C BUILDINGS -

(a) Schuhmacher Hall

One hundred young men moved into this beautiful new dormitory October 28 and 29. From points of construction, conveniences and plans, this is the most modern building on the campus. The qualifications for assignment to this dormitory are as follows:

- 1 No failing marks in subjects
- 2 A good housekeeping record
- 3 Not too much familiarity with the Discipline Committee

These young men occupants of this building are to be congratulated upon their records which were solely responsible for the selections.

(b) NYA Hall #3

Foundation is now being laid for another dormitory to house 60 young women for the NYA Resident Center at Prairie View. This building will be located west of the College Hospital. It will be used for the young women, while Numbers 1 and 2 will be used for housing 120 young men.

(c) Nurses Home

The Board of Directors recently authorized the construction of a Nurses' Home on the west side of the present Hospital location. This building will accommodate living quarters for thirty-eight (38) nurses and eight (8) supervisors. Construction on this project will begin immediately and will be ready for occupancy by February 1, 1942.

The program and the expansion of Prairie View State College's services, more than mortgage all of my time and energies. The problems both on and off the immediate campus are enough to keep my mind all the while loaded and preoccupied. The strategic and important position the college holds in cooperating and planning for the highest welfare of our group generally, in Texas and elsewhere, draw heavily upon the resources of my time and energy. Besides, there come the delicate problems of Public Relations and the utilization of opportunities for the expansion of the services of this institution. It is obvious, then, that I should be left fairly free from unnecessary local and personal distraction, so that I can handle the increasing daily problems at the best advantages. Consequently, we are asking staff members in seeking conferences at the office -

- 1 Be certain that the matter cannot be settled by Division, Department Heads and good judgment.
- 2 If it is still necessary for final opinion, after the remedy in number 1 has been exhausted, state your problem in writing and pass it to us. An immediate answer will be given, and, if the situation warrants a conference, it then can be arranged:
- 3 In conference, please go straight to the point and eliminate, as far as possible, all extraneous matters.

These suggestions are made in the kindest possible spirit. Our energies and time must be conserved for the larger and important interests of the institution, and, therefore, should not be consumed in unnecessary items. T-H-A-N-K-S.

G AND FINALLY -

Let us study the words and ponder the meaning of this statement from Czechoslovakia, in the NEW YORK TIMES for September 23, 1937 -

"Our country might conceivably be overwhelmed by superior military force, but our Democracy will never be imperiled by outside attacks. Only its own feebleness or complacency destroys it. We in Europe see more clearly than you that Democracy dies from lack of discipline, unwillingness to compromise, group pressure, corruption, usurpation of public power, because the public is greedy or indifferent.

It dies unless it draws life from every citizen. Denouncing dictators gets nowhere. The job of those who believe in the democratic process is to be positive, not negative, to build up, expose and correct its mistakes, keep it alive."
