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



The 45-year-old native of Donaldsonville, La. earned the bachelor's and master's degree in electrical engineering from Notre Dame. he earned a doctoral degree in electrical engineering from Johns Hopkins University.

He has taught electrical engineering at Notre Dame, Southern University, Johns Hopkins University, Morgan State, University of Michigan, UCLA and at Howard where he was dean of engineering from 1971 to 1977.

Dr. Pierre also has worked for the Rand Corporation, was program officer with the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation, served as a White House fellow and Assistant Secretary of the Army for Research, Development and Acquisition. He also founded a Washington DC consulting firm in 1981.

Athletics played a big part in his background having played basketball on his high school team.

And as chief executive officer at Prairie View the excellence and high achievements which he has earned will be transcended into the athletic department with successful programs across the board expected under Dr. Pierre's guidance.

Dr. Pierre currently serves as a member of the Board of Trustees at Notre Dame, a member of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, on the Advisory Committee for Engineering at the Johns Hopkins University, is treasurer for the White House Fellows Foundations, member of the Advisory Committee for Engineering at Florida A&M University and Florida State University, a counselor for the Texas A&M Research Foundation and co-vice chairperson for the Texas Committee for Employer Support of the Texas National Guard and Reserve.

Dr. Pierre is married to the former Olga Markham and has two daughters, Kristin and Allison.


One can speak of the historically high budget in the \$30 million dollar category but it is better to look at the magnitude of the human worth encompassed in the Johnson endeavors.



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An Important Message on Proposition 2

On November 6, 1984, the voters of Texas will be asked to approve a Constitutional Amendment, Proposition 2, which is critical to Prairie View A&M University in particular and public higher education in Texas in general. The ballot language reads as follows:

FOR OR AGAINST . . .

The Constitutional Amendment created from general revenue a special higher education assistance fund for construction and related activities, to restructure the Permanent University Fund, and to increase the number of institutions eligible to benefit from the Permanent University Fund.

Proposition 2 establishes a new constitutionally dedicated fund for all public four year institutions outside the University of Texas and Texas A&M University Systems. At the same time, it broadens participation in the bonding program of the Permanent University Fund to include all UT and A&M Units. With its passage, all public senior colleges and universities will have dedicated funding to meet urgent needs for construction, repair and rehabilitation of existing facilities, and purchase of equipment, library books and materials.

This Constitutional Amendment provides the classrooms, libraries, laboratories, and educational equipment so vital to Texas students and our future.

It has widespread support from faculty members, administrators, students and others in higher education, as well as from both political parties and many public officials. The governing boards of all public universities have endorsed it.

It is essential that all alumni, friends and supporters of Prairie View A&M University understand the significance of this proposition.

Please consider its importance when you cast your ballot on November 6, 1984.

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
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



National Football Foundation's

College Football Hall of Fame



Since the College Football Hall of Fame opened in August 1978, it has appealed to people of all ages with just about every interest imaginable . . . people who like movies, sports, computer games, American history, modern museums, great athletes, colorful displays, nostalgia, memorabilia, stirring speeches, cheerleaders, marching bands, Saturday afternoons in the fall and college football.

When the Hall of Fame was dedicated in August 1978, "Red" Blaik was the keynote speaker. He spoke to the crowd on behalf of all Hall of Famers and said,



"This is the best happening in college football since the legalization of the forward pass." His comment exemplifies the excitement that awaits college football fans who visit the shrine and the experience that already has been enjoyed by thousands.

The College Football Hall of Fame is not only a place to see,



learn and participate in the history of football, but a place to get to know the game as it is today. From its one-eighth mile long Time Tunnel, which traces the 2,000-year development of the game from ancient Greece to the present in more than 30 time capsules, to the Hall of Fame Room where each of the Hall of Famers are honored, to its futuristic use of computer terminals that allow the visitor to match wits with the great coaches or to call up the biographies of every Hall of Famer, the museum can and does bring the total college football experience to life. Its personalized approach and action-oriented attractions have intrigued all who have visited. As "Sleepy" Jim Crowley, one of the Notre Dame Four Horsemen, simply said, "This Hall of Fame is not in the telling or talking about, it's in the seeing."

Galbreath Field

The National Collegiate Division III Football Championship (Amos Alonzo Stagg Bowl) moved to the College Football Hall of Fame's Galbreath Field in 1983. Augustana College (Illinois) came from behind for an exciting 21-17 victory over Union College (New York).

This year's championship again will be played at Galbreath Field on Saturday, December 8. The Amos Alonzo Stagg Bowl will mark the culmination of a three-week, 16-team national play-off among the nation's most outstanding small college football teams. Every aspect of the play-off is under the administration of the NCAA Division III Football Committee.

Galbreath Field is a 10,000-seat stadium located immediately adjacent to the College Football Hall of Fame at Kings Island, Ohio. The first intercollegiate game was played at Galbreath Field on September 12, 1981, between Ashland College and the University of Dayton.



EYE OF THE STORM

The atmosphere around Grambling is subtly different this football season.

Coach Eddie Robinson will launch the 1984 campaign, his 43rd as foreman of the G-Men, the focus of national media atten-

As the nation's winningest active coach (313-102-15), Robinson only needs 11 victories to overtake the late Paul "Bear" Bryant (323-85-17) to become the all-time college coaching leader.

The historical milestone isn't one that he will relish breaking. Robinson and Bryant were close friends.

"I'm not concerned about personal records. Time takes care of everything and it will eventually take care of that. All it means is that I've been around a long time," he modestly explains.

