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# Over 2-Million In Construction Approved

Prairie View A&M University's campus improvement program received a major boost Tuesday with award by the Texas A&M University System Board of Regents of two contracts totaling more than \$2 million.

Goolsby Building Corp. of Temple was the low bidder on both contracts for upgrading campus utilities. The larger award, for \$1,350,612, covers installation of a new boiler, chillers and chilled water distribution lines, while the

other, for \$831,650, provides for installation of new steam and hot water distribution systems.

These contracts are in addition to the ones awarded last fall for purchase of the main components for the

projects. At its September meeting the board awarded a \$188,270 contract to the York Division of Borg-Warner in Houston for two chillers and \$125,000 to Nebraska Boiler Co., Lincoln, Nebraska, for a steam boiler.

Valuation of the Prairie View campus, now estimated at \$70 million, has more than doubled in the past 10 years. A new arts and science building and a new health center were completed last fall. Other recent additions include two

residence halls, a student dining hall and an ROTC facility.

A major addition for Prairie View's engineering building is under construction through a \$2,661,899 contract with the Pence Corp. of Houston.

#### State Rep. To Speak

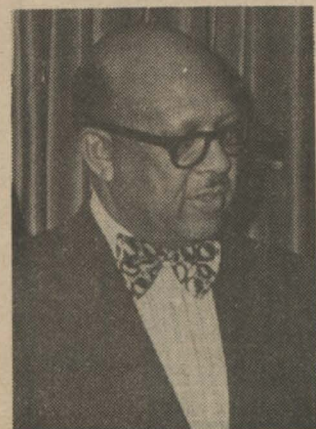

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## PACE Examination to Be Conducted

According to Jerome L. Pinkston, Jr., Associate director of Technical Placement the Professional and Administrative Career Examination (PACE) is the primary gateway through which college caliber applicants enter into the Federal Civil Service in grades GS-5 (\$9,300) and GS-7 (\$11,500). The lists of eligibles established under this announcement will be used to fill a large variety of trainee positions, many of which do not require specialized experience.

The Placement Office is happy to announce that the PACE written test will be given on our campus in March. All liberal arts students are encouraged to take this exam. This exam will be available for

students, faculty, and staff that have filled out an application and returned it to our office.

An application for the PACE written test may be picked up in the Placement Office in Room 116 of the Memorial Student Center. The deadline for registering for the exam to be given in March is February 19, 1977. Students in all majors are eligible to take the examination with the exception of students in engineering.

## Houston Post Newspaper Courses Underway

The Houston Post began weekly publication of Courses by Newspaper's winter series Thursday, January 20. This 16-week series, entitled "Moral Choices in Contemporary Society," is being offered as a three-credit philosophy course by the University of Houston and as a three-credit sociology course by Prairie View A&M University.

Authored by 11 outstanding scholars, the series probes the complex and controversial moral dilemmas that confront Americans in public and private life. Articles discuss such topics as abortion, sex and morals, marriage and the family, aging, crime and punishment, pornography, racism and the morality of science, politics and business.

### Our Atomic Bomb Produces Various Kinds of "Fallout"

Much has been written about the founding of Los Alamos, New Mexico, and a great deal of it has dealt with housing. If, as expected, only 100 scientists had been needed to design the atomic bomb, the complex of rustic buildings that constituted the exclusive boy's ranch school on the Pajarito (Little Bird) Plateau might have been enough. But by July 1945, when the world's first atomic weapon was exploded successfully near Alamogordo, New Mexico, the new community had swelled to more than 5,700 military and civilian personnel.

On Sunday, January 16, 1977, Rev. Van Johnson gave the first Sermon of the semester at the First Church service held at the Memorial Student Center packed full with students both new and old with special guests among who was the President, Dr. A. I. Thomas.

Rev. Johnson's sermon expatiated on the need for brothers and sisters here to live together, work together and learn together as a member of one family. Those who attended the service that Sunday got a living message to live with. It is a great beneficial factor for all of us, if we learn to understand and love each other.

If you like people, you want to be nice to them. This is the essence of charm and attractive personality. It is easier to like people when we have the imagination and sensitivity to put ourselves in their place. Genuine charm does not seek to please so much as demonstrate concern. But suppose you meet somebody who smiles and says Hi! with genuine warmth? This greeting not only gives an extra little psychological lift. We all live in a bustling impersonal world where it is easy not to bother about being nice to people, and when nobody is expected to bother. But make no mistake about it, people like it when you do. That is when you are regarded as possessing charm and an attractive personality.

