### G - SUMMER SCHOOL -

The enrollment in the Freshman and Sophomore classes, for the Summer School, 1939, was 68 students. There has been a steady decline in the student enrollment in these classes for the past five years. The marked increases in enrollment are coming in the Junior, Senior, Special and Graduate students. We are again facing the problem of setting up a faculty for an average of 68 students in the first two years college classes in the summer school, from a faculty staff that served more than six hundred (600) in the

regular session. Consequently, it has become necessary to greatly reduce the size of the faculty for the summer school this year as it relates to the Freshman and Sophomore classes.
