RESOURCES. A nurse and Community Service Aid are provided by the TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH RESOURCES to perform the services of immunization for Diptheria, Tetanus, Pertussis (DTP) Polio, Measles, and Rubella to infants, pre-schoolers, and school children.

The program strongly emphasizes the importance of a measles booster for children 12-16 months of age (or later) and for children who previously received measles vaccine under the age of 12 months, due to unreliable seroconversion prior to the first birthday.

Tetanus and Diptheria vaccines will also be given to adults.

Personal immunization record cards, showing dates and kinds of immunizations received are given so that parents will nave the immunization record of each child.

In consonance with established National and State standards of

respect, the National Flag at Prairie View A. and M. Collge will be flown at half-staff in honor of deceased members of the Prairie View family in accordance with the following precepts:

1. On the death of the President, President-elect or

for 30 days from the date of death.

2. On the death of the Dean of the College, Dean of the Schools of the College, and members of the President's Cabinet--

for 15 days from date of death.

3. On the death of any member of the college family to include the faculty, student body, current employees, retired employees--

from the day of death until 5:00 p.m. on day of interment.

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### Pol. Science Dept. **Presented Panel** For History Week

The Department of Political Science presented a panel on February 19 in the Memorial Center. The discussion, "Traditions of our People, Diversity, of our Culture: An Experiment on Pan-Africanism.'

The panel consisted of both faculty members and students. Dr. Emerson Kroma, a member of the Department presented a paper on "Dynamics of Political participation: Cognitive, Affective and Evaluative Orientation." Ms. Marcella Washington coordinated the panel and gave a paper on "Martin Delany and Malcolm X: A Comparative Analysis of Black Nationalists." Two students, Mr. Sidney McPhee and Mr. Alexander Beckles presented papers on the economic, social, political and cultural system of the Caribbean people.

With an audience of some 120 students and faculty members, the panel highlighted the situation of Blacks in different parts of the world. Questions and refreshments followed the presentation of the papers. The Department of Student Life, represented at the function by Mrs. Bennie Woods, assisted by helping with refreshments and stimulating student interest in the

The Department is grateful to their colleagues in Student Life for their moral and material support. It is hoped that in the future, we will improve upon our program performance. Mr. Hulen M. Davis, the Acting Head of Political Science, was also in attendence.

The concept of Pan Africanism is both a philosophy and unique black ideology. It is a political movement which unites blacks in the United States, the Caribbean and Africa in a common bond against colonialism, racism and exploitation. The first Pan-African Congress was organized by Henry Sylvester Williams, a West Indian Lawyer in 1900. The Congress served as a forum against White Colonialism. The Organization was taken over by W. E. B. DuBois, a black American who organized five Pan-African Conferences from 1919-1945. The movement was later shifted to Africa when in 1958 the President of Ghana, Kwame Nkruman organized the All African People's Conference. Pan-Africanism symbolizes the following princi-

- (1) Africa for the Africans
- (2) African Federalism
- (3) African Personality
- (4) African Socialism (5) Belief in Democracy
- (6) Non-Violence as expounded by Ghandi and King
- (7) Non-Alignment



Austin — Dolph Briscoe has approved a criminal justice grant of \$47,907 to Montgomery County for staffing of the district attorney's office in the 9th Judicial District.

District Attorney for the 9th Judicial District is responsible for felony prosecution in Waller, Montgomery, San Jacinto and Polk Counties. This grant provides both investigatory and prosecution staffing for the area.

The local awards are among 70 approved by Governor Briscoe this month totaling \$4.5 million across the state, from Law Enforcement Assistance Administration funds under the Crime Control Act of 1973.