You cannot turn this on in your efforts to win friends and influence people in this our kind of environment. If you do, it will last no time in the rough and tumble of everyday campus life. It has to be based on a solid foundation of genuine liking for brothers and sisters if we are to unite and work together as a member of the same family in this University.

Young ladies as well as young men have to believe that people matter. We have to think that the majority of use are likeable, and look for their nicer side rather than concentrate on aspects which irritate you.

You have to believe that given patience on your side, it is possible to tolerate awkwardness and unkindness and manage to agree to differ.

If we like ourselves, it is easy to be kind. You will put yourself to inconvenience for them and consider their point of view. You will think before speaking in order to avoid hurting them with tactless questions and thoughtless remarks. You want to be helpful and cooperate with people and share activity with them.

Because you are interested and concerned, it is not so difficult to remember names and faces and put the two together correctly. People then enjoy your company and think you charming.

It is sad but true that those of us on this Prairie View A&M University campus who complain of having no friends may only have ourselves to blame. We want friends but have done nothing to make our personality attractive to others.

## Meat and Broth

The angel of God said to him, "Take the meat and the cakes, and put them here on the rock and pour out the broth," and he did so.

Judges 6:20

The story of Gideon is one of the most dramatic in all the bible, I think. Do you remember how he chose an army to fight the Midianites, as it has never been done before or since? First, those who were afraid were sent home. Then the rest were divided as to how they drank water from the spring, most of them getting down on their knees to drink, but 300 of them lapping the water like a dog. The 300 were chosen because of their vigilance. And in the subsequent blitzkrieg on the enemy camp, how inventive and clever Gideon was to have the men take smoldering torches covered by an earthen pitcher so that no glint of ember or spark appeared; then as the trumpet sounded, to smash the earthen pitchers so that the torches, exposed to the air, would flare up; and the followers of Gideon, with a rebel yell, fell upon the enemy camp and won a coveted victory.

Yet there is more to the story of Gideon than military tactics, and perhaps the more valuable part to us is the way Gideon was chosen by the Lord, how he knew he was chosen, and what Gideon did when the hand of the Lord was laid upon him.

We should begin by noticing that Gideon had assets of his own, as most people do. For one thing, he was a man of resourcefulness and intelligence, and he was brave. We first see him down in the pit of an olive press, threshing out grain. The Midianites had overrun Israel, and the people had taken to the hills and hidden in caves to escape their oppressor. Yet Gideon was willing to risk capture to provide food for his people. Bravery, like that, is admired by friend and foe alike. "Bravery" as Thackeray wrote, "never goes out of fashion." It

is always admired. And Gideon had it in full measure.

Gideon had another asset. He knew he had an enemy. He knew danger when he saw it. Yet how many people who have an enemy do not know it. The drinker who says, "I can quit any time" — he has an unrecognized enemy. The embezzler who says, "I'll just take a little and put it back. They'll never miss it." He has an enemy, and it's not just the law. The procrastinator who always finds excuses — "I will do it when I feel better," or "when I have more time," or "Later on will be just as good" — has an enemy. The person who violates his own integrity for the sake of favor, or a better job, or family peace, or for any reason, has an enemy, unrecognized, and the therefore unresisted; ignored, and therefore invincible. To recognize an enemy, to know what is unrelentingly against our best self, to see clearly what we are up against — that is a great asset. And Gideon had it.

Let us notice also in passing that Gideon had the asset of hospitality. A stranger stops by. Gideon listens, is courteous, invites the stranger to dinner, and, even in the middle of a famine, prepares a meal of bread and meat and broth. The bible identified the visitor as an angel of the Lord. Perhaps this explains why the New Testament advises us to be hospitable to strangers, "for thereby some have entertained angels unawares." It just may be today that one reason so few people meet up with angels is that we offer hospitality to Kinsmen and business associates and "our kind of people," but not many of us are given to entertaining strangers. If Gideon had not been hospitable, we would never have heard of him.

