B PRAIRIE VIEW UNIVERSITY -

Governor Coke R Stevenson signed on June 2, 1945 as follows:

"A bill changing the name of Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College for Negro Teachers to PRAIRIE VIEW UNIVERSITY and providing for the establishment of courses in Law, Medicine, Engineering, Pharmacy, Journalism or any other recognized college course taught at the University of Texas whenever there is any demand for such courses."

C BIENNIUM APPROPRIATION -

The recent legislature finally appropriated for the next biennium for the maintenance of "Prairie View University" \$410,902 and \$440,902, a total of \$851,8040 The appropriation for maintenance operation for this biennium is \$458,460. Thus, the next budget represents an increase of about eighty-five per cent over the budget for 1943-1945. This increase in appropriation will make it possible to do the following things -

- 1. absorb the money used to supplement salaries from other sources than State appropriations,
- 2. absorb the increases in some salaries this year,
- 3. provide for new positions created by the program of expansion, and
- 4. make improvement in salary levels in Graduate Courses.

It is significant to point out that the budget approved for the operation of the college for this fiscal year 1944-1945 calls for an imcome of \$743,239. Of this amount the state appropriated \$229,230.

E THE W R BANKS LIBRARY -

The contractors have promised to turn over to the college The W R Banks Library complete in every detail. The best and most modern equipment has been ordered. The building is well constructed, beautiful in design and remarkably well planned. The stacks will accommodate more than 100,000 volumes. Already \$31,000 are available to be spent for books and periodicals during the next biennium beginning September 1, 1945. The cost of construction and the installation of equipment will be more than \$210,000. The building is more than beautiful - it is a dream!

F CLASS OF 1935 -

The members of the Class of 1935 were here at Commencement May 19-20 in surprisingly large numbers. Those who could not be present sent greetings and a great many sent a Reunion Appropriation to be used for some project in the New Library. On the occasion of the Open House, Sunday afternoon, May 20, Miss Theresa M Pratt made an able presentation speech when the class donation was reported. Other members of the class have promised to send in their donations to the fund not later than October 1, 1945. Attached to this News Letter is a list of donations and the sources of the same.

G ENROLLMENT -

The total enrollment of the Summer School for the First Term 1944 was 832. According to information from the Registrar's Office the total enrollment for 1945 is 782.
