance.

Report (cont'd)

All regular meetings were presided over by the student superintendent or the assistant superintendent, student secretary and pianists under the direct supervision of faculty advisers.

The Sunday School group always sponsors some project during each school year . This year the group sponsored the printing of 2,000 copies of special service hymnals at a cost of \$23.00, and made contributions totaling \$67.70 to the Hammond Electric Organ Fund.

REPORT OF CREDIT UNION
1937-1938

The following report on the Credit Union Committee activity on the Prairie View State College Employee Federal Credit Union is for your information:

Membership - The membership in the Credit Union totals 54. Three members have withdrawn their shares since the organization, leaving 51 active members. The goal is 100 members, which, I think, can be attained this year.

Shares - A total of \$529.25 has been paid in shares since the organization. Of this amount \$78.00 has been withdrawn leaving a balance of \$571.25.

Loans and Lending Policy - The total amount loaned since the organization (First loan made October 1, 1937) is \$1201.92. Of this amount \$374.40 is still out but not delinquent.

The loan policy has been rather liberal due to the small amount of risk at Prairie View College. This has enabled us to lend through fast turn-over the \$1201.00 with only \$571.25 in shares. Our September 1, 1938 bank statement shows \$181.00. A total amount of \$1461.79 has been deposited in the bank since our beginning.

Recapitulation - The Credit Union has done a very effective piece of work. There are 153 people employed at Prairie View College, only 33% or 1/3 belong to the Credit Union. When more persons join, the Credit Union will be able to finance more activities.

The Credit Union needs to put on a drive for membership at the beginning of the year until the membership totals not less than 100. When such a figure is reached, I feel reasonably confident that the Prairie View State College Employees Federal Credit Union will do a total business of not less than ten thousand dollars a year.
