# EXTRACTS FROM THE RIDER TO THE APPROPRIATION

BILL GOVERNING FUNDS FOR THE NEXT BIENNIUM. PLEASE NOTE CAREFULLY.

During this biennium for which these funds are appropriated, inasmuch as our nation is engaged in a war requiring the maximum effort of every citizen and the marshalling of our every resource, together with the practice of the strictest economy consistent with orderly government, it is declared the intent of the 48th Legislature that the governing boards and heads of the State institutions of higher learning shall offer only such courses and teach only such classes for which there is such a demand that each full time instructor shall have a teaching load of not less than fifty (50) students in all courses below the grade level.

Subsection (8). Vacation Allowance. A vacation not to exceed twelve (12) working days each year may be allowed each of the officers and employees provided for upon a twelve (12) months basis in this Act.

Subsection (14). The governing boards of each of the several institutions herein appropriated for shall file for each institution under their respective jurisdiction, on or before October 1, 1944, in the office of the Secretary of the State Board of Education a report showing the number of semester credit hours registered for, as well as the number of such hours completed, for the lower level, upper level, and in technical courses of instructions those terms are defined in the biennial report of the State Board of Education for 1934-36, as well as the number of student registrations in the lower level and upper level, for the long sessions of 1942-43 and 1943-44 and for the summer sessions of 1943 and 1944. Thereafter, as soon as the information is available, said boards shall file a semester report, as outlined above, for the first semester of the long session of 1944-45; and shall file a semester report showing the number of semester credit hours registrations in the lower level, upper level, and technical courses of instruction, as well as the number of student registrations in each classification as of the close of registration for the second semester of the long session of 1944-45.
