Program Planning Procedures

Student program planning may be facilitated through well-organized group activities. However, these should be supplemented by individual counseling.

The student's long-term educational planning should begin a semester before the student must make a choice in educational electives or directions.

Parents and students should be reminded that educational programs planned at the ninth grade level are often tentative for several reasons. Pupils do not always perform according to expectation. There are changes within the individual and in the social environment which are impossible to anticipate to which he must adjust. Frequently, too, changes must be made because parents insist, in spite of all recommendations to the contrary, that a pupil pursue a course for which he is ill-suited. Another reason for revision of programs results from changes in the ability or performance of the pupil. A pupil carrying five subjects is usually permitted to drop one of them if his work is unsatisfactory.

Because of such considerations, all schools must make some provision for necessary revision of student programs. In fairness to both the teachers and the pupils, necessary changes should be made before the beginning of a new semester whenever possible. No changes should be made in pupils' schedules without thoroughly investigating the reasons for the change. In all cases, an analysis of the home situation, of the relationship of the pupil to other pupils, and of the pupil to the teacher should be made,
