Bahamian Officials Visit PV Campus

Prairie View A&M University played host to several Bahamian Officials. The delegation included the Honorable Dr. Doris Johnson, President of the Senate and Chairperson of the Board of Education and Culture; the Honorable Mr. Livingston Coakley, Minister of Education and Culture; the Honorable Baltron Bethel, Permanent Secretary to the Minister of Education and Culture; Mr. Frank Ramsey, Regional Manager of the Bahamas Island Tourist Office at Dallas, Texas; and Mr. Godfrey Eneas, Deputy Director of Agriculture and Fisheries.

The three day guests were officially received by Dr. A. I. Thomas, President of Prairie View A&M University at a two hour reception held in the Airway Hotel. Several University faculty members and students were present to greet the visitors. The remainder of their visit was packed with luncheon engagements, greeting and meeting various PV personnel, and touring various schools and ranches in the Prairie View area.

The Bahamian interest in Prairie View was made evident when the Honorable Baltron Bethel stated

Honors Convocation Set For Thursday, March 28

Dr. J. Don Boney, President of Houston Community Colleges is the principal speaker for Prairie View A&M University's Nineteenth Annual Honors Convocation and First Annual Texas Conference of Honor Students, Thursday, March 28, 1974 at 9:30 a.m. in the University's Health and Physical Education Building.

Dr. Boney, an outstanding Prairie View alumnus, will be participating in what is generally referred to as the 'high point' of Honors Week March 24-29. "The purpose of Honors Week is to focus the entire student body and faculty on the joys and pleasures of scholastic and academic achievement," explained Dr. Alvin I. Thomas, President of Prairie View A&M University. The Honors Convocation is a traditional occasion paying tribute to Prairie View students who were listed on the Honor Roll the previous semesters; however, for the first time the University will honor high school and junior college honor students giving them a chance to come together to hear an outstanding speaker and discuss matters of mutual concern. It is also traditional at the Academic Convocation that the administration and faculty

present themselves in full academic attire to pay tribute to these students who have earned recognition as honor students.

According to Dr. Edward Martin, Chairman of Planning Committee for Honors Week, a full week of activities are scheduled to take place within the various Schools and Departments of the University. On Wednesday, March 27, at 7:30 in the Memorial Student Center Ballroom, Student Life will hold its Annual Honors and Awards Program. The culminating event will be held Thursday, March 28, at 7:30 p.m. when Dr. Alvin I. Thomas will host some 500 honor roll students at the Semi-Annual President's Banquet for Honor Students.

High School Field Day Set

Prairie View A&M University's AROTC Department will host numerous high schools from around the state of Texas during Prairie View's 30th Annual High School Field Day. The event is scheduled for 5 and 6 April 1974.

High School Field Day is designed to encourage individual and team proficiency in precision drill and rifle marksmanship. It provides High School Junior ROTC Units with an opportunity to demonstrate their drill and marksmanship skills and to simultaneously compete for awards for demonstrating excellence in these areas. Additionally, visitors and guests will be able to eat "Old Fashioned Bar-B-Que", observe numerous static displays and view US Army airborne and rap-

elling teams in action. Tentatively, these US Army professionals will conduct their perilous "sky dive" and "free fall" exhibitions on the afternoons of 5-6 April.

The Lyndon Baines Johnson Memorial Trophy, named in honor of former President Johnson, will be presented to the high school selected as the overall winner of the Field Day competitions. The trophy will be retained until 1975 and retired by any high school winning it twice in succession. Other trophies will be presented to 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place winners.

the main entrance to the university beginning at 7:00 a.m. Each team will be assigned a guide and a dressing area.

2. Rifle Team matches begins at 9:30 a.m. Drawing for firing time will be conducted at 9:00 a.m. in the vicinity of the Rifle Range at Burlison-Ware Hall.

3. Team Commanders meeting: 9:00 a.m., Room 102, Spence Hall, (The Professors of Military Science will welcome competitors and guests and clarify rules) The drawing for order of drill competition will take place at this time.

4. Drill competition: 9:30 a.m., Memorial Center Parking Lot.

5. Lunch: 12:30 p.m. - 1:15 p.m. (Teams will arrange their own lunch

President Thomas Addresses San Antonio Lions Club

"The Bahamian Parliament has established education as its number one priority. The government is devoted to upgrading and developing the system of education so as to equip and enable Bahamians to provide the trained manpower resources which are required for the future development of our country." The government officials felt that the development of national institutions would be beneficial to the Commonwealth of the Bahamas.

