A CREDIT UNION -

B FACULTY COMMUNITY CHEST -

Two years ago the employees at the Prairie View State College unanimously voted to put all demands of a charitable nature on an intelligent and equitable basis. This set up a policy of each employee paying into a common fund - known as the FACULTY COMMUNITY CHEST -2 1/2% of one month's salary. For your information and guidance, an Income and Expenditure statement for 1938-1939 operation is included in this News Letter. I am happy to announce that we shall look forward to the continuation of this useful activity during the Fiscal Year, 1939-1940. It would be interesting to know that practically every one has paid his pro rate for the past two years. Professor G W Buchanan is the Treasurer, and he is now prepared to receive payments for this year.

C COTTAGES -

It has been the policy of the institution to provide living accommodations for married employees. The Housing Committee has endeavored to make assignments in keeping with the school's program. It does not commit itself to any set policy. The practice has been to make assignments in the light of the size of the family.

Since this question of cottages is under review, it is pertinent to have it understood that all cottages assigned belong to the state of Texas, and in consequence, no one to whom quarters are assigned has the authority to rent or sublet the same, under any circumstances. Our experience this summer, makes it very necessary to bring up this question.

D DEBTS -

It is reasonable to expect, under normal circumstances, that every intelligent and honest person will follow the practice of making expenditures safely within the confines of his income. If people do not have sufficient discipline over themselves to keep in control their financial obligations, it is fair to conclude that they are unable to instill in the youths fundamental character traits.
