D FACULTY TALENT -

At the January Workers meeting it was the unanimous opinion that it would be a worthwhile endeavor to organize Faculty Talents along the lines of Dramatic, Glee Club, and Orchestra. Already a number have indicated the club or clubs of their interest. Before the list is closed we would be pleased to have others who have not sent in their names to do so by February 10. It is the plan to have an all Faculty Talent appearance in April, and it is necessary to begin the selection of personnel for each club as soon as possible. This is a worthy movement.

LUNITY CHEST -

Your attention is called again to our Faculty Community Chest obligations. for this year. A great many staff members have paid their quotas. As yet some have not found it possible to do so. The Military Department, under the direction of Colonel Hamilton, has set a fine example by paying 100% although this is the first year of the Department. Then, too, Community Chest is an institutional loyalty test.

F POLL TAX -

Those who have not paid their Poll Tex must do so before the time limit, January 30, 1943. It has been pleasing to note the faithrulness of the large number of staff members who have paid Poll Tax for a number of years. The Board of Directors has expressed the hope that every person employed in this system hold a Poll Tax receipt.

G CIVILIAN EMERGENCY AID -

Civilian Emergency Aid Course will begin January 27 and close January 30, 1943, with an examination. It is the plan to have every student enrolled in the College take the course. This step is in keeping with the policy of the Federal Government in having the civilian population trained in the basic knowledge of Emergency Aid, so that in the case of emergencies, people would know how to protect themselves and be of service to others. Texas Department of Health, Austin, Texas, The Office of Civilian Defense, Washington, D C, and the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company of New York have been very helpful and cooperative to the end of making it possible to give 1200 people here valuable literature on civilian protection.

CRADES -

It is going to be very necessary to have in the Registrar's Office the Semester grades of the students before the registration for Second Semester can properly begin. The examinations were scheduled early so that those who had large classes would have sufficient time to check examination papers and hand in grades not later than 7:00 o'clock P M Friday, January 29. We are hopeful that all grades will be in complete on or before the time limit.