The Bahamian delegation seemed intensely interested in PV's concept of education, it's experimental and research programs as well as it's teaching techniques. The dignitaries had several opportunities

to converse with the 38 Bahamian students now enrolled in Prairie View. The five party delegation was concerned with persuing avenues for increasing the Bahamian population at Prairie View. Occasional business meetings were held in which Dr. Johnson and others spoke of the particular need areas in the Bahamas. It is hoped that this cross fertilization with Prairie View can produce individuals capable of satisfying those particular need areas. Mr. Godfrey Eneas, Deputy Director of Agriculture and Fisheries expressed a pronounced interest in the Department of Agriculture's unique Tropical Soil program. In an early business meeting, Minister Coakley remark-

ed, "Prairie View's philosophy of educating people to meet the manpower requirements and economic opportunities in its own peculiar circumstances accords with national education and development objectives of the Bahamian government.

When asked about the productivity of the trip, and their impression of Prairie View, Mr. Bethel remarked on behalf of the dignitaries, "There is a sense of mission here. People are being prepared to do meaningful things. It is our consensus that the learning experiences offered at this institution will equip Bahamian students to make the attitudinal adjustments and professional contributions in our country."

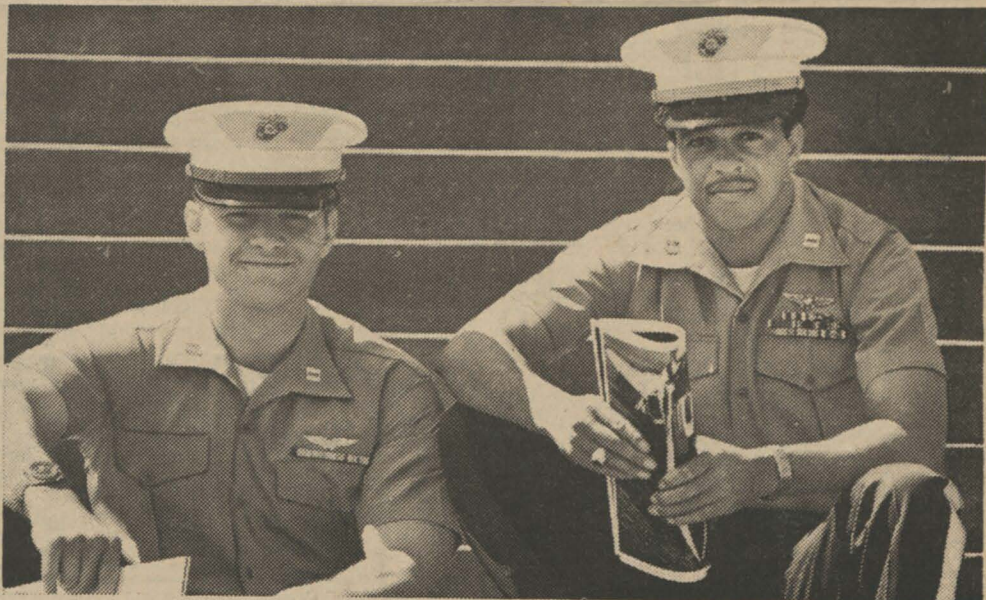
We would like to encourage the various departmental staffs to attend this

Texas A&M Photo Contest Announced

Collegiate photographers will compete April 13 in the TAMU Salon at Texas A&M University.

The annual contest, one of the longest running among Southwest colleges and universities, will take entries until April 10 in 14 categories.

Top prizes are "Best of Show" in color and black and white photography. A \$50 cash prize, ribbon and plaque go to each winner. Runnersup in best of show receive a plaque and ribbon. Top prints in each category will get first, second and third place ribbons.

Sponsored by the Memorial Student Center Camera Committee at Texas A&M, the salon has had winning entries from Washington and Kansas in recent years.

Radio and TV Internships In New York Announced

The International Radio and Television Foundation, Inc. is sponsoring its fifth College Internship Program with the deadline for entries set for May 6. Interested junior, senior and graduate students may secure applications at the PANTHER office.

The Internship Program this year will consist of a minimum of six Internships in New York and will provide for the Intern a total exposure to all the basic facets of television and radio broadcasting, including network and local station operations embracing the functions of programming, sales, promotion, public relations, public service, engineering, legal aspects of broadcasting and, of course, the basic definition of broadcast audiences.

Industry participants will include networks, leading local stations, leading research companies in the broadcasting field, station representatives plus one or two of the largest advertising agencies.

The schedule is tentatively set to begin in early July with the Internship consisting of eight weeks during which the Intern will receive \$100 weekly for living expenses. The Intern must supply his or her own transportation to New York.

The basis for selection this year, as was the case in 1970, 1971, 1972 and 1973, is based upon the written submissions of the competing students. The subject for the written submissions is similar this year to that used in 1973, but since the subject is such a fundamental one, we thought it well to repeat it.

