

B SUMMER SCHOOL -

We now stand with bowed heads, with heavy hearts, submissive to the will of Him who giveth life for a purpose and who taketh it away in accordance with His will and plan. It is fitting that we pay our last tribute of respect and appreciation for the splendid life and hallowed memory of our friend and colleague.

Twenty-one years ago, in the budding of manhood, he came to Prairie View State College and was soon assigned the duties of Local Treasurer, the position held with unique distinction and efficiency until the time of his death. During this tenure of office, more than \$12,000,000 of public funds were disbursed under his direction and there was never a single note of criticism, nor the color of suspicion raised by the most scrutinizing Public Accountants; but rather warm praises for the efficient, orderly, and accurate manner in which the affairs of his office were conducted. Only a few of our people have been entrusted with the responsibility of hendling such a huge sum free from "itching palms"; free from criticisms.

In the marvellous growth of Prairie View State College during the past sixteen years, his unusual business acumen, indefatigable interest and enthusiasm played a signal and substantial role. The task of stretching short budgets; of making "all corners cut" in business matters; of "making bricks without straw", necessitated our working always in close formation and sympathetic understanding and it was in this capacity that the sterling qualities of his character stood out in their full brightness. He was strictly honest; he was orderly; he was methodical; he was intensely interested in and faithful to any task or chore that came to his hands—whether work or play. He was a man of strong convictions and undaunted courage. In times of emergency and human distress he was thoughtful and sympathetic and no want or need escaped his attention.

Death in human economy gives realism and earnestness to life; it paves the way for the continuity of growth; it sets the goal of life; it makes life tangible and measurable. Death then is the open door that leads to an Abundant and Eternal Life in a world where "Just men are made perfect."

And now to the hallowed memory of the late Charles W Lewis, my respected friend and loyal co-worker -
