B. INTERCOLLEGIATE RELAYS -

The Annual Intercollegiate Relays will be observed at the University April 5-6. Principally all of the member colleges in the Southwest Conference will send their participants, according to recent communications. Tuskegee Institute, Alabama and Xavier University, New Orleans have indicated that they would send contestants. This will bring to the campus representatives from the leading colleges in the Southwest, as well as from Alabama. We are happy to be host to this important group of college people.

C. INTERSCHOLASTIC LEAGUE -

Due to the large number of schools enrolled it has been decided to use two week-ends of April to hold the contests. The Classes B, C and D Schools will compete Saturday, April 20 and the Classes A and AA Schools will compete Saturday, April 27. Because of housing conditions it was thought wise to use the two week-ends to avoid difficulties of lodging. Under this arrangement most of the competitors can come Saturday morning and leave Saturday afternoon. These events will bring several hundred students, teachers and citizens to our campus.

D. ROTC INSPECTION -

The Service Command has sent directive to the effect that the Annual Inspection of the ROTC Unit at Prairie View University will take place April 25-26, 1946. The fact that two days will be used **indicates that** this inspection will be thorough and comprehensive. Brigadier General Benjamin O Davis will be guest of the institution at this time.

E. PARENTS' DAY -

For five years Prairie View has sponsored a Parents' Day in connection with the activities of Commencement. This year Parents' Day will be on Sunday, May 19. It is expected that several hundred parents and friends will avail themselves of this opportunity to visit the University.

F. COMMENCEMENT AND BACCALAUREATE -

During the war the practice of holding Commencement and Baccalaureate on the same day was observed and the outcome was so satisfactory that for the near future the observance of these exercises will be at the same time. This year the Commencement and Baccalaureate exercises will be on Sunday, May 19. The guest speaker will be Dr Mordecai W Johnson of Howard University, Washington, D C. The reputation of Dr Johnson as an able and eloquent speaker will be responsible for a record attendance at the Commencement exercises this year.

G. VICTORY GARDENS -

The Federal Government is urging the American citizens to help with the world food shortage by cultivating Victory Gardens this spring and summer. For a number of years we have had several faculty members to engage in this worthwhile practice and we want to take this occasion to urge everyone who finds it possible to plant a Victory Garden. This will not only make a contribution to the food shortage in the country but it will offer a worthwhile and wholesome exercise activity.

IMPERATIVES IN RECONVERSION

(This statement was adopted at the International Convention of Young Men's . Christian Association, Atlantic City, New Jersey, March 15-17, 1946.)

"No more important problem and opportunity faces the YMCA in the transition from war to peace than that in the areas of interracial and intercultural relations. The war and the transition to peace have made us face the inequities in the life of the nation and of the world, based on differences of race or culture. Many of those who will be members of the YMCA in this transition period are of the Negro or other minority races who gave themselves unsparingly in the armed forces or in industry for the winning of the war. They will expect, and have a right to expect, fairness and equity now that the war is over. It is the opportunity as well as the obligation of the YMCAs to work on the front line in the solution of these problems of interracial and inter-cultural relations.

"The YMCA has a special obligation to face courageously the place of Negroes and other racial groupings in its membership. The pattern followed in the YMCA has been that of the United States generally; viz., to develop separate Associations on a racial basis. The acceptance of this pattern as a final answer in a Christian organization has been challenged by many in the YMCA over a period of years. For more than a decade the Student Associations have been modifying their practice in the direction of an interracial fellowship. Area Councils and local Associations have been developing interracial relations in staff and in membership. Careful research studies have been made under the National Council with a view to bringing a contribution to the solution of the problem. With its large and significant membership from minority races in this country, the YMCA has a special opportunity of enlisting the cooperation of Megroes and whites, Orientals and Occidentals in the Association in earnest, prayerful efforts to arrive at policies and practices which will take into account the realities of the diverse local situations and yet will be true to the democratic and Christian convictions of the Association Movement as to the worth and rights of all races."