The students have been asked to furnish a written submission which discusses the application of the Fairness Doctrine to news programs and commercial advertising on radio and television. The piece should reflect the candidate's assessment, positive, negative, or a combination of both, of this doctrine as applied to these two different categories of broadcast activity. Since the year 1973 has seen so much news space and time devoted to this subject, it may well be that attitudes and ideas may be somewhat altered from that of the previous year.

Among you, whoever wants to be great be your servant.

St. Mark 10:43

Imagine, a small band of men walking down a dusty road, one talking about a coming event, and suddenly two of them speak, "Lord, we'd like you to do us a favor. Let us be the ones to sit next to you in your kingdom — one be on your right hand and the other on your left." They figured they would make their reservation early.

You can imagine how the rest of the disciples felt about that. They responded strongly — in anger, in hostility and in a sense of being betrayed. These emotions are not uncommon to you and me when we feel that someone has been trying to do us in, when someone attempts to gain a preferred position or get ahead of us, when we feel wronged.

Christ, however, takes a different view of this issue of greatness, of preference, of favoritism, of getting ahead. "Whoever wants to be great," he says, "must be your servant."

Now the term servant carries a rather humbling connotation in our day and age. It seems the reverse of what the world dictates today as the place of greatness; for in the world, greatness seems to indicate what I achieve for myself — in other words, how many people serve me.

Therefore, most of us strive to be first as a mark of achievement. The politician looks to winning. So, too, does the athlete. One of the most revered football coaches of recent years said, "Winning is everything." The businessman wants to gain that promotion which sets him above someone else. Even the clergyman, whose role is to serve, looks to higher office.

Within each of us there is this need to achieve, to gain recognition — a recognition that may not require us to be on the left hand or the right hand of Christ in his kingdom — but we don't want to be overlooked, either; we want the place of honor sometime during our lifetime. For, frankly, our personal identity depends upon our personal achievement.

The key is commitment. "Are you willing," he says to John and to James, "are you willing to drink from my cup and to be baptised with the same baptism that I am?"

In other words, are you willing to follow my lead

wherever it might go: in joy and in harmony, in pain and in suffering? Are you willing, he is saying to those two disciples and to us, are you willing to commit yourselves that deeply to me? Where are the limits of your commitment?

Those are tough questions, yet real ones for a follower of Christ. And they deserve some clarification. What does it mean, then, to give of oneself?

At root, it has to do with letting another person's needs set your agenda, to be responsive to what others lack, to be willing to work for what they don't have but might have, whether it be food in their hunger, hope in their hopelessness, love in their loneliness, support in their grieving. Can you imagine putting yourself out, sacrificing, even giving your life to bring these to someone else?

But let's be more specific. What are we, as Christians, called on to do?

Look at the home scene. That unpleasant task of picking up, that extra chore, that unexpected word of appreciation — we may not feel like doing it, but this kind of "giving" has strengthened many a family and even saved a few.

Do you have a parent, or an aunt or uncle, or a neighbor, who is elderly and lonely? And could you spare a few moments for a visit or a phone call?

Panthers Tops In TSU Relays

Coach Hoover Wright's Prairie View Panthers won the team title in the 23rd annual Texas Southern University Relays last Saturday in Jeppesen Stadium.

The Panthers edged out Coach Dave Bethany's Texas Southern University track team to win the college division team title. The Panthers won three relays to TSU's two.

PV won the two-mile relay with a time of 7:40.0. Texas Southern was second with a 7:40.6 clocking.

TSU won the 440-yard relay in 40.3. The members of the TSU quarter-mile relay unit are Amos Sumpster, Ernest Pough, Robert Taylor, and Ainsley Armstrong.

The Tigers also won the 880-yard relay with a time of 1:26. The members of that team are Melvin Turk, Armstrong, Taylor, and Pough.

Armstrong, the Tigers' fleet-footed trackster from Trinidad, was named the outstanding college division performer. He tied the meet record in the 100-

yard dash when he posted a 9.2. He was a key factor in TSU's wins in the 880 and 440-yard relays.

Debra Sapenter, PV's swift female sprinter was voted the meet's top female performer. She ran the 440-yard dash in a time of 56-flat, and anchored the Panthers' sprint relay team to a record time of 1:44.5.

Rosalyn Bryant of the Mayor Daley Foundation Track Club beat Debra Sapenter at the line in the 440-yard relay and gave the Chicago team a 46.1 which erased the mark set by PV in last year's meet. Salet Johnson, a 17-year-old high schooler, won the long jump with a leap of 19-8.

Tommy Fulton, TSU's Iron Man of Track, beat Leonard Hilton in the invitational 880-yard dash and the mile. Fulton won the mile easily with a time of 4:11.7.