patient of teachers and characteristically sympathetic with dull people, fairly admits that he was taken aback by Nicodemus' slowness of perception, and found it difficult to moderate his own eager steps to his pupil's tardy pace. If Nicodemus was stumbled by such elementary matters, Christ could not press on to what he had really meant to say. Our Lord had brought him abruptly face to face with the central fact that if the new life is ever to be lived there must be a new creature, wholly new, built up in a new way; that mere tinkering at oneself is of little or no use. all the facts of life corroborate that verdict. Walter Lippmann, for instance, tells us that past experience has proved that Christ is absolutely right; and that even with the best will in the world, "the ungenerate man can only muddle into muddle." We ourselves were so sure that at long last a generation has arisen, keen and eager to put this disorderly earth to rights; and fit to do it too, thank God. We meant well; we tried so hard; and look at what we have made of it! "Can only muddle into muddle." What is required is a new kind of man. We must be born anew. all which is drastic teaching; and no one

ever stated it so impressively as

Jesus Christ. But it was not

altogether novel. Nicodemus

could have found adumbra-

tions of it in his own scriptures,

and fairly plain ones too. You

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cannot do it, so Ezekiel told his people bluntly (Ezek. 36:25, 29); not as you are, not with that stoney heart of yours, so hard and cold and callous, so impervious to divine influences. But God can make you a new personality, with a quite different nature and a heart of flesh, warm and sensitive, shrinking from evil as from intolerable pain; that feels and is hurt by others' sufferings, and is responsive to God's touch. A trapped creature in the psalms, not worrying about the consequences of his sin, but terrified by the discovery that he has done this thing...has been this thing...that this is me; no accidental, unaccountable happenings, but this is what I am; and horrors like this can surge up out of my nature. And I, unhappy one, cannot change myself. "Create in me a clean heart, O God; and renew a steadfast spirit within me." Psalm 51:10.

The essence of David's prayer is: "God. make me another kind of being from what I am...keep me another kind of being from what I am...so shall I lead a different kind of life from the one I'm living...even so, Lord, but not otherwise." As Christ said to Nicodemus, he says to every man today: "Truly, truly, I say to you, unless one is born anew, he cannot see the kingdom of God." "That which is born of the flesh is flesh, and that which is born of the Spirit is spirit. Do not marvel that I said

Transportation Official Says-

### Carpooling Can Save Money

Automotive Technology Program at Prairie View A&M University reports that The Federal Highway Administra-tion of the U. S. Department of Transportation said recently it has developed a handy reference table (below) for persons considering getting into carpooling and save money. The annual cost of driving alone a distance of 10 to 25 miles to work is \$646 for operators of subcompact cars to \$1,868 for standard size cars.

"The automobile represents the single largest user of petroleum products; consequently, it is a major factor in the energy problem. Any solution to the energy situation as well as the problems of urban congestion and air pollution, must include reduced use of the automobiles, especially driver-only occupancy. Every driver should seriously consider joining his company's "Double-Up" carpool campaign or start a ride sharing plan on his or her own," FHWA Administration Norbert T. Tiemann said.

By sharing a car with one person, an employee can save up to 50 percent in transportation costs. With five persons per car, employees save up to 80 percent, an annual after-tax saving of \$281 to \$1,390, depending on the size of the car, carpool, and distance traveled.

Additional employee benefits include: less driving, reliable transportation, a guaranteed comfortable seat, the option of selecting riders, acceptable door to door travel times, saved energy resources, reduced air pollution, and reduced congestion in parking facilities and on

Carpools carry more than 20 million commuters each day. more than twice as many as buses and fixed rail systems combined. Big American corporations, such as the Minnesota Mining and Manufacturing Company, Texas Instruments, Inc., Hallmark Cards, Aerospace Corporation, Jantzen, Inc., Government Employees Insurance Co. (GEICO), and the Boeing Company, have discovered that volunteer carpool programs increase auto occupancy between 10 and 35 percent. This kind of reduction in an entire urban area can dramatically

reduce rush hour congestion. During the height of the 1973-74 energy crisis, Los Angeles reported a seven percent reduction in rush hour traffic from the preceding year eliminating 40 percent of the city's normal traffic delays.

Nationwide, 50 million automobiles used for commuting each working day have had an average occupancy rate in the rush hour of 1.4 persons. However, 75 percent of the automobiles involved in the commuter working day carry only one person-the driver.

Raising the occupancy rate to 3.2 persons per car would save more than one million barrels daily.

Carpooling is an immediately available way to improve transportation productivity and reduce costs. Each two percent increase in auto occupancy nationally at rush hour would save about \$1 billion annually in operating costs and capital expenditures. With about eight percent of the country's work force now using buses and fixed rail to commute to work, each two percent increase in ride sharing is equivalent to a 20 percent increase in mass transit



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
