America's Accident Toll 1937

- 1 Killed 106,000
- 2 Injured - 9,900,000
- 3 Cost - \$3,600,000,000
- 4 Accidents Kill -
  - (1) One person every five minutes
  - (2) Twelve persons every hour
  - (3) 290 every day
  - (4) 2000 every week

5 Of all accidental deaths -

- 37% are caused by Motor Vehicle accidents (1)
- (2) 31% are caused by accidents in The Home
- (3)
- 18% are caused by Industrial accidents 17% are caused by Public (non-traffic) accidents (4)

6 Types of Car Accidents -

- (1) Center Road Accidents - responsible for 17% of traffic accidents
