The members through their organization have resolved to celebrate with the youth of America, together with the youth of the freedom-loving nations of the world, by sending gifts once a year to needy children in other countries to celebrate the World Christmas Festival season.

Executive Committee Of Alumni Association **Sends Greetings**


To all Alumni and Ex-students of Prairie View Agricultural and Mechanical College GREETINGS:


Since the November 1948 Alumni meeting when practically a new roster of officers was elected, the Executive Committee has had three meetings, and discussed the following objectives:
