YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION Houston, Texas

November 23, 1940

Dear Friend:

You are one of the fifteen hundred Colored Citizens who subscribed more than \$60,000 to the Negro YMCA Building Fund. This was a magnificent achievement. As President of the Young Men's Christian Association, interested in the welfare of all youth in this city, I feel I ought to report the present situation to you.

With the Negroes promising sixty thousand dollars, our white people promised to do the rest. The building proposed was to cost in the neighborhood of \$185,000. A fine location was secured and the site bought at a cost of \$10,500. We expected to move forward without undue delay.

However, we have run into some difficulty. Of the \$60,000 pledged by the Colored subscribers, only \$15,123 has been paid to date. About \$27,000 is delinquent, and all of the smaller pledges are long past due. This is a critical situation but its remedy is simple, namely, the payment of his obligation by every subscriber.

It would be a tragedy if we failed Negro boys and young men now. The white people are willing to do their share. I plead with you and every Colored citizen whose pledge is unpaid to pay it to the Colored Branch of the YMCA today. The future of the Colored Y depends upon how these obligations are met.

SMITH COUNTY

The 4-H Club girls have been helped in compiling reports and stories during the month of October. As a result of assistance given, a story follows by Dezella Phillips of Pine Springs Club:

"Beginning in January, 1940, I started piecing two quilts at a total cost of \$1.10 including materials and thread. I stained my woodwork, put linoleum on the floor and varnished the floor. I bought a suit of furniture which cost \$44.95; put in two new window panes at a cost of 15¢ each and bought a radio for \$33.50. My radio keeps me company when I come home from the fields and serves to keep me informed of the news. My accomplishments in clothing and bedroom work have taken up much of my time. I quilted two quilts, made three pairs of curtains, two dresser scarfs, two pairs of pillowcases and one bedspread. I also made one set of dish towels, one kitchen outfit, and one slip.

My club activities for the year were:

Exhibit in the County Meat Show in March Participation in 4-H Club Day in May Assistance with Home Garden and Canning Assistance with National Negro Health Week in our Community in April Making of Scrap Book Holding office of secretary of my Club Exhibit at the County Fair and Exhibit at the State Fair.

Altogether I won \$4.50 in cash prizes for my exhibits."
