Ailing System Director Williams' Condition "Fair"

Freeman Named Acting President

Texas A&M University President Jack K. Williams, recovering from heart surgery at the Methodist Hospital in Houston was described as in 'fair' condition last week the most favorable terminology used since he was readmitted

The statement issued by the hospital on August 16 also indicated Dr. Williams' condition is "stable" and that his activities "are gradually increasing."
W. Clyde Freeman was

authorized last week by the Texas A&M University System Board of Regents to continue to act in behalf of Texas A&M President Jack K. Williams, who remains in critical condition in a Houston hospital following heart surgery.

Freeman, the Texas A&M University System's executive vice president for administration, was informally designated by Dr. Williams to act for him prior to his illness. The board formalized the delegation of duties at its July 9 meeting.

Board of Regents Chairman Clyde H. Wells, said Freeman will function on behalf of Dr. Williams until he is able to resume his duties or until further board action.

Prior to last week, Dr. Williams' condition had been described as "critical" for most of the period since he had been readmitted following a cardiac arrest at his home, where he was recovering from earlier heart-related problems. The description of his condition was upgraded last week to serious."

Last week's statement indicated that Dr. Williams had been sitting up and would start walking. Later in the week he was moved from the hospital's intensive care unit to a private room in a special care unit.



Catchings Elected to Board Of Commissioners in N. J.

Montclair, New Jersey has for the second time in its Bi-Centennial history elected a black man to its five-member board of commissioners. In its May 11 commissiones election, Dr. L. Maynard Catchings, Prairie View, Class of 1935, won a seat on the board.

An executive with the National Council of the Churches of Christ, Dr. Catchings campaigned along with three other persons under the title, "Montclair '76 United." Also elected in this group was the first woman commissioner in Montclair, Mrs. Betty Evans.

In a field of 17 candidates, three of which were black, Dr. Catchings placed third, thereby, guaranteeing his position on the five-member Board. The Commissioners are essentially responsible in Montclair, a town of approximately 50,000 people, for policy making and giving direction and leadership

to the town's services. The five posts held by the commissioners are : Public Affairs, Revenue and Finance, Safety, Public Works and Parks and Public Property.

As a result of a campaign pledge, Catching's department of Parks and Public Property has been reconstituted so as to include services in the area of health, housing, recreation and welfare. As part of this overall goal, the department will seek to coordinate the housing development and planning for the whole town.

At the National Council of Churches, Dr. Catchings serves as Associate Executive of the Commission on Local and Regional Ecumenism and is Special Assistant to the General Secretary. In his full time work he is particularly concerned with the emergence and nourishment of interdenominational cooperation among black churches and churches of the total society.

Theater

The Black Arts Repertory Company of Houston presented its production of "Nedela," a Bicentennial History of the American Black Man, on May 21, in the Lamar University Theater, Beaumont, Texas.

Calvin Smith, director of Spindletop Museum at Lamar University, said the production was a feature of a two-day conference May 21-22, devoted to "A New Approach to History The Challenge of Minority Views in Museums Today.'

Sponsors were The Texas Historical Commission, the Texas Historical Foundation, the Texas Commission on the Arts and Humanities, and the Texas Committee for the Humanities and Public Policy.

Hosts for the two-day affair were the Spindletop Museum of Lamar University, the Beaumont Art Museum, the Beaumont Heritage Society, and the Beaumont Convention and Visitors Bureau.

Organized in 1972 as an arm of HOPE Development, Inc., the Repertory Company and Drama Workshop of the Black Arts Center in Houston is a community - oriented project providing basic training and acting techniques while offering an outlet for expressive communications.

George Hawkins has been involved in theatre since his graduation from Prairie View A&M University in 1969. His acting debut was with the Cleveland Playhouse in Cleveland, Ohio, where he performed in several plays. In recent years he has participated as an actor and instructor with various theatrical organizations in the greater Houston area.

Most recently he appeared in the Jewish Community Center's production of "The Flowering Peach" and in "Glory in the Flower." Mr. Hawkins is presently employed as a trust accountant for a major oil company in Houston.