When Bryant's record is finally broken, Robinson's new standard will likely stand forever, Georgia coach Vince Dooley reasons. "Coaches are not likely to remain in the profession long enough to win 300 plus games in the future," he said. This sentiment is echoed by sports writers and broadcasters nationally.

In the final game last season, Robinson tied Glen "Pop" Warner (313-106-32) as the third winningest coach in the coun-

Ahead are Alonzo Stagg (314-199-35) and Bryant.

Outwardly, the GSU mentor is showing little visible effect over the added pressure.

A tempo setter at Grambling where he has been an unmeasurable quantity since the mid '50's Robinson is respected as one of football's ranking strategic brains - a teacher and recruiter with few peers.

He has improved his handicraft each year, developing the Tigers into a perennial football power and keeping them on top.

Few coaches possess his drive, fire and commanding presence. Robinson has a gift for organizing and a knack for arriving at effectual decisions.

Over 200 of his players have mastered the intricacies of professional football. He has developed 60 all-Americans.

Grambling holds the distinction of having had 43 players on

pro rosters for the opening of summer camp in 1971 - the largest from any school ever.

Tiger pro stars read like a "Who's Who" in football. Hall-of-Famers Willie Davis and Willie Brown head a retired NFL allstar cast that includes Paul "Tank" Younger, Ernie Ladd, Buck Buchanan, Roosevelt Taylor, Clifton McNeil, Frank Lewis, James Harris, Nemiah Wilson, Willie Young, Willie Williams, Essex Johnson, James Hunter, Matt Reed, Richard Harris, Billy Newsome, Ezil Bibbs, Delles Howell, Dwight Scales and Frank

The current pro crop includes Doug Williams, Sammy White, Trumaine Johnson, Everson Walls, Robert Pennywell, Guy Prather, Sylvestor Moy, Albert Lewis, Charles Smith, Gary Johnson, Steve Dennis, Charlie Joiner, Mike St. Clair, Robert Barber, Robert Smith, Darryl Nichols and Rufus Stephens.

As the season approaches each year, Robinson assumes his usual character - smiling less and moaning more - a ploy that seldom deceives.

It hasn't stopped him from forging 24 consecutive winning seasons. His teams have won 14 Southwestern Athletic Conference championships and seven national black college titles.

Unquestionably, Grambling is ranked as the SWAC team to beat again this fall.

Robinson has earned almost every award and accolade accorded to members of his profession.


In 1966, Football Writers of America cited him as "The coach who made the biggest contribution to college-division football

during the last 25 years."

Two years ago, the Liberty Bowl, Memphis, honored him with the coveted "American Service Award." Later, he received the Distinguished American Commendation Citation from the Walter Camp Foundation at Yale University.

The new 22,000 seat Grambling stadium is named in his

honor. Robinson served as head coach for the East-West Shrine game in 1977. Last January, he coached SWAC seniors in the Freedom Bowl All-Star Classic in Atlanta.







The Marching Tiger Band . . .

When it comes marching in, they all want to be in on that number.

The IT here being the Grambling Tiger Marching Band of Grambling State University and the THEY being the multiple thousands of fans who have either previously seen the sparkling aggregation or have heard bubbling raves about it from others.

Today, the Grambling Tiger Marching Band is nationally and internationally renowned. And it all has happened in the last 31 years.

IT all began in 1952 when Conrad Hutchinson became band director, the fourth in the school's struggling history, and immediately began to revolutionize this particular aspect of a little out-of-the-way college nestled almost unnoticeable in the red hills on northeast central Louisiana.

Thirty years ago. Not a very long time, actually in the history of an institution of higher education.

But what one has to remember is that, at the time, Grambling College itself, not to mention all of its depart-

ments as well as such adjuncts as band, choir and athletic teams, were struggling for survival. Plain survival, door-die. For the whole kit-and-kaboodle, band and all.

What "Hutch," as he is now known all over, did was to produce an outfit, that along with Eddie Robinson's

Tiger football team aided and abetted the institution's survival.

But even for "Hutch" a master of creativity and discipline, it did not happen as fast as one might read it

Twelve long hard years expired before the Tigers band basked in the bright light that director Hutchinson apparently saw at the end of the tunnel.

That was when the Tiger band, in 1964, made its first national appearance in San Diego for the American Football League championship.

The rest is history.

In the 18 years since that AFL performance the Tiger Band in 1965 began a series of half-time shows for the Dallas Cowboys and it performed in the first ever Super Bowl in 1967.

Then, of course, since that time Hutchinson's band has appeared appreciatively in every major sports arena in the United States including the Astrodome, the Louisiana Superdome, the Los Angeles Coliseum, the Rose Bowl, the Cotton Bowl in Dallas, Texas and Yankee Stadium.

This year the band has scheduled appearances in the Louisiana Superdome, Yankee Stadium in New York, at the World's Fair, the Cotton Bowl in Dallas, Texas, The Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis, Indiana.

Moreover, the zestful Tiger Band has been to Tokyo, Japan three times and represented the United States at the inauguration of a Liberian president in Africa in 1972.

What's more, exuberant spectator receptivity at half time at football games has induced post-game shows when the fans don't leave, but perhaps more important than any of its unique achievements, than any of its worldwide accolades, the Grambling State University Marching Band still finds time to lend itself to small town Christmas and other parades, clinics for local high schools and impromptu appearances in ghetto areas for those unable to make it to the Big Time Arenas.

The latest national and most familiar appearance is a Coca-Cola commercial.

So when it — the TIGER MARCHING BAND OF GRAMBLING STATE UNIVERSITY — comes marching in, they, — the people of the nation and a good bit of the world — like and want to be in on and in that number.