If we today would first prepare ourselves thoroughly, and wear a smile and say

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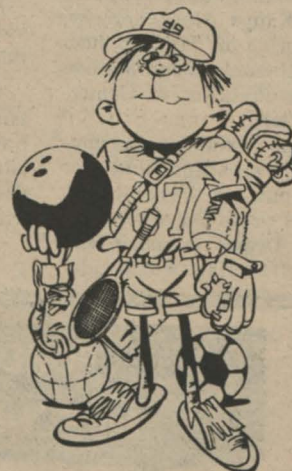
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## Pantherettes Win Indoor Title

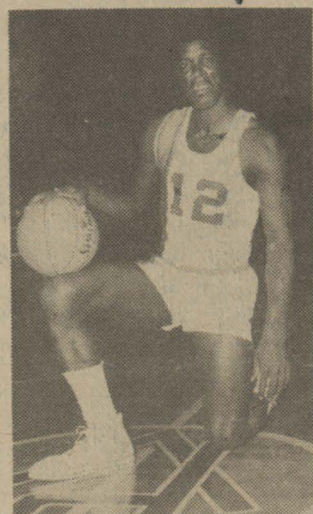
"Your team is better than the record indicates," an observer said after the game.

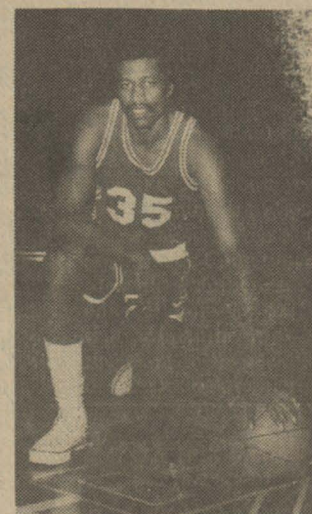

## Elwood Plummer . . . Prairie View's New Breed

The extra effort, that added step — and suddenly a "silly millimeter" isn't so silly anymore.

Prairie View A&M University's young basketball coach Elwood Plummer has become synonymous with the new breed image of coaches today. He is not a catalyst gadfly or any other of the proverbial outside agitators; he is PVU's man from the inside . . . friendly, composed and humorous.

His run-shoot-run oriented offenses have become the core of "Plummerized" skills and techniques.

Where most coaches have had problems dealing with the new generation Plummer feels the best approach is "communication." "You know, we don't have the dedication in athletes as we did when I was coming up," Plummer was telling Texas Colleges' coach Charles Jackson prior to a Prairie View vs. Texas College game. "I think most of the guys were misled and are looking for someone to relate with them," said Plummer, who is a former San Antonio Wheatley high school and Jackson State Cager.

The 1974-75 season was one of Plummer's most productive and exciting ones at Prairie View. The team led the nation with a 105.0 scoring average and scored 100 points or more in 19 of 26 games. "We had a good team, but we didn't have enough time playing together to mold into a unit," said Plummer. "We had three new players in the starting lineup," Plummer continued.

Even though he is relatively young in the coaching profession Plummer has found recruiting to be a dog-eat-dog battle. "It's the evils that some coaches use to recruit, especially low-income black athletes that upset me," said Plummer.

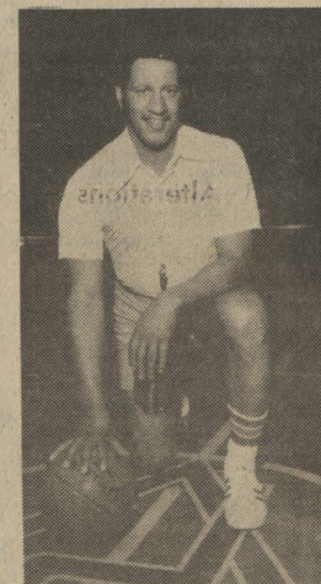

where a kid had signed a conference letter-of-intent to attend Prairie View but when he went back on national letter-of-intent signing day the kid had a change of mind. "The sad thing about it is some of those kids call me wanting to transfer to Prairie View," said Plummer.

Despite the war for the super stars Plummer has been able to get his share such as Marvin Jackson, Robert Armstrong, David Daniels, Kermit McAdory and Dennis Wayne. But the price for the 6-9's and 6-10's has been too high to pay. "We tell kids we don't have the luxury of cars, money, etc., that some schools offer you, but we can offer you a quality education at Prairie View where you can eventually afford the luxuries. If you have the potentials of playing professional basketball our style of play and competition in the Southwestern Athletic Conference provides that," Plummer tells his recruits.
