- 1 Mr Buchanan is ready to receive payment of dues to the Community Chest. It is our sincere hope that we may have 100% participation this school year in this praiseworthy activity.
- 2 Dr Smith reports that the Faculty Credit Union is growing and doing a fine business. This organization is ready at any time to be of service to staff members.
- 3 The Committees on Faculty Entertainments are beginning to map plans for a greater program of entertainments of the faculty this year than previously. We want to commend this movement as being worthy of the 100% cooperation of every loyal employee of Prairie View State College. Mr Buchanan will be our Treasurer again this year.
- 4 The Negro Division of the Southwestern Area Council of the YMCA has been offered \$2600 by the National YMCA on condition that the Negroes of this area raise \$1000. The amount of \$3600 will be used to pay the salary of a full-time Secretary for this area Arkansas, Oklahoma and Texas. Plans are now being worked out to raise the \$1000 on or by the convening of our Leadership Institute, December 6, 1940. A full-time man will mean much for the "Y" in the Southwest. In the following table, based on the Journal of the American Medical Association, Hospital Number, March 11, 1939, the states are ranked according to the number of beds in all hospitals per 1,000 population. The table covers all General hospitals, Nervous and Mental, Tuberculosis, Maternity, Industrial, and Eye, Ear, Nose, and Throat.

New York has 14.01 beds in all hospitals for each 1,000 inhabitants, and Mississippi 4.39. North Carolina ranks 45th with 5.05 beds per 1,000 inhabitants.

United States average 8.9 beds per 1,000 population, or nearly twice the North Carolina average.
