Prairie View's J. M. Alexander and the Organ

Prairie Vicw, like many other institutions, was not, and for that matter is not now, able to afford a pipe organ. Nor do we have a place of worship to put such an instrument if we had one. This is as true now as it was in the days of yore. But in the days of yore there lived a man - J. M. Alexander. Mr. Alexander for many years was the faculty representative of the Sunday School, a position now held by able Dr. Thomas Price Dooley. He (Mr. Alexander) was a man of impeccable integrity; indeed, he was a man's man. When it was decided that an effort would be made to purchase our organ he was given the job of treasurer.