Other former Prairie View students now performing with the Black Arts Repertory Company are James R. Williams who specialized in music education and Alma Jujuan Carriere' who majored in Home Economics.



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Set For Cotton Bowl

PV-East Texas State To Meet Fri., Sept. 14

PRAIRIE VIEW - The echo around the Southwestern Athletic Conference is that Panther head football coach Hoover Wright has an ace-filled hand.

Wright will bring his stacked deck into the Cotton Bowl Friday, September 10, against Lone Star Conference power East Texas State at 7:30 p.m. Wright calls his 6-3 248 pound senior fullback David "The Hoss' Bohannon, his trump

Wright, going into his 11th year as a head football coach (6th at PVU) calls this the best Panther team he has been associated with since he was an assistant on Billy Nicks 1964 National Championship team that featured such talented performers as Otis Taylor, Jim Kearney, Ken Houston, and Alvin Reed.

"It's the best team I have been associated with since the 1964 team," stated Wright. We are stronger offensively and the defense has matured and is on the level with the offense,' continued Wright.

For the first time in the three year series with East Texas State, the Panthers have drawn the nod as favorites. However, Wright is more cautious. "We have to respect East Texas State. Traditionally, they keep good clubs. I feel that we are a better club going into this contest than previous times. I certainly feel that fans who don't attend this game will miss seeing one of the better Panther teams," said Wright.

The Panthers with all 22 starters from last season, including 42 of 44 veterans, center their offense around Bohannon, who pro scouts rate the best running back in college. "Bohannon could be the first player drafted," said Al Tabor, a scout for the Cleveland Browns. "Bohannon is the best back in the country, utters the Seahawks Charlie Garcia. "Bohannon is the best to come around in a long time,' said veteran scout Jackie Graves of the Eagles.

The 6-3, 248 pound Panthers rambling man, is also one of the fastest players on the squad with 4.6 speed in the 40 yard dash.

The Panthers also boast four All-Americans in Bohannon, Ron Thompson, 6-2, 200 pound senior linebacker, Greg Austin, 6-2, 260 pound senior offensive guard and 6-4, 235 pound sophomore defensive tackle Richard Rennett.

For the first time in the three year series against East Texas State, the Panthers are getting numerous calls and letters for tickets to the game. It's going to be one of the largest attended of previous games. Newhouse Reaches Gold

Prairie View All-American quartermiler - sprinter Fred Newhouse just might be the fastest oil refinery electrical engineer in the world.

Newhouse, who led coach Hoover Wright's Panthers to back-to-back SWAC and NAIA National Championships in 1968-69 and 1970, is an oil refinery electrical engineer for Exxon oil company in Baton

Few will argue that Newhouse is the world's fastest oil engineer, but the facts are that he is the world's second fastest 400 meter runner, which he proved at the recent summer Olympics when he ran a 44.02 to win a silver medal at Montreal. He won a gold medal for running on the winning 1600 meter relay team.

Newhouse's selection to the Olympic team is a lifetime goal. "It's a means to an end." I wanted to go to the Olympics," stated Newhouse who came to Prairie View as a baseball player. "It's an ever-striving one of the great quartermilers in history," said Newhouse in a telephone conversation with PVU Sports Publicist Joe Booker.

When did Newhouse, who set all kinds of records at Prairie View start getting serious about running international. "I really started getting ready for international competition when Coach Wright (PV coach) encouraged me to go to the 1968 Olympic trials," he said. 'I really didn't think too much of it them. The next day after the trials my teammate Felix Johnson made the international team. Felix and I were roommates and he told me how important it was to run international and try to make the Olympic team," he said.

"i wil have to give credit to Coach Wright for everything, because he made it possible for me. By the way, tell him hello for me."

On thing Newhouse doesn't like to reflect on and that's his 1972 Olympic experience, but he looks back on it as a lesson. "It's not the most pleasnat thing I like to remember." he field. I want to leave my mark said recalling when he broke the Olympic trials record with a


